England women's cricket captain comes to Linton



THE captain of the England women's cricket team rolled into Linton last month, with two of her teammates, to spend the day coaching promising young cricketers at Linton Village College and Granta School.

Charlotte Edwards MBE first played for England while she was still a teenager in Cambridgeshire. She led England to World Cup success in 2009 at both 20-over and 50-over cricket and is widely admired throughout the game. As well as continuing to play

cricket for England, she works as an ambassador for Chance to Shine, a charity which promotes cricket in schools. Her visit to Linton, with World Cup-winning colleagues Lydia Greenway and Beth Morgan, was organised by Chance to Shine.

The three cricketers spent an entire day coaching students in the nets, as well as signing autographs and photos. Everyone was impressed by their enthusiasm and positive attitude, and the girls who were lucky enough to meet them

came away inspired. 'It was an experience which I will never forget to have a coaching session with top-class England cricketers,' said Rebecca Livermore, 14, a member of the LVC year 10 girls' team which has won five indoor and outdoor county championships and came within a whisker of reaching a national final at Lord's last year.

'This is a fantastic reward for the many years of girls' cricket at LVC,' added head of PE John

Village hall improvements

A RECENT building audit of the village hall has revealed that a number of improvements need to be made to bring the building up to modern standards.

The hall is a village asset but these improvements are beyond the financial capabilities of the present trustees and as the hall is a registered charity, and therefore non-profit making, we have little in the way of financial reserves. We are therefore looking for suggestions as to a viable way forward.

An example of the work required includes a complete refurbishment of the kitchen to meet current health and safety and hygiene requirements. A copy of the full report can be inspected at the village hall by arrangement with the secretary.

It has been suggested in some quarters that any major housing development in the village might provide funds for a new hall, but in the trustees opinion any such funds are uncertain both as to timings and amount, and should not therefore be relied upon.

If the hall is to continue in use and be updated the village as a whole will need to contribute either ideas or money or both. We would therefore appreciate your suggestions to this end. These should be directed to the secretary at the village hall in Coles Lane or telephone 891001.

MEDICAL herbalist Julie Dore greeted the gardening club with its first ever health warning for slides, warning that we may become severely distressed by the images that followed. Fortunately I was safe as the weeds displayed during her fascinating talk, 'One person's weed is another's medicine', are to be found growing abundantly in my garden!

Many common weeds including dandelion, daisy, nettle, stickyweed, plantain, shepherd's purse, ground ivy and even the dreaded couch grass are all things to be glad of in your garden in the eyes of Julie. Each plant was covered in terms of its nutrients, edibility and health benefits. Salads may never look the same! However, before reaching for a colander in which to dispose of your weeds, check that you have correctly identified an edible weed or dire consequences may await.

A handy hint if you are being eaten alive one summer's evening in the garden is to rub the broken leaves of herb robert on your skin. The juice is a natural insect repellent, though it may not be the sweetest scent in the garden.

Fortunately the rain held off for the plant sale which was a wonderful success. Thank you to everyone who generously gave their time, plants and produce to make this possible.

Thieves target car tools in series of break-ins

LINTON seems to have had a bit of a crime series from 16th -17th of April when vehicles were broken into and it would appear that on these occasions tools were the target.

There were four separate crimes reported during this period. We subsequently carried out high visibility patrols and conducted numerous stops.

Also in April, a burglary was reported at a utility premises on Back Road, Linton. The rear door appears to have been kicked in and an alarm ripped off the wall. No goods were stolen.

Burglars also struck again at the village hall a few days later. They managed to get in but this time our offenders left some blood behind for us. This will be checked against our national database and further investigations carried out.

The day after the village hall crime, a further burglary was reported in Coles Lane, when a house was broken into and jewellery stolen.

Wasting your day on journey of discovery

CAMBRIDGESHIRE county council would like to thank residents throughout the county for recycling 54 per cent of your waste, putting us well above the national average of 39 per cent and on track to meet our target of 60 per cent by 2020.

You may have heard of problems at the Mechanical Biological Treatment (MBT) plant in Waterbeach, built to separate and process black bag waste.

When working the plant pulls out items which can be processed, halving the volume of waste sent to landfill and also captures greenhouse gas emissions.

Unfortunately this machine suffered serious mechanical failure in September 2012. Work is underway on the new parts required to rebuild the machinery and to prepare the plant for installation, due for completion before the end of 2013.

The breakdown at the MBT only affects black bag waste and we urge you to continue to recycle as much

as possible through your normal household recycling service. This reduces both the amount of waste going to landfill and demand on natural resources.

Be assured that the Private Finance Initiative contract the county council has in place with the MBT contractor means the authority, and therefore council tax payers, are protected from any additional costs incurred by the breakdown.

Find out more about the 'Journey of Waste' at the annual recycling open day from 10am-4pm on Saturday 13th July at AmeyCespa's Waterbeach site, just off the A10 between Cambridge and Ely.

Take a guided coach tour of the site; join a walking tour of the new materials recycling facility; enjoy plant and vehicle displays; find out how to reuse and recycle more of your waste and join in activities for all the family. Entry is free.

Full marks for Linton care scheme

Making People *Smile*
MEARS Care, who provide care to 42 people living in their own flats at Nichols Court in Linton, have just been awarded full marks by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) the body that inspects and regulates care services in England.

In an unannounced routine inspection the CQC assessed the team who provide personal care to residents. The following five areas were assessed: respecting and involving people who use services, care and welfare, management of medicines, staffing and assessing and monitoring the quality of service provision. CQC awarded Mears top marks in each of these categories.

The CQC spoke with people who use the service with one person stating: "The care staff give is very good, they fall over backwards to help". Another commented: "Staff are very good, very helpful and very patient".

The CQC report following the visit stated that staff were recruited well, with all required checks in place before they started their employment. Staff undertook a thorough induction, which included working alongside experienced staff and undertaking training in relevant topics so that they were equipped to carry out their role. Care planning documents were written in a personalised way and gave staff detailed guidance on the care each person required to meet their needs. Charlotte Whitehouse, Care Manager at Nichols Court said: "The team work really hard to provide the best possible care and support. We are delighted that the CQC has recognised what we do and has awarded us top marks".

Mobile warden service

THE Linton Community Warden Service provides support to people aged 60 and above enabling them to live independently, whether in their own homes or in sheltered accommodation and now residents in Chalklands, Palmers Close, Tower view, Nichols Court etc can join the scheme, too.

The service can be on an ongoing basis or for temporary periods eg following hospital discharge or when the family is away.

The scheme is professionally run. It is managed by Age UK Cambridgeshire and is funded by Linton ACE's and our local councils with a small charge to the client.

The warden makes contact with the client every weekday, either by a personal visit or by telephone. From this, it can be established what assistance is needed - potentially preventing a crisis from occurring.

The service helps clients to feel secure, knowing that they will have support and regular contact with a familiar face. It also gives their families peace of mind.

The Warden can assist with:

- regular contact and a listening ear
- information and guidance
- checking and helping with safety and security
- collecting prescriptions
- small items of shopping
- making drinks and light meals
- feeding pets, watering plants and similar help


As sun descends without a breeze, with light lost due to blooming trees, 'tis more lively things we've come to see that have us bending on our knees.

What is happening with Linton post office?

ON 12th March Linton post office was bought by Sweet Talk News. Linton post office provides service to over 6,000 people including nearby villages

POT POURRI 99

The French holes left unfilled

DURING the French revolution, soldiers were made to dig holes, then fill them in again.

WHEN Linton Village College first opened in 1937 it was equipped with a number of contemporary features which included metal Crittall windows. The windows were a revelation. The ones surrounding the bowling green were hinged to fold out, allowing children to spill out onto the steps underneath. They brought a sense of light and space to the classrooms, something previously unheard of in school design. This feature really suited the rural children of our villages who enjoyed the outdoors and fresh air.

As the years passed the windows rusted, hinges became broken, the paint peeled away and attempts to patch them up resulted in fused doors and unworkable fittings. When I became principal the windows were in poor repair, rooms were draughty in the winter, hot in the summer and the peeling paintwork was an eyesore. However as they were listed they had to be replaced with like for like which would cost half a million pounds and that was simply not affordable.

Once the new building work was completed in 2011, we had the frames meticulously filled and painted, so at least they did not look so dreadful but the practical flaws remained.

Imagine my delight, therefore, when a bid to the government for their replacement was successful as was a bid to replace all the flat roofs. In addition money raised by the friends of Linton Village College will allow the hall to be re-plastered and painted. It will be lovely to see the old building get the attention it deserves, once more.

Linton military medals

PRINCE Charles recently came to East Anglia to present medals for bravery to soldiers who had served in Afghanistan. Many medals were awarded to Linton servicemen during the Great War and to some from nearby villages. One soldier from Balsham, Captain Raymond Evelyn Head, stood head and shoulders above all others for his outstanding bravery.

He was the youngest son of Dr Robert Head, the Balsham GP. He was home on leave from India where he served in the Assam Regiment of the Indian Army. When the war broke out in 1914 he immediately joined the Royal Dragoons as an officer and later moved to the Royal Liverpool regiment. He married in November 1915 and the couple had a son.

In mid 1916 Captain Head served in the Ypres area and in June 1916 took part with the Canadians in the successful storming of the German stronghold on Vimy Ridge.

This is now an important Canadian memorial site. Captain Head was awarded the Military Cross (MC) for "conspicuous gallantry when leading his bombing party in an attack on the German trenches. When he could proceed no further he made three blocks in their trenches and held out under heavy fire until he was ordered to retire." He was badly wounded in the attack and returned to England to recuperate. Having briefly served in Ireland he returned to the Western Front in May 1918

when he was again wounded.

In August 1918 the Liverpool regiment was moved to the Somme sector and for his actions at Delville Wood he was awarded a bar to his MC for "conspicuous gallantry and leadership in a raid on the German trenches." He was pinned down for two nights and at great personal risk selected routes for future attacks. Captain Head was again badly wounded but commended by his commander for the splendid leadership of his men. He was shipped back to England and died in a military hospital at Hounslow on 24th November 1918.

Captain Head was awarded a second Military Cross, the Bar signifying the two awards. Before the war he was well known locally as a good athlete, cricketer and tennis player.

Many Lintonians had been awarded the Military Medal and the Military Cross but none had been wounded so often or were recommended so many times for their outstanding bravery.

After the war the Head family moved to Watford where his widow Margaret brought up her young son.

The only Linton man awarded the MC for his bravery in storming a German redoubt in the Somme area – a concrete bunker with machine gun slits – in September 1916 was 32 year-old Arthur Victor Dyson of the Coldstream Guards. He had been at the Front for one year before his death. His father Edward was manager of Linton Co-op.

Chef's corner

Pasta carbonara

- 8 bacon rashers
- 500g pasta
- 4 eggs
- 1¼ cups cream
- ½ cup parmesan

Remove the bacon rind and cut into thin strips. Cook over medium heat until crisp. Drain on paper towel.

Cook the pasta in a large pan of rapidly boiling salted water until al dente. Drain well and return to the pan. Beat the eggs, cream and parmesan together and season well. Stir in the bacon. Pour over the hot pasta in the saucepan and toss gently until the sauce coats the pasta. Return to a very low heat and cook for about 1 minute or until the sauce thickens. Don't increase the heat or the eggs will scramble.

Season with black pepper and serve immediately with extra grated parmesan.

Charity football match raises over £500 for Parkinson's UK

THE fifth annual charity football match in memory of Alf Hughes from the village took place on Sunday 28th April on the Linton recreation ground. A good crowd turned out to watch Linton Granta vets win 2-1 with a last minute header by Alan Jones following strikes from Ashley Dellow and Jonathan Milne.

A post match BBQ and

raffle, along with player match fees and generous contributions from Linton Granta football club, Aztecs Junior football club and Crem Recruitment helped to raise £568. The event has now raised just short of £2,000, which has gone to help Parkinson's UK (parkinsons.org.uk) find a cure for the disease.

Alf was heavily involved

with boys' football in the village before his life was cut short by Parkinson's in 2008. Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition that affects one in 500 people in the UK.

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

Parish Council Matters Chairman's annual report

Parish Council Matters is written, edited and published by the Parish Council with the support of the Linton News Team.

THE parish council chairman's annual report was as follows:

Recreation ground & pavilion

Last May the rules for the recreation ground parking were finalised and adopted, and parking provision at Linton village college was received the next month. The recreation ground is now included in the QEII Fields Challenge Jubilee Fields scheme.

Linton Granta football club required a 10 year lease for grant applications and this was agreed last month.

Late last year it was agreed to update the CCTV system at the pavilion. Cllr Penfold took the lead role for this and we now have a much more sophisticated system.

Allotments

Also last May there was a public meeting held to discuss the need for allotments and for the parish council to provide the land for allotments. In June the allotment association was formed. Also in the summer it was agreed, together with advice from South Cambridgeshire district council (SCDC), not to continue with negotiations for either previously offered site as both landowners were asking way beyond the amount that a public body could reasonably pay, even with a hefty premium added. All previously confidential information was then put into the public domain.

In November the allotment association gave the parish council their preferred site ... the field adjacent to Lonsdale along the Horseheath Road. The parish council then learned the same piece of land, identified by the allotment association and owned by the Diocese of Ely, was being closely looked at for development.

The Diocese was informed of our interest in the land for allotments, and it was discussed by the Diocese of Ely investment committee. They arranged a meeting with the parish council for March, but this was subsequently cancelled by them. The current situation is that the parish council has agreed to compulsory purchase the land, but must receive an official written response of decline from the Diocese for purchase of the land. For this a valuation must take place. In the meantime, the latest we have heard from the Diocese is that they are sympathetic to our allotment needs, but are waiting comments from Cambridgeshire county council (CCC) highways about any potential development.

20mph

In June CCC highways drew up the proposed plans for the 20mph speed limit for the High Street and one-way system. The speed limit came into force in November.

Play equipment

David Walker continued in his quest of updating and replacing and providing new play equipment. David secured grants from

various sources, and also received a contribution of £1,065 from the Dangerous Dad's group. The official opening for the new play equipment was held in September, and many residents and children and parish councillors attended. Again I would like to acknowledge the effort put in by David on this project, and it shows just how much can be done by individuals in conjunction and with the backing of the parish council.

Youth services

In January there was a presentation from the Rev Dr Steve Griffiths, and the parish council continues to support and be in partnership with the Beacon Trust to provide non-faith youth services and outreach work.

Bus services

Local bus services are being looked at due to cuts from CCC. Although the number 13 service is not being directly affected, other local services feeding into it and being used by Linton residents are. The meetings are still continuing, Cllr Wakley is representing Linton parish council and I and other local councillors are participating. There will be another public consultation and meeting very soon.

A1307

This parish council is heavily involved in the A1307 steering group, with me, Cllr Cornell, Cllr Manley and Cllr Champion all participating at some point. The outcome of the meeting is well documented, but I would like to thank Cllr Cornell for all her help in the preparation for the meeting.

Housing

Linton is preparing for an expansion in its social housing stock. SCDC are building four one-bedroom houses in Chalklands, and Hundred Houses have been granted permission to build on the old police station site. I, along with others on the parish council, welcome affordable housing for the village, but have concerns about the extra traffic this particular development will generate on the A1307.

Grants

The parish council has received grants from SCDC of £1,000 for tree planting and £500 towards the cleaning and restoration of the war memorial.

Speed checks

The parish council requested monitoring equipment for Back Road, Horseheath Road and Balsham Road. The results have only recently been received, but initial analysis suggests severe speeding and rat-running.

Public consultations

Following the successful consultation last year on recreation ground parking, the parish council is currently seeking consultation on width restrictions in Back Road and parking outside the Co-op. The consultations finish at the end of April and the two issues will be looked at again by the parish council in May.

ABBREVIATED minutes of an extraordinary meeting of the parish council held upstairs at the village hall on Thursday 4th April 2013.

Present: R Hickford (chairman), Ms E Cornell, Ms T Hunt, B Manley, G Potter, P Poulter, K Wakley, Mrs A Walker, Mrs J Wilson and Mrs S Parry (clerk). One member of the public was also in attendance.

Apologies for absence: Councillors Champion, Cox and Mannassi. Councillors Bald, Dew and Penfold were also absent.

Matters arising from the minutes of the meeting held on 21st March: Under the pavilion lease update item, Cllr Manley confirmed that a copy of the draft lease had been sent to the Football Association to support the bid for funding. Cllr Manley also reported that a capital grant of £18,094 had been proposed from South Cambridgeshire district council (SCDC) for the pavilion refurbishment.

Consideration of the options available to resolve an administrative error whereby the Localised Council Tax Support Scheme (LCTSS) was not deducted from the final precept figure requested from SCDC: To fund the LCTSS the government will give the local authorities a new fixed grant equivalent to 90% of the cost of the current benefit scheme. For this coming financial year the district council would pay 100% of the shortfall as a grant to parishes to compensate for the loss in tax base. Next year it would only be funded 75% of the shortfall and nothing the year after. The shortfall figure for Linton was £9,792 as calculated by SCDC.

As a consequence £9,792 had been over claimed resulting in an extra average council tax increase of £5.88 per household over the year – around 11p per week based on a Band D house.

To address the error SCDC had advised that one of the following options was available: 1) SCDC could invoice everyone again and this would cost the parish around £8,000. 2) SCDC could refund everyone and this would cost around £2,000, but would be complicated due to those moving in and moving out of the village during the year. 3) The parish council could decide to raise the precept by £9,792.

After much discussion Cllr Potter proposed that the precept be raised by £9,792 to £168,128. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Wakley and resolved by the meeting.

Cllr Cornell proposed that £9,792 be ring fenced to be spent on community projects and not on normal council business. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Hunt and resolved by the meeting.

It was agreed that an article be written for the Linton News to fully explain how the error had occurred, the options available and the parish council decision.

ABBREVIATED minutes of the meeting of the parish council held upstairs in the village hall on Tuesday 23rd April 2013.

Present: R Hickford (chairman and district councillor), Mrs E Bald (vice chair), D Champion, Ms E Cornell, Mrs S Dew, Ms T Hunt, P Poulter, K Wakley and Mrs S Parry (clerk). Mrs K France (press) was also in attendance with two members of the public.

Apologies for absence: Councillors Cox, Manley, Potter, Walker and Wilson. Councillors Mannassi and Penfold were also absent.

Consideration and approval of statement of accounts and annual governance statement: The statement of accounts for year ending 31st March 2013 was approved and signed. The annual governance statement for year ending 31st March 2013 was completed and signed.

Allotments update: The clerk had issued a report following guidance from the South Cambridgeshire district council (SCDC) legal department. A quotation had been requested and received from the district valuer for the land adjacent to Lonsdale. Cllr Cornell proposed that council accept the quotation to deliver a report within approximately four weeks of instruction at a cost of £550+VAT. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Wakley and resolved by the meeting.

Written reports: The following written reports were noted: Tree warden meeting and tree policy from Cllr Bald. Village hall

from Cllr Hunt. Notes on the meeting with residents of Dovehouse Close by the clerk.

Correspondence received for consideration: Cambridgeshire ACRE had given notice of a reduction in government funding resulting in redundancies and changes to their services.

The Friends of the Roman Road and Fleam Dyke had requested a link to the parish council website. Cllr Cornell thought this to be an excellent idea and proposed that this be agreed. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Hunt and resolved by the meeting.

A resident of Paynes Meadow had requested a reduction to the height of two trees in Rivey Lane which were shading her garden. Advice had been sought from Karen Champion - county council rights-of-way officer, Roz Richardson - SCDC tree officer and Rob Mungovan - SCDC ecology officer. They had advised that SCDC did not own the land and therefore they could not give permission. Rob Mungovan had advised that no work should be undertaken until the nesting period was over. It was agreed to investigate who owned the land and to report back to council.

ABBREVIATED minutes of the meeting of the parish council held at the Cathodeon Centre on Thursday 9th May 2013.

Present: R Hickford (chairman, district and county councillor), Mrs E Bald (vice chair), D Champion, Ms E Cornell, Dr B Cox, Mrs S Dew, Ms T Hunt, B Manley, P Poulter, K Wakley, Mrs A Walker, Mrs J Wilson and Mrs S Parry (clerk). Mrs K France (press) was also in attendance with seven members of the public.

Apologies for absence: Councillors Mannassi and Potter. Cllr Penfold was also absent.

Chairman's comments: Cllr Hickford reported that he would be stepping down as chair and as a member of the parish council and this was his last meeting.

Public participation: A resident of Bakers Lane, referring to the minutes of 21st March, asked what could be done regarding the condition of Bakers Lane as it was not known who was responsible for its upkeep. The clerk would contact the county council rights-of-way and access team to try to determine ownership.

Consideration of the minutes of the planning meeting held on 23rd April: These were noted. Under the decision notice for S/0292/13/FL, 30 High Street, condition 5 stated that no more than four seats within the shop and two seats outside the shop would be permitted for the consumption of food and/or drink on the premises. Cllr Manley asked what could be done to increase this amount of seating. The planning committee had already contacted South Cambridgeshire district council (SCDC) regarding this issue and the response had been that the condition was considered necessary as the amount of seating proposed was considered to be the maximum that could be accommodated under the A1 (retail) use applied for. If more seating was proposed this would need to be assessed as either a mixed use (A1 and A3 (restaurant/café)) or solely an A3 use. However the operator was aware that should they wish to increase the amount of seating they would need to apply for another change of use to the premises, where other issues would be considered including a covenant on the property that restricted its use.

Consideration of the revised code of conduct: Cllr Hunt proposed that it be adopted. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Bald and resolved by the meeting.

Consideration of the responses to the traffic consultations: These were discussed. **A) Co-op scheme:** Mr Malone, a resident of the High Street, believed that the main problem was the increased size of the Co-op delivery vehicles. Buses had to mount the kerb to pass and this was very dangerous. The Co-op was creating this nuisance resulting in a health and safety issue. When exiting Green Lane it was impossible to see any oncoming cars. In his opinion the only real solution was for the return to smaller vehicles and for enforcement of parking restrictions. Cllr Cox reported that Linton had the narrowest High Street in South Cambs and therefore low kerbs had been installed so that vehicles could mount the pavement if necessary. The chair stated that the installation of CCTV had been raised by some residents and if installed it would highlight the problem and show the need

for enforcement.

It was agreed to investigate CCTV in liaison with the police.

It was also agreed to arrange a meeting with the Co-op and their distributors, Mr Malone and Mr Foster representing the residents and Cllrs Champion and Manley.

B) Back Road scheme: Mr and Mrs Newble, residents of Back Road, believed that the main problem was not caused by agricultural vehicles but excessive speed and over the past 18 months by large vehicles connected to the recent developments in Back Road. They thought that a weight limit which excluded farm vehicles would be more beneficial. The chair replied that in the first instance the parish council had suggested a weight limit but as this was difficult to enforce the county council had suggested a width restriction. Cllr Cornell stated that SCDC must implement a planning policy to safeguard Back Road. The county council should raise the profile of Back Road in view of the high usage figures recently received and discourage rat running. Maintenance should be raised in line with usage. Cllr Manley suggested pull-in or passing areas with priority to oncoming vehicle signs. It was agreed that county councillor Hickford would investigate a weight limit and priority and pull-ins.

Traffic, police and safety issues: The results of police speed counter tests in Horseheath Road, Back Road and Balsham Road were considered. Cllr Cornell agreed to work on the format of the information received to make it more user friendly. It was agreed to set up a meeting of the traffic working party and a police representative to discuss these figures and Cllr Champion would highlight the issue at the next police panel meeting.

The installation of carriageway markings instead of countdown signs in Hadstock Road following advice from the county council was considered. County councillor Hickford agreed to liaise with the county council highways department on this issue.

The clerk reported on the attempted break in at the parish council office on 11th April and confirmed that a man had been arrested. DNA evidence had led to his arrest from blood found at the scene and he would appear in court later that month. The Sawston police were thanked for their contact and support during this time.

Consideration of lease between the parish council and Linton Granta football club: This was signed. Cllr Manley reported that the football club had applied for grants for the pavilion refurbishment from the Football Foundation and Sport England, both for £50k.

Allotments: Confirmation had been received from the district valuer that the valuation report would be available for the next meeting on 23rd May. This would be discussed under confidential cover.

Written reports: The following written reports were noted: CPRE meeting on national character areas from Cllr Bald. Summary village college survey results from Cllr Walker. Cemetery meeting from Cllr Bald.

Correspondence received for consideration: Wicksteed Playscapes had asked for consideration of replacement or refurbishment of the aerial runway and to consider replacement of single point aerial swing following scheduled play equipment inspection by Zurich. Cllr Cornell proposed that a replacement trolley assembly be fitted at a cost of £961 (including fitting) and the single point swing be removed for safety reasons. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Wakley and agreed by the meeting.

The request from Aztecs football club to use the recreation ground on Friday 5th July was agreed subject to receipt of a risk assessment.

Update on designated area consultation with neighbouring parishes: Cllr Poulter reiterated the decision made at a previous meeting regarding possible collaboration with Hildersham and Bartlow parish councils for a neighbourhood plan. The clerk confirmed that Bartlow parish council was very happy to meet to discuss this. Cllr Poulter planned to attend the Hildersham parish council meeting when it would be discussed.
