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UFO lands in **Chalklands**

ALINTON couple were beft in disbelief as their home CCTV system captured a brightly lit object falling from the night sky. Alice Carder and her partner happened to be watching live as a bright object streaked across the video screen. After a recent spate of thefts in Chalklands, the couple had switched on the live feed of their doorbell mounted camera when they heard a car pull up outside late at night. What happened next would astound them. Alice said "We both gasped, and I was initially scared as my first thought was that it was an aircraft falling from the sky." But, after hear-ing no noise, the couple thought that it must have been a shooting star instead. It was only after reviewing the footage that they realised the object had ac-tually landed nearby. "We had heard about the meteor that landed in a

driveway up north back in March, but never anything around here," Alice said, "We didn't think that the recording had saved, but luckily it had, and so we were able to show friends and family.

The Linton News contacted Jim Rowe of the UK Fireball Alliance, a group who monitors meteorite activity. "From the

looks of the footage it could well have been a meteor" Jim said, although he cautioned that fireworks can sometimes be to blame. Asked whether there would be any trace left of the object, Jim thought that it would be unlikely, saying that "total disintegration" was the most common result. Undeterred, the couple went out the next morning to look for traces, but found nothing. "I uploaded the video to

Facebook and had a few people contact me to say they had also seen and heard strange events at night in recent months, Alice said. We urge Lintonians to keep their eyes on the sky, who knows what will be visiting us next.

Local elections to go ahead in May

The following elections are coming up on 6th May 2021: Police and Crime Commissioner Elections, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority Mayoral Elections

and Peterborough Combined Authority Mayoral Elections and Cambridgeshire County Council Elections. The Linton ward polling station will be, as usual, in the Village Hall. If residents wish to have a postal or proxy vote, they can apply for one by getting an application form from the SCDC website, or by calling 03450455214. Full information will also be provided when polling cards are sent out. The deadline to apply to vote by post or amend an existing postal vote is 5pm, 11 working days before polling day. The deadline to apply for a proxy vote is 5pm, five working days before polling day. In special circumstances an emergency proxy can be applied for after the deadline for appointing normal proxy has closed. The provision for emergency proxies mal proxy has closed. The provision for emergency proxies has now also been extended to include those who are having to isolate due to COVID-19, and those displaying COVID-19 symptoms on nolling day symptoms on polling day.

us know as soon as possible. We are currently vaccinating patients in cohorts 5 and 6. Some of you may receive a letter inviting you to a vaccina-tion centre, and others may receive a text or telephone call inviting you to an appointment at Granta Sawston. NHS England are starting to contact

patients that fall into cohort 7 (over 60 years old) and cohort 8 (over 55 years old). You will receive a letter direct from NHS England giving you further instructions about how to book your vaccination. May we take this opportunity to remind everyone that, if you have booked a vaccine appointment but are not going to attend, please let us know as soon as possible so that we can offer your vaccine to someone else.

We appreciate that everyone wants to know when their appointment will be, and we are working as fast as possible to get through our patient lists. Contacting us before being invited however, will not make this process move any faster. Please bear with us as our team continues to work incredibly hard to deliver the vaccine into our community. 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

Manners please dearest

DAVID Allen, our speaker, gave a tongue-in-cheek look at the extraordinary world of Victorian etiquette, the rigid rules which bound society together. He asked us to imagine ourselves in corset and crinoline which were sometimes 6 feet in diameter. Eminent Harley Street physicians advised corsets were vital to support the internal organs. Waists would be reduced by 1 inch per month until the desired target of 15 inches was achieved. David took us through how to sit in a crinoline (knees and ankles together, back straight, hands clasped in your lap), the art of deportment (he had us walking with a book on our heads) and curtseying. When preparing for courtship, attention should be paid to your skin. Worryingly, arsenic was considered essential for a healthy skin. A lady should cultivate essential skills such as dancing and small talk - never anything serious such as religion or politics. It was important to find the right husband – when she married, a lady's rights were handed over to her husband. Divorcing could only be by Act of Parliament – only 322 divorces in one particular year. At a ball, a lady had to be introduced formally, a gentleman could only kiss her hand or maybe her cheek. Before proposing, a gentleman would present a lady with a flower. David showed us how to use a fan to flirt e.g. tapping the right cheek means 'yes', closed fan means 'do you love me?' and fan over the ear means 'go away'. After a lady had accepted a suitor she could visit his home only after leaving a calling card. The visit must be no more than 10 minutes. If found suitable the lady should be invited to a dinner party. Gentlemen would remain standing until the ladies are seated. Married couples were never seated together There would be a bewildering array of cutlery to negotiate and a typical banquet would consist of ten courses. Ladies should remember their corsets and only nibble at each course. She

must stop eating when her hosts do so.

Anderson Trust 2021 grant allocations

THE Anderson Trust was established in 1998 as a result of the sale of Church Cottage in Linton, the former home of Professor Charles and Mrs Mary Anderson. According to the terms of the Trust Deed the purpose of the Trust is to promote the Christian religion in and from the Parish of St Mary's, Linton; to sustain the Church of St Mary's and worship therein; to promote education for the benefit of those living in or resorting to Linton, particularly for the benefit of the Church School and of religious teaching in Linton and for any other charitable purpose for the benefit of those living in or resorting to Linton.

At a meeting of the Trustees, held virtually on March 1st, £8910 interest, received from investments, was approved, according to the priorities stipulated in the Trust Deed, for distribution to the following applicants: £5000 to the Beacon Youth Trust towards the salary and on-costs of a Youth Worker; £1010 to St Mary's Church towards the purchase of resources for children and families work and a refurbished laptop; £1000 to Linton Infant School PTFA for the upgrade of IT resources; £800 to Granta School towards sensory equipment for the swimming pool; £600 to Linton Book Festival towards the purchase of books for the Linton schools and £500 to Linton Village Cricket Club towards the purchase of a batting cage. A grant to Linton Infant School for £800 towards the development of a wildlife area was also awarded by a private donation, made through the Anderson Trust.

Discovering the Great Fen

ONE of the things on offer to budding naturalists during lock-down has been the Wildlife Trust evening zoom/webinar sessions. I attended one called The Great Fen, provided by Beds, Cambs and Northants Wildlife Trust, and found it extremely interesting. I have been to the Great Fen a few times, and resolve to go more often in the future. It is a huge area, and quite an alien landscape for us South Cambs residents. There are just miles and miles of flat and wild fen, interspersed with

farmland and some woodland. It makes Wicken Fen seem small in comparison. So what is it? The Great Fen is a 50 to 100 year project to transform the landscape of the fens between the mainline railway east of Peterborough and Huntingdon, including what was Whittlesea Mere, once the largest lake in lowland England. In the past the wild fens stretched for hundreds of miles across

Eastern England, but starting in the 17th century the land was drained to create peat rich farmland, and 99% of the wild fen disappeared.

The only remaining fragments were Woodwalton Fen and Holme Fen, and these two areas were too small and isolated to continue to support the special fenland wildlife that had survived

Secondly and more recently the drainage and farming practices have contributed to a rapid peat decline, leading to unsustainable farming and therefore a risk to local livelihoods. Peat loss is of course bad for the environment as it causes carbon dioxide to be released into the atmosphere. Something had to happen.

The Great Fen vision is to create a new wetland landscape around and between Holme and Woodwalton. As a result of many organisations working together, huge fundraising efforts and help

from the Lottery, the project now owns 55% of the area, and restored areas are providing a haven for wetland wildlife. It is one of the largest restoration projects of its kind in Europe and the plan is to create a living landscape of 3,700 hectares, around 14 square miles, for wildlife and for recreation, education and business. It will incorporate areas where winter flood waters can

be stored, and will help prevent further loss of carbon dioxide as the peat will be protected. It will support a variety of specialised fen

wildlife, and link local communities with WHITE P a network of paths, cycleways and bridle paths. Through education and outreach programmes to children and interested groups, the project hopes to celebrate and preserve fen heritage. It is an ambitious project needing long term thinking and determined in-

dividuals working with many different organisations. One of its aims is to gain UNESCO Biosphere Reserve Status, using science and technology to assist with developing a sustainable future for its soil, water and people.

It is very easy to sit back in a slough of despond about the environment. But here, nearly on our doorstep, is a truly great inspiration to all of us. There is an App called The Great Fen, which tells you all about the project, has maps and field guides, and photos and descriptions of the many species now found there. Roll on spring and freedom to get back out there.

ACCORDING to Wikipedia, 'A Protestant chapel was built in Little Abington towards the end of the 19th century. It closed in late 2019 and the land has now been sold. A1307 Update

While much of school life tends to be typified by fairly rigid structures, the last few months have exemplified just how adaptable the school community has been.

Students and staff have become accustomed to staggered timetables and a range of new rou-tines to keep learning and stay as safe as possible in school. While the College remained closed to most students, teachers acclimatised to delivering all timetabled lessons online. Both they and their classes become proficient with using technology to ensure learning continuity. Issuing devices donated by families and Cambs Youth Panel, as well as those issued by the government has enabled our students to be equipped to access learning from home. Our live lesson attendance was more than 80%; the narrative of lockdown 'lost learning' certainly doesn't reflect the experience of LVC students.

Returning to school has enabled everyone to benefit from re-establishing face to face learning routines and reconnecting with each other. Hearing the school alive with the sound of stu-

dents and staff again has been brilliant. Adaptation has continued with students adjusting amazingly well to wearing face masks in lessons and engaging responsibly with our rapid mass testing roll out. The transformation of our sports hall into an Asymptomatic Testing Centre, led very capably by our Sports Centre Manager, Sam Pollard, has been remarkable. As have the efforts of our team of testing volunteers from our staff and community volunteers. Over forty members of our parent body stepped forward to offer their support as testing assistants. The slick and welcoming operation has been a real triumph. Supporting the school's reopening, processing 2,572 Lateral Flow Tests have identified some positive Covid-19 cases would have otherwise been undetected. Staff and students are now accustomed to testing themselves twice weekly at home.

I have been astonished and extremely proud of the resilience of our young people, by the sup-port of their families and the commitment of LVC staff to make remote learning and school reopening a success. We look forward to the return of more customary routines as well as continuing to evolve practices that have proven to be really beneficial in these exceptional times.

Tree Works Rules, Regulations and Roots!

IN THE MARCH edition of the Linton News the Parish Council reported on the planting of some additional trees in the village. This leads us on to further information for residents on all aspects of tree care.

Many trees in our village are subject to a TPO, a Tree Preservation Order. These are issued by the local planning authority to protect a specific tree, groups of trees or woodlands that are of significance in the village. If a tree has a TPO, and for any tree in a Conservation Area, with or without a TPO, permission must be sought from SCDC Trees Team, before work is carried out. Tree works are applied for via the Planning Department at CCDC Trees Team, before work of the SCDC Trees Team, before work is carried out. SCDC. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to £20,000. It's always wise to check!

Trees that are outside your property boundary are typically the responsibility of the adjacent landowner, however, on some occasions they are the riperian duty of the homeowner. If you are unsure who is responsible for trees near your property please contact the Parish Council office for further advice

If you have trees adjoining your property which need prun-ing, you are legally permitted to remove overhanging branches. However, we recommend that you inform the owner of the tree before doing so. The prunings should be offered back to the tree owner, however if they do not want them it becomes your responsibility to dispose of them and they should not just be "put back over the fence".

It is worth noting that branch removal can lead to tree failure, due to disease or an imbalance causing the tree to become unstable and therefore it is advisable to employ a competent tree surgeon to carry out and take on the liability for the work. We can give contact details for several Tree Surgeons, please contact the office.

Tree work should not be undertaken during the nesting season of birds, which means that between March and August tree and hedgerow extensive work should be avoided. You may have missed the opportunity this year, please put a note in your diary to address issues from September through to February, pruning of trees and hedgerows really is an Autumn/Winter job.



ceased temporarily on the site following a stop notice issued by SCDC, due to failure to comply with conditions. The recent TTRO over ran by several days and the developer will face fines. The Lead Local Flood Authority recommends refusal of the surface water drainage, as the varying heights of the area would lead to permanent flooding. Foul water is planned to go into the sewer on Lonsdale then Bartlow Road, already at capacity. **Bartlow Road** S/1963/15/OL and S/2501/19/RM - Foul Water Drainage Condition 11 - had been refused as connection was to the overloaded sewer on Bartlow Road, specifically against the requirements of Condition 11. The developer has gone to appeal on 5 Discharge of Condition applications based on non-determination; probably because amendments are continually being received. A TTRO has been applied for to put in the footpath, this includes a section S50 for the connection to the sewer. The LPC needs to be very vigilant on any TTRO for Bartlow Road. SCDC Planning have been informed.

Paynes Meadow Appeal APP/W0530/W/20/03255359 for planning application S/0670/19/OL. Cllrs. Bald, Kell and Mannassi represented LPC with consultant Corrie Newell. A site visit was due to take place on 1st March 2021 by the Inspectorate. We put

up a strong case and await a decision!

LDPCall for Sites - The number of potential sites around Linton is very concerning, as it implies a desire for large scale develop-ment in an area with few resources. A mandate was given at Full Council that LPC should object to further development outside the village boundary. 13 specific objections were submitted in relation to individual sites. Local input on site suitability is required, with villages sharing their responses for a more uni-

Local Highways Improvement - Cllr Bald presented LPC submission for better signage, yellow lines to help solve parking issues, etc. This was supported by panel member Cllr Henry Batchelor. It is hoped that the Parish will be successful this time, as it has with many previous applications

Meeting of Haverhill Forum with James Palmer - Update on the innovative transport scheme for Cambridge, surrounding and feeder areas involving high quality mibility transport.

feeder areas involving high-quality public transport - the Cambridge Metro (CAM). CAM and GCP appear in conflict. Issues with GCP raised, with walking, cycling and NMU not extending east, rat running, unhelpful schemes submitted (e.g. west bound bus lane) with good schemes making slow progress (signalised Hildersham crossing, Bartlow Road travel hub, etc) New towns and further development would supply the funding for the CAM scheme (one between Linton and Horseheath). Post-Covid, work and lifestyles are changing and community needs require more consideration.

Rivey Lane - Meeting with SCDC regarding the state of trees, poor fences, litter on Rivey Lane and Cemetery. The ditch was re-dug by LPC to prevent flooding in cemetery, but needs to be done again as it is being filled with branches and garden waste. A1307 Villages Forum - Update on GCP/CSET (reported last month). The villages have seen very little benefit from the schemes but more rat running and traffic problems since the bus lanes went in. Safe active transport does not extend to Bartlow or Horseheath. LDP call for sites is a major concern, with Linton and Bartlow swamped and a new town just east. Lack of water and effect on valued landscape are major objections. First round of comments to be submitted and shared.

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Parish Council Minutes

ABBREVIATED minutes of the Meeting of Linton Parish Council held on Thursday 18th February 2021 Remote Meeting via video/ telephone conferencing. Apologies for Absence: None

Councillor Vacancies; There are now four vacancies for Co-option Chairman's Comment. The Chairman thanked the Vice Chairman for taking the meeting last month and thanked the office for all their hard work. Cllr Merrie Mannassi explained that due to recent events at other Parish Council meetings and a parishioner's comments there has been a change in procedure of the retention of the recording of meetings and confirmed that all recordings will be kept until the minutes are signed off. A recording can be made by anyone, and the office copy will be made available if requested by a member of the public.

Open Forum for Public Participation;

The Chairman invited a member of the public to speak regarding the proposal of a Medieval Theatre Event to be held on the Recreation Ground in September 2021. It was discussed and due to potential clashes with sporting fixtures, it was suggested that Camping Close should be visited and considered as an alternative location.

Clerks Report. Clerk gave an update on the Rivey Bridlepath. Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) have agreed to pay for the ditch to be cleared and the trench to be improved. Cllr Enid Bald and the Clerk met Sean Gentle from South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) to discuss the maintenance of the boundaries on properties belonging to SCDC and the rear fence and trees in the Cemetery for the necessary work to be carried out. The residents on Rivey Way are due to be contacted regarding their riparian responsibilities. Cllr Brian Cox requested that the Clerk contact the contractor to be made aware of the conduit and be careful, especially at the bottom of the ditch.

High Street Bench. Cllr Merrie Mannassi enquired if any new information had been received and was informed by the Clerk that a revised quote to install the bench on the left-hand side had been submitted by the contractor. There was not enough support from the Council to review the decision. The Chairman confirmed that the previous decision stands and that the bench would be installed to the left of the telephone box.

Planning.

Bartlow Road.

Clir E Bald confirmed that the Foul Water Drainage Condition - S/1963/15/COND11 – had been refused as the sewer on Bartlow Road did not meet the requirements of Condition 11. The developer has gone to appeal on 5 Discharge of Condition applica-tions based on non-determination. LPC will receive details in due course. The non-determination was felt to be because amendments are continually being received.

Horseheath Road.

Cllr Enid Bald informed the Council that work has continued despite conditions being refused, including surface water. It was expected that a stop notice was to be put on the site, but this had not happened yet. There have also been issues regarding the ransom strip, owned by SCDC. LPC had agreed that they had no issues with the easement over this land at the time it was agreed, however they did not agree the link to the drainage at this location. An adjacent resident has expressed serious concerns regarding this easement, and this is considered by the LPC to be a legal matter between the parishioner and the developer. The width of the ransom strip was also discussed as it was felt that maintenance allowance was insufficient. Cllr John Batchelor confirmed he is aware of the issues and that these are being addressed by SCDC. Cllr Enid Bald also stated that LPC had objected to the Planting scheme due to non-native species being proposed.

1 Horseheath Road.

Cllr Enid Bald stated that surface water issues had been reported to SCDC but there were no further comments at this time

Cllr Enid Bald confirmed that the planning application was going to appeal on 25th February and that three representatives from LPC would be present with CN Historic. Issues with effects on Landscape, Connectivity, Parking and more, these comments have been submitted and will be considered by the Inspectorate.

Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

Cllr Merrie Mannassi requested support from District Councillor John Batchelor who advised that LPC should make it clear that

they object to the extensive proposal of local development. Consideration for a resolution of the Parish Council position on local development to be submitted to GCLP. Cllr Kate Kell proposed that the LPC object to development of the proposed sites. Cllr. Amy Smith seconded. 9 in favour, 2 Abstention. Agreed. Cllr John Bald proposed that the additional reasons of not meeting the needs of the local community and that specific objections be raised in relation to each individual site. Cllr Enid Bald seconded. All Agreed.

Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr Kate Kell updated the Council that the Neighbourhood Plan is still underway and that SCDC have been advising LPC. It was noted that there is a grant available of up to £10,000 which LPC should apply for and that there is also free support for a Neighbourhood Design Guide which is not currently in the Neighbourhood plan but well worth considering. It is expected to take up to six months for the Neighbourhood Plan to reach approval referendum. District and County Councillors Report for February 2021. County & District Councillor Henry Batchelor added that vaccinations are available for those 70 years and older who are encouraged to book their appointment. Local Elections are going ahead in May. There are three, the County Council, the Mayor of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, and the Local Police Commissioner. Average speed cameras will be installed at the start of April 2021 on the A1307, between Horseheath and

Cllr Merrie Mannassi concurred that the LPC agree with the decision to replace the boiler in line with the request from the Cathodeon Centre Trustees. Cllr Amy Smith seconded. 10 in favour with 1 abstention. Agreed.

The Meadow Recreation Ground.

Skate Park. Cllr John Bald updated the Council and discussed the survey results, thanking the Assistant Clerk for her speed in producing a detailed report. A member of the public was invited to join the discussion and, having been involved in many Skate Park projects, offered help with the project from a user-based perspective. Cllr Chris Hine advised the Council that the supplier had requested design workshops and he requested the Topographical Reports for the area be sent to those involved. Under 8's and over 8's play area.

A pre- start meeting was arranged for 23.02.2021 for project management. Cllr John Bald and Cllr Lee Gardner to attend.

Bowling Green and Pavilion.

Following the meeting held on Tuesday 19th January 2021. Cllr Merrie Mannassi requested that the Clerk contact the LGFC secretary to arrange a remote meeting to discuss the future use of the Pavilion and the accommodation of the cadets as there were concerns raised from LGFC about the sharing of the facility with other clubs and groups.

Cllr John Bald proposed that as Chairman of the Council, Cllr Merrie Mannassi sign the documents. Cllr Kate Kell seconded. 9 in favour, 1 abstention. Agreed.
River Granta & Wildlife at Horn Lane Bridge.

The Chairman invited a member of the public to address the Council regarding this item on the agenda. The participant described an incident where a vehicle drove through the ford at speed and asked about protection for the wildlife and the River Granta. Cllr Brian Cox confirmed that the listed ford is an emergency access for the Church if Church Lane is blocked and it must be kept open. Cllr Enid Bald stated that the ford is a public highway, and it must not be blocked. Cllr Merrie Mannassi suggested a sign requesting awareness of the wildlife would be appropriate. Cllr John Bald requested that a sign be installed as it was felt that it would have some effect.
