120 Walk threatened land

LOCAL group Kingsway Solar Community Action joined campaigners across the UK on Sunday 8th June for the first-ever National Community Walk, a peaceful, coordinated effort to raise awareness about the growing impact of large-scale solar farms, pylons, and battery energy storage systems on rural landscapes.

The South Cambs walk, held in West Wratting, was a resounding success, attracting over 120 participants. Walkers followed a 2.25-mile route across public footpaths through the area proposed for the Kingsway Solar Farm, with a shorter 1-mile option also available.

The walk offered a powerful moment of community solidarity and concern over the irreversible changes this development would bring. The sun shone, the views were stunning, and it was a heartfelt reminder of what's at stake.

The proposed Kingsway Solar Farm would cover more than 1,500 hectares (3,706 acres) – an area larger than Heathrow Airport – spanning Balsham, West Wratting, Weston Colville, Willingham Green, and Carlton. It would involve massive infrastructure including pylons, substations, and up to 400 MW of battery storage, which carries unresolved safety concerns.

The National Community Walk was inspired by South Norfolk's Block East Pye Solar group and mirrored by campaigners around the country. These walks aim to help raise awareness and strengthen calls for smarter, community-driven energy planning.

Young people going to Uganda

in up to £25,000

A GROUP of young people from Linton (largely associated with St Mary's Church and Linton Free Church) and beyond is set to embark on a project to Uganda at the end of July and beginning of August. They are scheduled to fly out on Friday 25^{th} July.

Following a successful fundraising effort, all the necessary funds are in place to allow the project to go ahead and the young people to participate. The local community has been very supportive in these fund-raising efforts, notably including a highly successful recent auction of promises. We are very grateful for all the generous support. It also means that some significant facility development can be funded at the schools visited by the young people.

Whilst staying in Entebbe, the participants will work at the Early Learning School for a week and visit a partner secondary school. These schools are supported by the Kickstart Coffee charity (based in the Cambridge area) that raises funds to support the education of children from poor backgrounds in Entebbe and beyond. The young people will be able to see the impact of this support and meet families from the local communities associated with the schools. Following the work in the schools, the group will head off for a safari in the Murchison Falls Park area to the north of Entebbe. All the young people involved are excited at the prospect of the trip.



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Windmill replica restored

AN 80-year-old replica of the historic Bourn Windmill has been lovingly restored by dedicated volunteers of Cambourne Shed, and is now proudly on display in time for the summer season of open days.

The model has been restored to its former glory thanks to the meticulous craftsmanship and shared sense of purpose of the Cambourne Shed: a community group that supports men's mental health and wellbeing through hands-on projects and social connection. Under Greg Thompson's leadership, Andrew Young, Tung Hau, Chris Smith, John Panrucker and Robert Thompson lovingly restored the miniature windmill, which was originally built in the 1940s by enthusiast Michael Dunn using Venetian blinds from his home.

The model suffered storm damage in the 1960s and had spent years moving between family homes. The Shed team carefully stripped paint, repaired sails, replaced damaged parts (even using original slats from Dunn's Venetian blinds), and repainted every detail with care and precision.

Bourn Windmill is the oldest surviving windmill in the UK, dating to the 16th Century. Estate Manager Allan Scott Davies is delighted with the volunteers' work: "This working model is more than just a charming garden feature; it tells a story of craftsmanship, family legacy, and community spirit."

Michael Dunn's family are thrilled with the outcome. His daughter Jennifer shared that, "We are very pleased the replica has been accepted as part of the museum and are delighted that it has been restored by the local Shed. We are very grateful to all concerned."

Hundred Parishes Society

THE topography, geology and fertile soils of the Hundred Parishes have combined to provide suitable conditions for farming. Currently, cereals cover about two-thirds of our arable fields with crops of winter or spring-sown barley, oats and wheat. Twenty percent of fields have been planted with oil seed rape or vegetables. Grasslands make up the remainder of fields, providing forage for cattle, sheep or horses.

This spring has been exceptionally warm, very dry and sunny so there are concerns about a possible drought, reduced crop growth and lower yields. Some farmers started earlier than usual to irrigate vulnerable crops, and all are hoping for some more rainy days ahead as plants need moisture to absorb the nutrients they require for growth.

In recent years, some have been able to realise the potential of their south-facing fields, conveniently located over underlying chalk, to plant grape vines. Guided by the results of detailed soil analysis, coupled with careful selection of appropriate species of grape, these winemakers are now producing first class sparkling English wines and also bottles of excellent red, white or rosé wine. Many offer tours of their vineyards as an added attraction. Walkers following routes from www.hundredparishes. org.uk will appreciate the area's scenic beauty and rich agricultural heritage. Routes 127 and 161 pass vineyards and we should look out for other unusual crops.

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Neonics

NEO what? Neonics is short for neonicotinoids, meaning new nicotine-like insecticide. If you're interested in agriculture or bees, or even wildlife in general, you will probably have heard of them. They were developed in the 1990s, and are now the single most popular insecticide in the USA. They are a controversial subject that has persisted in the relevant media since their use was first approved in the EU in 2005.

Neonics are a class of synthetic insecticides, chemically similar to nicotine. They act as nerve poisons by disrupting the insect nervous system. They are systemic, meaning they're absorbed by the plant and transported throughout all plant tissues, including pollen and nectar, making them a potential threat to pollinators. They control pests successfully, are not dangerous to mammals and birds, and vets use them for tic control and flea collars. BUT they also impact bees and other pollinators such as hoverflies and any flower visiting insects. This fact led to restrictions in 2013 and an outright ban in Europe in 2017, later postponed to provide opportunity for further research. A minor dose can weaken the immune system, navigational skill, stamina, memory and fertility, while a major dose can lead to paralysis and death.

Roots and FROG

ST MARY'S was full last month for the free screening of Fugolburna, which is an ancient name for Fulbourn meaning 'birds by a stream'. Over 90 people watched the film which tells the tale of the wonderful and rare chalk streams we have locally, focusing on Fulbourn Fen Nature Reserve. It's a beautiful place to walk and a site of specific scientific interest because of the variety of flora and fauna by the historic chalk streams. Sadly, these streams are drying up with the ever increasing demand for water from Cambridge and the surrounding area.

We are lucky to have our own chalk stream in Linton and the meeting was an opportunity to reach out and involve people in looking after our local nature and wildlife. FROG and Linton Roots hosted the event and regularly post in the diary section. Linton Roots holds regular meetings and you can find our events in the newsletter diary.

We are extremely grateful to Fulbourn Forum who made the film and to St Mary's church for offering to host the film screening. We are so fortunate to live in such a place and hope to maintain it for future generations but need any help you can offer!

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If you were to follow beekeepers' arguments, you would think that use of neonics is leading us to ecological Armageddon. However farmers, particularly here in East Anglia, have seen their oil seed rape and beet crops decimated by pests over decades, and anyone growing fruit and vegetables at home must sometimes stand helplessly by. It is for this reason that the outright ban has not been fully implemented. Despite the ban, 10 EU countries including England (not the rest of the UK), were granted emergency authorisation to use neonics for sugar beet only in England. This has happened for four years in a row.

> The current position, in a paper from December 2024, states that further research is needed, and there is a UK pollinator monitoring scheme dating from 2017 which, in theory, should enable a more accurate picture of pollinator health. The trouble is that bees have been declining for years, from pesticides, habitat loss, climate change, disease, and parasites. Neonics are only partially responsible. Unlike post-war DDT, an outright ban is not such a clear cut decision. The type of neonics now being used is called Cruiser SB, apparently less damaging. Scientists are trying to develop an alternative way to fight the cabbage stem flea beetle. The latest government statement is a classic: 'We are committed to working with stakeholders to support the growers to

succeed without neonicotinoids'.

Butterfly and Bumblebee Walk

FROG is delighted to announce our next free activity for adults and children: butterfly and bumblebee walk, Saturday 9th August, starting in St Mary's churchyard at 11am.

Oilseed Rape

The walk will last 1.5 hours, and will be led by Matt Hayes, PhD student in the Department of Zoology, Cambridge. He is investigating how to manage nature reserves to protect species from climate change and extreme weather.

This event will coincide with the UK Big Butterfly Count (Friday 18th July to Sunday 10th August). Butterfly Conservation has declared a butterfly emergency and needs your help more than ever: https://bigbutterflycount. butterfly-conservation.org/.

Butterflies and moths are important indicators of biodiversity. Their fragility makes them quick to react to change so their struggle to survive is a serious warning about our environment. Eighty percent of UK butterfly species have decreased in abundance and/or distribution since 1976. The UK has 59 species of butterflies - 57 resident and two regular migrants. But five species of butterfly have become extinct in the last 150 years.

Areas rich in butterflies and moths are rich in other invertebrates. These collectively provide a wide range of environmental benefits. Moths and butterflies are an important element of the food chain, and support a range of other predators and parasites.

District and County Councillors' Report - June 2025

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

SCDC's popular Zero Carbon Communities Grant is open for applications, closing Tuesday 1st July 2025. Parish councils and voluntary/community organisations are invited to apply for grants of between £2,000 and £15,000 for projects that either:

a) reduce carbon emissions, for example, from a

community building, or; b) foster greater community engagement on climate issues and encourage sustainable behaviour change.

Allotment Improvement Grant

A new grant from the District Council providing up to \pm 10,000 in funding to support projects that enhance the productivity, sustainability, and social value of allotment spaces.

Key priorities include:

 improving water access through reliable connections Improving water access through reliable connections
and rainwater harvesting;
implementing pest control measures, such as fencing;
upgrading facilities such as waterless toilets;
delivering measurable social benefits, such as

promoting mental well-being, outdoor activity and community engagement. Other allotment improvements will also be considered, ensuring that allotments remain thriving, inclusive spaces for all.

Low Income Family Tracker (LIFT)

South Cambridgeshire District Council has helped residents on lower incomes secure up to £3.6 million in benefits they're entitled to but weren't claiming. The Council's innovative LIFT software identifies households potentially eligible for benefits but not claiming them. They are sent a letter or text encouraging them to apply, with follow-up phone calls.

The Council has helped over 110 households that were eligible for Pension Credit but weren't claiming it. Pension Credit is a benefit for people over State Pension age (currently 66) with low incomes. It provides extra money for living costs and can lead to other support. If they remain eligible for the rest of their lives, these households will receive up to £3.2 million in Pension Credit between them.

Households that applied for Pension Credit before last Christmas were also eligible for the Winter Fuel Payment following a change in eligibility criteria last year. This is a payment of either £200 or £300, depending on a person's age. The projected extra income this Winter Fuel Payment will bring new claimants across South Cambridgeshire, as long as they remain eligible for it, is just over £229,000.

In addition, the programme has been used to promote the availability of the Household Support Fund. This is a one-off hardship payment of £110 administered by Cambridgeshire County Council. Just under 250 South



Cambridgeshire households went on to claim it during the past 12 months – with a total claim value of £26,400.

The Council also identified nearly 70 households that only just missed out on being eligible for Pension Credit, and therefore the Winter Fuel Payment. They were all contacted and offered a free electric blanket and financial advice through Income Maximisation appointments with Council officers.

The next areas of focus for the Council's Data Team, using the LIFT software, will include encouraging more eligible residents to claim grants to retrofit their home with energy efficiency measures. There will also be a campaign to raise awareness of Cambridge Water's Assure Tariff, which offers discounts on water bills for those eligible.

Acorn Anaerobic Digester

The Acorn anaerobic biodigester planning application, which has been rolling through the system for a few years now, is finally coming to Suffolk County Council's planning committee this month for a decision. Henry has registered to speak at the committee to put across the views that have been made to him so far. The date of the committee is June 19th, so by the time you read this, the decision will have been made.

The Pavilion - Update

THANK YOU to everyone who attended the recent Additional Parish Council meeting held on the 12th June 2025. The meeting focused on the future of the Pavilion and it was appreciated that so many parishioners shared their concerns.

The Parish Council apologise for any misunderstanding caused by the statements issued recently and would like to reassure the parishioners that memorabilia belonging to both the Linton Grant Football Club (LGFC) and Linton Village Cricket Club (LVCC) will remain on display at the Pavilion.

From 1st July 2025 the Parish Council will be responsible for the Pavilion, including all running costs, safety regulations, maintenance and bookings. A 3-month period has been put in place with LGFC and LVCC, which will enable LPC and the clubs to work together for a smooth transition.

The option to set up a Management Committee to run the Pavilion remains in place. A committee would need to consist of representatives from the sports clubs, the parish council, and impartial parishioners. Full responsibility and accountability would need to be embraced by those involved. If there is enough support this can be discussed further, please contact the Parish Council office if this is something you would be keen to be involved in.

All prior bookings made with the LGFC before the 12th June 2025 will go ahead, future bookings will need to be made through the Parish Council office.

The popular Warm Hub and meetings of the Linton ACEs will continue to be hosted at the venue free of charge.

As with all change, the finer details need to be addressed. Further meetings with the Parish Council and both clubs will continue over the next three months and beyond.



The aim of the Parish Council remains to relieve the clubs from the burden of costs and regulations and to help promote sport in Linton. The plan is to encourage additional activity at the Pavilion building whilst retaining priority use of the facilities for the LGFC and the LVCC. The best way forward is to work together to achieve the ultimate goal.

Traffic Matters - Update

THE PARISH Council recently held a survey in the Linton News and on social media asking for your views on traffic calming options in Linton.

The options were as follows.

Option 1 - Implement the 20mph for all roads in Linton without traffic calming measures

Option 2 - Cease to continue with the implementation of the 20mph scheme for all roads in Linton. Options 3 - to apply for traffic calming measures on Horseheath Road only and install 20mph speed limits on key roads only.

The majority of those who participated voted for option 3 with 62% in favour.



The suggestion for additional speed cameras was raised, which is being considered for some roads, along with physical traffic calming measures on Horseheath Road.

Also, some parishioners requested traffic calming on Back Road which, providing funds are available, may be an option for the next LHI Bid (2026-2027). This would complete the reduction of the historical shortcut through the village for commuters travelling to and from Haverhill and Cambridge.

Concerns were raised in relation to enforcement of the 20mph speed limits. The Cambridgeshire Constabulary have provided reassurance on this matter. If persistent speeding or dangerous driving is reported, support will be provided. The local Speed Watch team send all relevant data to the police and will request that additional enforcement takes place, as it is essential to reduce speeding violations.

At the meeting of the Parish Council on Thursday 19th June a decision was taken to implement the 20mph speed limits on the following roads. Horseheath Road, Symonds Lane, Back Road and Bartlow Road. Speed Indicator Devices are being investigated, especially for roads where the speed limit will remain at 30mph.

In addition to the 20mph speed zones, the Parish Council are reviewing the best options for traffic calming as recommended by CCC, and will take a final decision on Thursday 26th June 2025, to allow the application to be submitted to the Cambridgeshire County Council, LHI Member panel for presentation on Friday 11th July 2025.

IN PREVIOUS years the Parish Council has arranged to open the Pavilion on selected afternoons during the School Summer Holidays.


This year it has been agreed to try something a little different to ensure that parishioners using the Recreation Ground and Play Equipment are not restricted to a particular time or day.

Abbreviated minutes of the Linton Parish Council being able to attend the Annual Meeting of the Parish meeting held on Thursday 15th May 2025 at the Cathodeon Centre.

Election of the Chairman and signing of the Declaration of Acceptance of Office form.

Cllr Tony Smith nominated Cllr Kate Kell to stand as Chairman of the Parish Council. Cllr Brian Cox seconded. All Agreed.

Election of the Vice-Chairman and signing of the Declaration of Acceptance of Office form.

Cllr Karen Sanderson nominated Cllr Lee Gardner to stand as Vice Chairman of the Parish Council. Cllr Tony Smith seconded. All Agreed.

Chairman's Comment.

The Chairman thanked the members for their support in

voting her as Chairman for another year. To approve the minutes of the Full Council meeting held on the 17th of April 2025. Decision required.

Cllr Tony Smith proposed the minutes be approved. Cllr Jasvir Singh seconded. Agreed with three abstentions. Planning

Consideration for the expression of interest to procure land in Linton by a property developer. Decision required. Cllr Chris Hine proposed the clerk respond stating that the area of land was part of an S106 agreement that the area remains a communal green open space to be available to residents in perpetuity and therefore there in no interest in the sale of the land. Cllr James Lake seconded. All Agreed.

Finance

Consideration and approval of the Internal Audit Report. Open discussion and Decision required.

The Chairman thanked the RFO for an excellent audit, especially considering her recent appointment to the post in January 2025.

Cllr Tony Smith proposed the Internal Audit Report be approved. Cllr Karen Sanderson seconded. All Agreed. Consideration for the request from the Clerk to appoint a CAPALC registered Internal Auditor for the financial year 2025/2026 for two visits, with a maximum budget to be approved. Decision required.

Cllr Lee Gardner proposed a maximum budget of £500.00 to appoint a CAPALC registered Internal Auditor for the financial year 2025/2026 for two visits. Cllr Karen Sanderson seconded. All Agreed.

To review the end of year accounts and sign the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) to be sent to the External Auditor for the year ending 31st March 2025

Notification of adjustments required to previous financial End of Year accounts. For Information. Noted.

Review of Section 1 and agreement for the Chairman to sign Section 1. Open discussion and Decision required. Cllr Chris Hine proposed to approve and agree for the

Chairman to sign Section 1 of the AGAR. Cllr Jasvir Singh seconded. All Agreed.

The Chairman signed Section 1 of the AGAR. Review of Section 2 and agreement for the Chairman to sign Section 2. Open discussion and Decision required. Cllr Tony Smith proposed to approve and agree for the Chairman to sign Section 2 of the AGAR. Cllr Chris Hine seconded. All Agreed.

The Chairman signed Section 2 of the AGAR.

District and County Councillors Report Annual Report. The Chairman congratulated County Councillor Henry Batchelor on his recent success in the Local Election. In addition to the written report the following points were made.

1. The County & District Councillors apologised for not

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held on Thursday 8th May 2025.

2. An update on Green Energy proposals of Anaerobic Digestion Plants with the development at Streetly End having been recently agreed. The Acorn Digestion Plant at Haverhill due to be decided next month by Suffolk County Council. Cllr Batchelor advised he would be attending the meeting and would give comments on behalf of the parish if requested to do so.

Few details are available in relation to future housing developments in Cambridgeshire but the estimated numbers of 100-150k have been suggested. In context the total number of houses in Cambridge is 60k. Prior warning of a potential housing development site at Grange Farm – Abington was mentioned.

Cllr Henry Batchelor spoke briefly on the changes in structure of local government and advised that options for mergers between smaller authorities were being considered.

5. Cllr John Batchelor advised that Cllr Henry Batchelor's recent success in the local election had returned as 47% of the vote and that the Liberal Democrats now hold the najority of seats in SCDC. He also advised that the local MP Pippa Heylings was keen to be involved and offer support in local issues.

6. Cllr John Batchelor also congratulated Cllr Kate Kell for her re-election of Chairman of the Linton Parish Council.

Cllr James Lake asked if the 4-day working week would be continuing.

Cllr John Batchelor advised that the results of the assessment would be received next week, and a decision would be taken at the SCDC meeting in July 2025.

Cllr Brian Cox gueried future development and the known issues with water supply.

Cllr Henry Batchelor advised that a government working party has been investigating options, one of which is for a major new reservoir in Fenland, which only meets the current Local Plan, estimating the needs for 40,00 homes, so the speculation of 110k would require much more water in the future.

20mph Speed Limit Scheme

Consideration of all options in relation to the 20mph scheme in Linton, following an operational decision taken by the police concerning the enforcement of speeding violations in 20mph speed limit scheme and the request from a councillor for further public consultation prior to further decisions on the approved scheme in Linton. Decision required.

Councillors raised several points and concerns in relation to the 20mph scheme and traffic calming measures in Linton. Cllr Kate Kell proposed a public consultation arranged via Linton News, social media, noticeboards, and school newsletters with three options to choose from as follows:

1. To continue with the implementation of the 20mph scheme on all roads, regardless of the status of traffic calming measures.

To cease the implementation of the 20mph scheme for all roads in Linton.

3. LPC apply for a an LHI to install "traffic calming" on Horseheath Road only and install 20mph on Horseheath Road, Symonds Lane and Back Road with a view to applying for traffic calming measures on Back Road once funds are available. Bartlow Road to be changed to 20mph. Balsham Road and Hadstock Road to remain at 30mph which will continue to be enforced by Cambridgeshire Constabulary.

The results of the consultation to be brought to the Parish Council meeting in June 2025 to make a final decision on

the LHI Bid and the 20mph scheme. Cllr Chris Hine seconded. 8 in favour with one abstention. Motion carried. **Market Square**

Update in relation to the request for removal of all bins and storage on the Market Square. For information. Due to the notification that bins remain on the Market Square despite requests to remove them by LPC, the Clerk was requested to insert a small piece in the Linton News requiring removal of all bins stored on the public open space. It was also requested that a Final Notice

letter be sent where ownership can be confirmed. **Meadow Recreation Ground**

Consideration for the provision of facilities on the Recreation Ground for the summer holidays. Decision required.

Cllr Tony Smith proposed the guotation from Lattahire at £403.20 including VAT. Cllr Jasvir Singh seconded. 8 in favour with two abstentions.

The Pavilion

Notification of the progress of remedial works to date in relation to Fire Safety at the Pavilion building. For Information.

The Clerk advised that the spend to date of £3165.84 does not include the replacement doors.

Update following the recent meetings with LGFC and LVCC and consideration of further actions to be taken by LPC in relation to the Pavilion building. Decision required. A brief update was provided from councillors who

attended recent meetings with LGFC and LVCC.

Cllr Tony Smith proposed that, having taken into account the concerns raised by both clubs in relation to the required increase in responsibility and the inability to agree the Building Management Document, that upon the expiration of the current extended licence to occupy the Pavilion building until the 30th June 2025, changes would be required. The management and maintenance of the Pavilion building to be transferred and assumed by Linton Parish Council. The Linton Parish Council office to be responsible for administering a booking system that will be accessible to any Linton Club, Group or Organisation and that a meeting be arranged to speak with LGFC and LVCC regarding the changes as a matter of urgency.

The Chairman invited members of the public present to

speak. Further discussion followed with all parties raising valid points and concerns.

LPC reassured those present that the measures being taken would not exclude the use of the facilities by either club but would remove the financial and administrative burdens faced by the clubs and allow them to focus on sport in Linton. It was stated that the proposed changes would also help to ensure this valuable community asset would remain available to all in perpetuity.

Two members of the public left the meeting.

Cllr Lee Gardner seconded the proposal. All Agreed.
