Rotary Foundation – Bringing about the eradication of Polio worldwide.

Maggies – Helping people with cancer take back

Tom's Trust – Providing mental health support to children with brain tumours.

Young Lives vs Cancer - Helping families find the strength to face everything cancer throws at them. Rowan Humberstone – Cambridge based arts & forest school for adults with learning difficulties. **Jimmy's** – Proving both support & housing for people who are rough sleeping in Cambridge. Arthur Rank Hospice – Supporting people in Cambridgeshire with an advanced serious illness. **Teenage Cancer Trust** – Supporting young people who have been diagnosed with cancer. CamPod – Supporting medical research at the

University's Department of Pathology. **University of Cambridge Veterinary School Trust** – Providing crucial care for sick & injured

animals. Club Projects and other good causes – The club will use some of the funds raised to support other charities and also the club's projects.

This fund raising project is possible because the University Estates Department, Downing Site & University of Cambridge Department of Chemistry allow the free use of their car parks. The car parks are staffed by volunteers. Save for the minimal cost of materials, all proceeds go to charities and good causes. A minimum donation of £7 allows you to park all day. Last year the project raised over £30,000.

The two car parks are open on each weekend from 2nd/3rd December until Christmas Eve & then again from Wednesday 27th December until Sunday 31st December.

Nuclear test medal for Christopher

A FORMER RAF serviceman and Linton Resident has finally been recognised for the part he played in nuclear bomb testing in the 1950s. Christopher Moore moved to the village as an evacuee in 1939 and spent nearly thirty years here before moving to Oxfordshire and then the USA. During his time in Linton, Christopher joined the RAF and took part in vital and secretive nuclear testing in Maralinga, Australia. A long running campaign by families of former service personnel saw the government finally take steps to recognise their contribution, and the medals were produced and presented in time for this year's Remembrance Sunday. Christopher, now 86, still has strong links to the village through his sister Hillary Chapman, who lives in Linton and reached out to the Department of Defence when they announced that the new decorations would be awarded. Both Hillary, and Christopher's daughter Sharon Pepe said they were "immensely proud" that he had finally been recognised for the part he played. Christopher was "very happy" to receive the awards, particularly as a recent bout of ill health has prevented him from visiting the UK and the village "he adores".

Have you considered becoming a foster carer?

ANSAR and Jehan are long standing foster carers who support unaccompanied asylum seeking children. They have found being foster carers the most spiritually rewarding career they have had. The couple kindly share their fostering journey to inspire others to become foster carers:

We have a close family friend who introduced us to fostering as she was a foster carer herself. We had many discussions with her about the pros and cons and also saw how well her foster child was doing and the positive impact that foster carers can have. We firmly believe in giving back to society and were confident that by becoming foster carers, we could do just that! The process was fairly straightforward. We didn't encounter any curve balls or complexities - just a fair bit of paperwork! But once all of that was covered, the training began, which truly opened our eyes to the reality of children in care; their emotional struggles, the kind of mistreatment they face, their personal battles and what we can do to support them both during and after placement. In total, it took around six months for us to go from submitting the enquiry to being approved by panel. The adaptation came with experience and the training that came from the agency.

We are still learning and adapting as no two children are the same. We have had 15 children and two mothers in our care thus far, and we remember every single one of them, and always will. Our first foster child was actually a refugee who had could not speak or understand English, so we used Google translate and pictures of food, drinks, clothes etc to communicate. We were very excited about the child coming to live with us and had lots of support from our social worker so we felt as prepared as we could have been.

Our previous agency was absorbed by Nexus Fostering, but we chose to remain with Nexus Fostering and not transfer elsewhere. The main reasons were; Nexus Fostering is wellestablished in both processes and reputation.

The support has come in the form of keeping us updated on changes and developments, regular supervision and by offering training that is relevant and informative. If you are considering fostering, understand that it is a 24/7 commitment unlike any other job and that your whole family (anyone that lives with you) will be involved in one way or another. Ask any and every question that comes to mind – no such thing as a silly question! Absorb any of the material/information that you are given as it will come in handy at some point in your fostering



Linton Garden Club

THE December meeting of the Linton Gardening Club is on Tuesday the 12th of December in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. A light-hearted gardening quiz will be followed by teas and bring-your-own festive nibbles.

At the November meeting of the Linton Gardening Club, Nigel Start gave an educational and practical talk on "Coping with Climate Change" in allotments and gardens. A 100 -150mm deep coarse mulch on flower borders and the vegetable patch will insulate the soil in winter and conserve soil moisture during droughts. It also protects the soil structure from battering by the increasingly heavy downpours we get now.

Other tips included saving as much rainwater as practically possible, choosing pest and disease resistant varieties in the vegetable patch, and swapping tender annuals for more deeply rooting biennials and hardy perennials in the borders to reduce the need for daily watering during heatwayes.

The exceptionally wet autumn means that working the soil should be avoided until it drains sufficiently. Between the bouts of rain, we had a lovely autumn with many borders, hedgerows and woodlands being a blaze of oranges, reds, browns and yellows especially when caught in a rare moment of sunshine.







During the short December days, bright red berries and hips also stand out alongside the rich red stems of acer and dogwood shrubs, bringing splashes of welcome colour to the borders. Indoor plants can also give a pleasing variety of colour shape and texture when its bleak outdoors. With the festive season upon us and with the eventual passing of the shortest day, we can look forward to the new year and new gardening opportunities.

GIVEN the news headlines these past months, and the cost of living, it's easy to feel helpless when we see people facing dreadful situations overseas and in the UK



Linton Village College Remembers

SIXTY-NINE Year 9 and 10 students from Linton Village College spent the remembrance weekend on a battlefields trip in France and Belgium.

The trip gave students the opportunity to explore trench lines on the Western Front that had been preserved since the end of the First World War whilst guides talked them through how disease, infestation, and poor sanitation was rife.



At 11 o'clock on Armistice Day, students had an incredibly special opportunity to mark the 105th anniversary of the end of the First World War at a graveyard in the Somme Valley that was dedicated to men in the 36th Ulster Division, many who died in the very first hours of the Battle of the Somme on the 1st of July 1916. Pupils visited a number of other memorials, including the memorial for unknown soldiers at Thiepval and the Newfoundland Memorial Park.

Some students were fortunate to be able to visit the sites of some their ancestors who gave their lives during the fighting on the Western Front in the First World War and whose graves we visited on the trip on personal pilgrimages. Lucy, in Year 9, visited the grave of one of her great great grandfather's brother who died in Ypres at the age of twenty seven.





Meanwhile, Thomas in Year 10 discovered that one of the tour guides is an expert on his ancestor who was awarded the Victoria Cross, the highest military honour in the British Army, for his gallantry and bravery in the First World War.

COUNTRY MATTERS

Grasshoppers - athletes of the insect world

JUST as you settle into winter, with thoughts of holly and mistletoe, here is a reminder of the sounds of summer. Settle back into the armchair, imagine the warm evening air, shut your eyes and listen out for the grasshoppers and crickets giving it their all. They are the most ancient living group of herbivorous insects, living at least 250 million years ago, and like so many insects, are fascinating once you learn a little bit about them.

There are 11 sorts of grasshoppers in the UK, mostly in the warmer and dryer parts of the south and east, and the most common is the brown Field Grasshopper, Chorthippus Brunneus, closely related to crickets and locusts. They start appearing in June, and once you've heard the short, rapid chirrup, vibrating and repeating every 2 seconds, you can look carefully and find one clinging to a grass stalk. Just as you've spotted it, it leaps away. Was it a cricket or a grasshopper? Crickets have very long delicate antennae, and grasshoppers short stubby ones. Though they eat half their body weight daily, neither has the terrible scorched earth

whereas grasshoppers are busy throughout the day. A grasshopper is like most insects, with a head, thorax and abdomen. But the difference with grasshoppers is their astonishing hind legs. The antennae are sensitive to smell, touch, vibration, humidity and strength and direction of wind. The 2 huge eyes can detect colour, shape, movement and distance, and the three tiny

reputation of swarming locusts. Crickets come out at twilight

eyes on the front of the head can detect changes in light. How biologists find this out is a bit of mystery to me. But the hind legs, the largest of the three pairs, are more easily fathomed. They have huge muscles in the femur. Before they jump they contract

> their muscles slowly, bending the hind legs at the knee joints. Then WHAM, the spring is released, and the critter leaps away into the next county. Well actually they jump 20 times their own body length.

The sound the grasshopper makes is performed by a process called stridulation. It rubs its hind legs, each with rows of raised "pegs" across the rigid edge of its outer wing, like a file and scraper,

or like rubbing a comb along the edge of a card. The male uses this sound to defend his territory and attract a female, and his tone changes when a female is sighted. When mating, the sperm is transferred in a spermatophore, and eggs are deposited via an

at the base of a blade of grass or just below ovipositor the soil. The female emits a frothy secretion which protects the eggs for the whole winter till it is warm enough for them to hatch. They then go through what is called an incomplete metamorphosis – no pupae, but hatching as miniature grasshoppers, taking two months and several moults before they're fully grown. They then live just a couple of months, before dying off or being eaten by birds, spiders and small mammals. It seems a lot of effort for such a short life span.

Linton Heights - Cut Your Carbon Campaign

In 2023 the school was presented with the Green Flag Award, which proves the school's eco-credibility.

The latest venture for the Eco-Council is taking part in 'Cut your Carbon', a month-long carbon cutting challenge organised by the Eco Schools charity. Pupils at the school take home a checklist which includes nine activities to complete throughout the month. It includes activities like substituting a bath for a shower, donating something you no longer need and going meat-free for a day. We will be encouraging staff as well as pupils to take part! We are hoping to see as many of our families, and perhaps wider community members, taking part as possible.





District and County Councillors' monthly report November 2023

Possible Solar Farm Application

We were alerted to a proposal from a solar energy company of a possible planning application in our area for a new, very large, solar farm. There is very little detail at the moment but we do know that the potential area amounts to several hundred hectares. The current 'search area' for land is from the east of Balsham down to the north of Linton the over to the east of Fulbourn. If this whole area were to be turned into a solar farm, which is unlikely in our view, it would be the largest solar farm in Europe, by some way. Watch this space!

<u>A1307 Works</u>

The usual A1307 update from us:

After the work to the roundabout at Linton is compete, the final elements of the upgrades to the road will be the remodelling of the Dean Road junction, which is currently underway and then the completion of the 'Greenway around Abington and joining up with the crossing over the A11. The work for this will start in November time on Newmarket Road, Abington.

Anaerobic Digestion Plant Proposals

In our area we have not one, but two live planning applications submitted to the relevant local authorities for bio energy digestion plants. These are plants that breakdown agricultural materials and turn them into energy. For reference there is one on the A505 between Royston and Baldock

The first application is located just over the Suffolk border outside of Haverhill and off the A1307. The site runs up the Cambridgeshire border and ends at the edge of West Wickham/Weston Colville. You may have seen signs for the anti-lobbying group 'Muck Off Acorn' - this refers to this application. As the application is in Suffolk it will be Suffolk County Council that will make the decision on this but whilst the time for public comments has closed, you can still look at the plans and write to the case office dealing with the application – andy.rutter@suffolk.gov.uk

He makes up the boxes and distributes them to shops, pubs & schools. After Remembrance Sunday he col-

lects the boxes and ensures the donations get to the Royal British Legion, so these most important funds can be put to work.

Not only that, but he stands for hours as a poppy seller himself. (I have seen him standing in the rain doing this). It is Lawrence who puts the remembrance crosses in front of our war-memorial, and on the individual graves of those who gave their lives for our Country and our Freedoms.

His is a perfect example of, what the Rector Paul Seaton-Burn, was talking about in his sermon during the Remembrance Sunday Service – volunteering is a doing word. In volunteering for selling poppies, or doing SpeedWatch, being in the church choir, being on the committee of a local club, helping with the ACEs, being a Parish Councillor – all of these make the Community - and make you a part of the Community. You make friends and make a difference.

Lawrence has certainly made that difference over the years. Thank you Lawrence.

PS He will still be selling poppies, just not doing all the hard work that is involved in the co-ordinating role.


As to non-sporting activities; please do enquire if you would like to organise some sort of event that could use the space and the Parish Council will discuss how this would work and an approprate fee.

Planning & Meeting Update October/November 2023

PLANNING officers (or committee members) have to consider the pros and cons of all applications that they receive and make their decision based on whether the benefits of a proposal outweigh the harms caused, or whether the harm would be too great to allow the application to proceed. Considerations include:

• The principle of development – is the use or function right for the site?

• Layout – is everything on the plan in the "right" place?

• Scale and massing – is the proposal the right size for the site? Does it fit with its surroundings? Will it cause unreasonable overshadowing or loss of daylight or sunlight?

• Design – does it fit the context it is in, and will it enhance the local area?

• Listed buildings and conservation areas – is the proposal appropriate with regard to heritage, including listed buildings, scheduled ancient monuments or other heritage assets nearby?

• Green space and biodiversity - does the proposal enhance biodiversity, are trees and hedges affected and is any proposed green space well-designed to be functional and safe?

• Has the applicant considered local wildlife or protected species such as bats, badgers, owls, great crested newts and birds?

- Streets and roads onsite, will they be safe and usable for all intended users? And how will existing transport networks
- Are public rights of way going to be enhanced or affected?
- Is there enough cycle and car parking? Refuse and storage
- · Will there be noise, fumes or smell that may impact surrounding homes or businesses?
- Are there any local surface water, foul water drainage and flooding issues?
- Will signage, external lighting or advertisements affect the

We would like to highlight the two applications for Anaerobic Digestion Plants that have been submitted in our area: The first is in Streetly End, West Wickham Cambridgeshire

County Council will decide this application – comments can be made on the CCC Planning portal – reference CCC/23/110/FUL The second is just over the border in Suffolk, but the site

stretches to the edge of West Wickham/Weston Colville. The reference on the Suffolk County Planning Portal is SCC/0045/23SE. Comments can still be made until a decision is taken.

Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE):

The start of this scheme is now in sight. On the 24th November the CPE scheme should have been laid before Parliament. As many other CPE schemes have been approved across the country, we hope the scheme for South Cambridgeshire has received the same approval. Once approved, there will be a three week District wide publicity campaign, followed by six weeks when drivers committing parking offences will receive formal warning notices. Once this period has ended, the start of February), Penalty Charge Notices will be issued.

The team from SCDC and CCC were asked why this "gentle' approach is being taken, rather than a tougher stance. Their answer was that it is fairer to drivers to give them plenty of time to change their behaviour before handing out the penalties. The participants showed surprise (or disbelief!) that only two Civil Enforcement Officers (CEOs) are initially to be employed for the whole of the South Cambs area. The scheme can operate up to 7 days a week and that it should become self-financing in the long term.

It is worth noting that some enforcement responsibilities will remain with the police. These include:

Obstructive Parking, Dangerous Parking, Footway parking where there are no restrictions in place, Parking in a cycle lane where there are no other restrictions in place. Cllr Kate Kell
