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Anderson Trust 2024 Grant Allocations

THE Anderson Trust was established in 1998 as a result of the sale of Church Cottage in Linton, the former home of Professor Charles and Mrs. Mary Anderson. According to the terms of the Trust Deed the purpose of the charity is to promote the Christian religion in and from the Parish of St Mary's, Linton; to sustain the Church of St Mary's and worship therein; to promote education for the benefit of those living in or resorting to Linton, particularly for the benefit of the Church School and of religious teaching in Linton and for any other charitable purpose for the benefit of those living in or resorting to Linton. At a meeting of the Trustees, held on March 4th, £12,600 interest, received from investments, was approved, according to the priorities stipulated in the Trust Deed, for distribution to the following applicants: £5,000 to the Beacon Youth Trust towards the salary and on-costs of a Youth Worker; £3,000 to St Mary's Church for refurbishment of the Pavilion kitchen, £500 for a first aid course for the Make Lunch team and £200 for Godly Play materials; £800 to Linton Infants School PTFA for Balanceability and Scooterwise lessons; £600 to Linton Infant School for the repurposing of disused cloakrooms; £1,300 to Linton Heights Junior School for decodable books and £600 to Linton Village Cricket Club towards the replacement of a sight screen. The Trust currently has a vacancy for a co-opted Trustee. 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The Bardfield Artists

Eric Ravilious and Edward Bawden were both Royal College of Art students when, on a cycling holiday, they happened upon Great Bardfield in Essex. There, they rented Brick House, starting a fascinating period for the village. Over the next two decades, numerous artists came to live there; they became known as The Bardfield

In 1932 Bawden married fellow student Charlotte Epton, a potter, and his father bought Brick House as a wedding present for them. In the same year Ravilious married Tirzah Garwood, an artist and engraver, and they lodged for a while with the Bawdens at Brick

Bawden's work can be seen today on three Victoria Line stations – Victoria, Tottenham Hale and Highbury & Islington – for which he designed the logos.

Another artist, John Aldridge, bought Place House in Great Bardfield in 1933 and soon became friends with Bawden. They produced Bardfield Wallpaper together for the company Cole & Sons to distribute.

A good selection of the Bardfield Artists' work can be seen at Fry Art Gallery in Saffron Walden – it reopens on April 7th – see https://fryartgallery.org/ for opening hours. 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Country Matters

Snowdrops

BIT late in the day to write this, but there was a choice between the truly massive and controversial subject of Fen drainage, and the humble snowdrop. Our local National Trust at Anglesey Abbey knows how to draw the crowds on a miserable, wet February day. You can barely find a space in the vast car park from Christmas till Easter. What is it about them?

Snowdrops seem to us harbingers of better times to come, and together with aconites are the first blooms of the year. They have many names, such as Snow Piercers, Fairmaids of February and Dingle Dangles. Their Latin name is Galanthus Nivalis, and though they are not a native plant, they might as well be. There have been records of snowdrops in UK gardens since 1597, and in the wild since 1778. We all know what they look like. Or do we? Turns out there are over 1000 varieties of snowdrop, and I know for sure there are people in Linton who are self-confessed galanthophiles. This term, meaning an enthusiastic collector and identifier of snowdrop species, was first used decades ago by plantsman E. A. Bowles. These galanthophiles have been breeding, swapping, buying and selling snowdrops for centuries. I looked at the hundreds of photos on the RHS website and, even enlarged, I could barely make out the minute differences between them. Just about managed the double and single flowering species.

What is it that makes them come up so early, be so resilient and survive such harsh conditions? The average date for snowdrops to appear is January 26th. But with every one degree warmer the average January temperature is, the first flowering snowdrop advances by 3 days.

Their early appearance means there is less competition for light, nutrients and pollinators. In woodlands they flower early, taking advantage of the sunlight before the leaves are out. They are much tougher than they look. They have hardened tips on the leaves to push through the often semi-frozen ground, and their cells contain anti-freeze proteins. When it freezes they just droop resignedly and wait for better times. Bit

What is still more impressive is that they have heat-reactive flowers - the tepals are thermotropic, meaning they move with the temperature. When its below 10 degrees Celsius the flowers close to protect the pollen, and when above 10C they open up for business. Their nectar attracts early bees, and they produce Galantemine, a treatment for early onset Alzheimers. They are, however, poisonous to

As this is a country matters and not a gardening column, I will finish on the perennial question – can you pick snowdrops in the wild? Unlike bluebells, here's the situation: *Providing* that the plant you are picking part of is not protected and is growing wild, and you are not going to sell it, then it is not

Walls and more walls

THE recent article on dry stone walls revived memories of life in the Cotswolds where, as a boy, I earned pocket money stone picking from the fields. The stones were naturally flat, allowing walls to be built without mortar. In Linton it is flint walls we should treasure and protect. Like limestone, flints were collected from fields or local mines, but their irregular shapes required mortar to bind them together for walls. Lime mortar was always used. Many of these walls are up to 200 years old. Mill Lane is a good place to see examples, though many High Street gardens have dividing walls of flint.

Probably the greatest danger to flint walls was the invention of Portland Cement, easier to work and much stronger. But surprisingly, bonding flints with an equally hard mortar produces a structure that is too rigid. Any ground movement results in cracks which admit moisture, leading to frost damage and risk of collapse. Lime has a natural flexibility which allows it to breathe and move. It also allows a chemical reaction, absorbing carbon dioxide from the surrounding air and slowly converting itself to limestone.

The other enemy is ivy, which attaches itself to supports by producing aerial roots along the stems and quickly takes advantage of small cracks. When removing ivy, cut rather than pull, preferably soon before lasting damage is done.

Different regions use different building styles. The smartest is knapped flint often found on East Anglian churches and common in Sussex. Each flint is split by hammer to show two shiny flat surfaces which are lined up neatly to give a formal appearance. Around Linton, most flints are not split but laid whole, either random or in horizontal lines or courses.

Twenty years ago, it was hard to find flint wallers using traditional lime, but local interest has grown more recently. The south wall of the churchyard is newly built, and several others have been rescued from either cement or ivy. This is an important part of our heritage, and all efforts to preserve it are to be encouraged.

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District and County Councillors' Report - March 2024

Civil Parking Enforcement

The County Council have a list of problem areas in each of our villages, supplied by Henry with support from Parish Councils, but if anyone feels that there are specific areas where parking is really an issue, do let him know directly.

Home Energy Support

The District Council is in a partnership with 6 other local authorities in Cambridgeshire, called Action on Energy. This partnership is aimed to help people create more energy efficient homes, therefore making them cheaper to run. Addenbrookes to get new early-morning bus services

NEW early-morning bus services have been scheduled to begin serving Addenbrookes Hospital in a bid to help crucial NHS workers get to and from work. Stagecoach East will add a new 5.00am X13 service from Haverhill to Addenbrookes with the return journey going from the hospital to Haverhill at 6:15am. Also, a new 13A service will now leave Haverhill at 4:20am, villages serving along the including Horseheath, Linton, and Little and Great Abington, before arriving at the hospital at 5:49am from Monday to Saturday. Darren Roe, Managing Director of Stagecoach East, said: "We all understand the importance of the NHS and the brilliant people that work in it. Many of them work shifts which can start very early in the morning, so it is important that we should provide them with a service to get them to work. 'They are key workers for us, so we are proud to be an essential part of the travel infrastructure that will let them do their jobs.' The new services are part of a range of improvements on the services between Cambridge and Haverhill. The new schedule will see 10 journeys from Haverhill to Cambridge and 11 in return on the rapid X13 service from Monday to Friday - up from the current 4 and 7 trips. Likewise, there will be 1 from Haverhill to Cambridge and 3 in return on Saturday, where there are currently none. Also, the new 13A service will run hourly, Monday to Saturday, where the 131/131A service is currently every two hours. Under the updated timetable, the 131/131A service will be removed, so the new 13A will serve Chimswell and Chivers every 60 minutes. The 13 will serve Arrendene in peak times only so that resource can be invested into the X13. The 13 and 13A together will offer 2 departures an hour into Cambridge and the X13 will maintain its current route into Cambridge, offering more fast and direct journeys.

Planning & Meeting Update February/March 2024

STATION Road Linton 22/04033/OUT Appeal

The application with some matters reserved except for access on the land behind Crofton Engineering was originally refused in 2023. This has now been appealed by the applicant with an expected hearing date of Wednesday 8th May 2024.

As with all outline applications, a version of the anticipated development has been submitted with the caveat that this 'could' be altered at the Reserved Matters stage, or if a separate Full application was submitted. In reality, once an outline application is approved, it is exceptionally difficult for the size, scale or use of the site to be reduced from the approved outline.

While the development of the site for commercial use is supported by the Local Plan (and is consistent with the Neighbourhood Plan), the application at appeal has two potential 'use classes' – B and E. Class E covers general commercial use. Class B covers 'businesses that supply or support others' which includes (or mostly refers to) warehousing. This was the intended use that the developer anticipated on submission of the application in 2022, despite concerns raised directly by LPC at the time.

LPC concerns include the fact that use of the site for warehousing would mean a lot of HGV/Articulated Vehicle traffic accessing Station Road - enough to support a business with 77+ employees, according to the application. Highways also had concerns about the safety of the junction at Station Road and the functioning of the A1307 at that junction as a result.

If you have any thoughts about the possible use of this site, please let us know. While the deadline for us to submit comments has passed, we can still speak at the appeal on behalf of the village. A1307 Bartlow Road Roundabout

It's not often that a construction project finishes ahead of time, but the Greater Cambridge Planning (GCP) team led by Martin Meehan should be congratulated on completing the roundabout ahead of schedule, reducing disruption from the roadworks by a good couple of months.

The primary purpose of the roundabout is to make the A1307 safer – especially on the dual carriageway past the Dean Road cross roads. Traffic lights could not be used because it is no longer possible to turn right onto the A1307 from the south side of the Dean Road junction. Instead, vehicles turn left and use the Bartlow Road roundabout to turn around. The roundabout also makes it both safer and easier to turn right onto the A1307 from Bartlow Road, Linton in the morning rush hour, and hopefully access from the Bartlow side is easier too, as traffic is slowed down. A great deal of traffic modelling for all transport modes was carried out before the design was finalised, and consultations took place with local residents and all the Parish Councils along the length of the A1307. We asked many questions about the plans and raised similar concerns to some that are circulating online, however, a great deal of work went into the design, and only time will tell if the roundabout works as intended.

Parish Council Minutes

ABBREVIATED minutes of the Linton Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 15th February 2024 at the Cathodeon Centre.

Open Forum for Public Participation.

The Chairman invited the member of the public to address the Parish Council.

The participant raised the matter of the Market Square, querying the resolution made at the meeting held on Thursday 7th December to offer a settlement to the owner of No 32 High Street. The Chairman confirmed that the settlement was considered at the time following suggestion from the legal team working on behalf of the Linton Parish Council to include new conditions in relation to the deed and that matters in relation to costs had progressed since the meeting in December. It was confirmed that full costs were now being pursued.

The participant also raised that the costs claim excluded the "office costs" and advised that they had contacted the Land Tribunal who had verbally confirmed that these costs could be claimed. Cllr Chris Hine stated that the Parish Council had followed advice received from the solicitor acting on behalf of the Parish Council, and that they had confirmed in writing that due to legal representation on behalf of the Parish Council, the office costs could not be claimed. The Clerk stated that the office costs could not be quantified retrospectively. The participant disagreed and stated that the exclusion of this was unacceptable considering that taxpayers' funds had been used for the purpose of registration of the Market Square. The Chairman reiterated that the Parish Council had followed the guidance of the solicitor. It was recommended that the Clerk check and obtain clarification, in writing, from both the Land Tribunal Court and confirm the advice given by the solicitor.

Clerks Report

Picnic in the Park (PITP). Consideration for the request from the Clerk to re-consider the PITP with a view to inviting the parish to set up an external committee to take responsibility for the organising and running of the event. Decision required. Cllr Kate Kell proposed that the PITP not take place in 2024 and communicate to the public that this could be held a bi-annual event if volunteers are available to form an external committee to organise /host the event with support from the Parish Council. Cllr Tony Smith seconded. All Agreed.

Neighbourhood Policing. Consideration of the Clerk's request to promote the quarterly meetings hosted by Cambridgeshire Constabulary Neighbourhood Police team in preference to local sessions being hosted by the Linton Parish Council. The Clerk provided an update and requested that the quarterly meetings hosted by the Cambridgeshire Constabulary be promoted in preference to those hosted by the Parish Council. It was requested that the Clerk publish an article with details of the quarterly meetings in the Linton News and ensure the dates are added to the Linton News Diary. It was also suggested that Parish Council meetings could be advertised in this way.

Consideration of the District and County Councillors Report for February 2024. Written report available. County Councillor Henry Batchelor advised that locations had been submitted to the Civil Enforcement Officers (CEOs) to assist officers attending the village. The Clerk added that a dedicated form had been received by the office for additional information to be sent direct to the

Cllr Kate Kell requested information on Cambridge 2040. CC Henry Batchelor advised that due to the project being at concept stage Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) had not set up anything official, but any further information would be shared.

External Meetings

Age Concern & ACEs meeting held on Thursday 1st February 2024. Cllr Chris Hine reported that the meeting was extremely positive and that quarterly meetings were agreed to improve communication and to share ideas. It was noted that Abington may be invited to use the Community Warden services and Cllr Hine suggested that Hildersham also be approached.

Consideration for the adoption of the LEAP (play area) and allotments in relation to the Horseheath Road development. Open discussion and decision required. Cllr Kate Kell proposed that the LEAP is not adopted. Cllr Lee Gardner seconded. All Agreed.

The adoption of the allotments decision was deferred to the meeting scheduled to take place on Thursday 21st March 2024. It was requested that the surface water drainage issues, including localised flooding of the allotments, and Spur Road be reported to the LLFA and the Compliance team at SCDC.
