# **Surviving Winter**

HEATING bills shouldn't leave anyone out in the cold. Cambridgeshire Community Foundation is calling on local residents to support its Surviving Winter Appeal – encouraging those who receive the Winter Fuel Allowance, but do not need it, to donate it to help vulnerable households stay warm this winter.

Across Cambridgeshire, 32,190 households are living in fuel poverty, according to a recent National Energy Action (NEA) report. This includes 6,009 in South Cambridgeshire (8.8% of households).

Nationally, the NEA estimates over 6 million households are in fuel poverty, with the average annual bill reaching £1,720 - almost £500 more than in 2021. Polling reveals that 49% of adults expect to ration their energy this winter; worryingly, 71% of adults with a heart condition and 64% of those with asthma say they are likely to ration heating this winter. Research shows that being cold can make a range of health problems worse.

The Surviving Winter Appeal provides practical help for those at risk, including older people, families with young children, pregnant women and people with health conditions. The Foundation partners with several local charities to distribute funds quickly and effectively. Michael O'Toole, Chief Executive of Cambridgeshire Community Foundation, said, "no one should have to choose between heating or eating, or be left struggling with huge bills. By donating, those who are able can help someone in their community stay warm, safe, and well

Our website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has many short articles, including some about various aspects of churches including bells, clocks, memorials, poppyheads, spires, towers and windows. We recently added an article about church fonts, some of which appears in the next few paragraphs.

Our local churches have a great variety of fonts, usually made of stone. For example . . .

St George's church in Anstey has an 11th-century font that is rare in that it is decorated with mermen (the male equivalent of mythical mermaids) holding their tails.

Thorley church has a 12th-century font. It was removed from the church and for many years was used as a drinking trough on a nearby farm before being reintroduced into the church in 1855. Its ornate cover was designed by George Gilbert Scott, a prolific architect known mainly for his work designing and renovating churches and cathedrals.



# **Thatching Past and Present**

OUR insurance company decided they no longer wanted to cover thatched houses, and it took us weeks to sort out an alternative. We had to install more smoke alarms, have the chimney swept twice a year, have fire extinguishers all over the house, agree not to have BBQs within five metres of the thatch, a roof inspection every ten years, and definitely no bonfires. Strangely enough, our open fireplace was completely acceptable, but a wood burner was not. There are between 50 and 80 thatched houses destroyed by fire annually, and these are mainly caused by wood burners and poor chimney maintenance. When you think of how many other fires there are, this is not that many. I thought I might take a look at thatching past and present to get a better picture.

If you've ever watched programmes about the Fens back in time, you will have seen thatched reconstructions. We have been thatching since the Bronze Age, using anything available, typically broom, heather, rush, cereals, bracken, palms, sedge, turf and reeds. Fast forward to more recent times, and it is Norfolk reed, water reed or long straw that is used in East Anglia. Until 1800, thatch was the only

roofing material available to most people, but from 1820 the coming of canals and railways meant more materials. Welsh slate changed everything. However, there are still around 60,000 thatched houses in the UK. In Holland there are 150,000, in case you thought it was a peculiarly British thing.

Mediaeval wheat grew to 1.8 metres, but especially following WW2, short stemmed wheat varieties proliferated, with the use of nitrogen fertiliser

actually weakening the straw while increasing the yield.
The Plant Variety and Seeds Act of 1964 further restricted growers, and now we import a lot of thatching materials from Eastern Europe. There are around 1,000 thatchers in

England. Most are employed by people who have moved into thatched houses and aren't allowed to change their roofs even if they wanted to. Three quarters of these houses are listed, and with the renewed interest in preserving historic buildings, and using sustainable materials, the story of thatch is likely to continue for millennia.

If you take a look along The Grip at the houses where the thatch overhangs the pavement, you have an excellent view of the layers of thatch. Each time the thatch is replaced, only the top section is removed, and the original, still dry and functional, remains. Each part of the country has different styles, but in every case the new thatch is bundled into what is called yealms, taken up to the roof, and then attached to the older part using spars, a staple made of twisted hazel.
The quality of the work done by thatchers is
instrumental in how long it will last. They need to be
made of strong stuff on their ladders when they put their arm into a hole and a rat jumps out! Birds like to look for grubs, and pull out straw for nests, while

rodents look for residual grain.

Thatch remains a durable, weather resistant, sustainable insulator, cool in summer and warm in winter. At an angle of more than 50 degrees, there is no water retention, and rain runs off before seeping in. It It also needs less timber as it is lighter than slates or tiles. It is expensive to do, as it is so labour intensive, but lasts between 30 and 50 years, depending on how well it is done.

You will be familiar with the artistry atop some thatched roofs, called finials, like at the Dog and Duck. My favourite is The Old Butchers Café in Balsham, where the dog is chasing some straw sausages.

## **District and County Councillors' Report - November 2025**

Local Government Re-organisation
THE process, as requested by central Government, to merge
District and County Councils into Unitary Authorities in England, is proceeding. The latest is that all local authorities in Cambridgeshire will have to submit their suggestions for how best

they see a new local government structure working in the county by the end of November. Several proposals are on the table, which are outlined below:

Option A:

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & East
- Fenland, Huntingdonshire & Peterborough.

- South Cambridgeshire & Cambridge City. East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, Fenland & Peterborough.

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & Huntingdonshire. Fenland, Peterborough & East Cambridgeshire.

- An expanded Peterborough.
- Fenland, East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, South Cambridgeshire & Cambridge City.

Option E:

- Huntingdonshire
- Fenland, Peterborough, South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City and East Cambridgeshire.

The local views are that the County Council have agreed to submit Option A to government and South Cambs and Cambridge City have agreed to submit Option B. Other local authorities may submit one of the other options but, at time of writing, this isn't

Once submitted, the government minister (or more likely a civil servant) will decide which configuration will work the best for the whole county.

The District Council has recently released its draft Local Plan. This is the development plan for the next 30 years and indicates the parcels of land in South Cambridgeshire that they feel can accommodate housing and commercial development to feed the population and economic growth during this time.

As previously reported, the major development in our area is a site north of Abington called Grange Farm, which can accommodate up to 6,000 new houses. This would be a significant development

in our area, as it would represent a new town, twice the size

The reason this is proposed here is that the location is deemed to be 'sustainable', as it's close to employment sites like Granta Park and Babraham Research Park, and is also located on major roads (the A1307 and A11).

A public consultation on this proposal, and all of the others in South Cambridgeshire, will be held over December and January more detail to follow on this.

New 'Forest City'

Some people have picked up on a locally promoted suggestion for a new 'Forest City' which is claimed to be able to house over 1 million new people. This is proposed on land between Newmarket and Haverhill. More detail can be seen here: https://www. forestcity.uk/

It's worth pointing out that this proposal has absolutely no legs. It's an unsolicited proposal by two unqualified individuals and carries no weight in planning terms. It's likely they are attempting to capitalise on the government's plans to expand Cambridge, but developments associated with this expansion will be properly drawn up and consulted on by an official development corporation not this 'Dragon's Den'-style pitch. So, in our opinion, this is

Linton Greenway

The Linton Greenway is progressing, albeit slowly. The next section that will move forward is the section between Linton Village College (LVC) and the recreation ground in Linton. Several options were considered, including Stantons Lane, Joiners Road and the driveway of LVC itself. After some engineering appraisals, the only viable option that emerged was Joiners Road, as Stantons Lane is too narrow and LVC, being a secondary school, has too much red tape. The Greater Cambridge Partnership is looking to present a proposal for what this route would look like, although we understand that the only physical changes to the highway will be to widen the footpath between LVC and Joiners Road, and between the bottom of Joiners Road and the recreation ground. Nothing else will be altered.
The next section of the Greenway to complete is the section

through or around Abington, to link with the A11 crossing and onwards. The route of this hasn't been agreed but is moving forward, slowly. Watch this space.

Cambridge South Station

The new train station being built at the Addenbrooke's site, Cambridge South, has had some construction delays and now will not open until June 2026.

#### **Age UK & the Community Warden**

#### **Endurance Estates Proposal for Horseheath Road**

THE PARISH Council Office was contacted by email on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of October by Concilio, on behalf of Endurance Estates, with notification of the public consultation launching on the 24th of October. This was shared on Village Facebook pages by the Parish Office, in addition to the circa 600 leaflets delivered by the developer to properties in Linton in close proximity to the land on Horseheath Road (next to Michaelotts).

In brief, the proposal was to "provide up to 100 highquality new homes, including 40% affordable housing, within a landscape-led design that reflects the character of Linton.

Nearly half of the site will become public open space, featuring play areas, walking routes and space for wildlife, creating a peaceful, sustainable and well-connected extension to the village."

Members of the Parish Council were invited to a remote briefing on the proposals with representatives from the developer. Whilst this did provide first introductions with a potential developer with interests in Linton, the presentation offered the same information to that which is available on the website link.

It would appear that Endurance Estates have no plans to meet parishioners face-to-face at this stage.
Whilst the interest of a second developer looking to build in/adjacent to Linton, in less than 12 months, may be concerning for many residents, please take assurance that no planning applications have yet been submitted to the Local Planning Authority for consideration.

If, or when, Endurance Estates submits a Planning Application to the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Department it is important to remember that all residents can submit comments during the consultation process. Whilst Linton Parish Council is a statutory consultant on Planning Applications in Linton, all residents have a right to represent themselves.

As a gentle reminder, when commenting on planning applications there are specific material considerations that should form the basis of your responses, including; overlooking/loss of privacy, the principle of development, layout, scale and massing, design, listed buildings and conservation areas, green space and biodiversity, local wildlife or protected species, streets and roads, public rights of way, cycle and car parking, refuse and storage facilities, noise, fumes or smell, surface water, foul water drainage and flooding issues, design of signage, external lighting or advertisements (more information is available on the Parish website <a href="https://linton-pc.gov.uk/comment-on-">https://linton-pc.gov.uk/comment-on-</a> applications).



Vice Chairman's Comment.

Cllr Lee Gardner advised that he would be circulating new information on co-option procedures in preparation for a review of the current policy and documents in relation to the Cathodeon Centre.

Cllr John Batchelor also advised of the upcoming Local Plan consultation which would have details of the proposals for a new town, namely Grange Farm development, in Abington.

Cllr Merrie Mannassi raised concerns about damage caused by Virgin Media during the installation of full fibre cabling and asked if the costs to repair the damage, repaired by CCC would be charged to the utility company.
