The Pilgrim's Progress

SHOULD you happen to spot half a dozen rather grubby, possibly very muddy, even slightly disreputable-looking characters wending their way along the lanes and across the fields around Bartlow on Saturday 15th April, do not be alarmed.

For they will be pilgrims, on their way from London to Walsingham. They will be carrying documents called Pilgrim Passports, and will be brandishing them in St Mary's, adding the pilgrim stamp held at the church to those they have so far obtained. By the time they get to Walsingham, they will have 20, collected in other churches along the way. And what is all this in aid of?

Let me fill you in on a little background. The route we will be following is a modern adaptation of the pre-Reformation path from the Capital to England's greatest Holy Shrine.

Before Henry VIII banned pilgrimage, and outlawed the veneration of saints in 1538, Walsingham was far more important as a pilgrim destination than Canterbury. Who knew? And the road there was the most important in the land. Yet it led to a little village in Norfolk which, despite its size, was actually a spiritual metropolis. I have written a guidebook, London to Walsingham Camino: The Pilgrimage Guide, which comes with full GPS mapping that can be downloaded onto a phone, plus all the other information a pilgrim might need. On the 15th we shall be walking from Saffron Walden to Withersfield, passing through Ashdon, Bartlow and Horseheath. You would be welcome to join us.

It's just under 14 miles in total, about eight of those

miles being the morning's walk to Bartlow, and another six to be tackled in the afternoon. If time allows, we might even be able to fit in lunch at the Three Hills in Bartlow, which comes highly recommended. At St Mary's, Withersfield, Revd Max Drinkwater (and his congregation) have very kindly rearranged their schedule so that we can attend Evensong at 6pm. Max also has a pilgrim stamp. After that, we plan a pilgrim supper at the White Horse. The six of us who are doing the full route will be doing so for the first time (though I have done every inch four or five times, in shorter bursts, while researching and writing the book). When we reach Walsingham we will be greeted at both the Anglican and Catholic Shrines, and conclude our journey at Walsingham Abbey.

I hope you would like to join us for a day, half a day, or even the full route! If you would like to know more, or register your interest, please email me at andyzbull@gmail.com

Duncan Ogilvy will be meeting us at St Mary's, where we should arrive at around 12.30 (blisters allowing), and if you would like to say hello to us there, that would be lovely. If you are on Facebook, there is a dedicated page, @LondonToWalsingham-Camino, where I post regularly.



IN a change to the advertised talk for the March meeting, Jim Forrest (Club Chair) showed a collection of colourful photographs on the theme of "The Garden Close-Up" taken by Helen Townsend (Club Secretary). Many digital cameras and phone cameras have closeup (macro) settings which help produce detailed images of insects, flowers, berry and seed structures that are almost invisible to the naked eye and reveal the beauty of the miniature world.

Let dead wood be

A WHILE ago I wrote about Trees for Life, and how we shouldn't keep getting rid of dead trees. Here I am back again, looking at the importance of dead wood both in our gardens and in parks and woods.

Dead wood sounds like someone in the office hanging on too long before retirement – being generally in the way, preventing young blood from progressing. However in the natural world, it is quite the opposite. It plays a crucial role in the flow of energy from what once was alive back down into the soil. Each fallen branch is a slow-release compost stick – it is gradual, long lasting, consistent, and vital in supporting complex food webs. Think of Pocket Park with all the fallen willow and rotting trees. Think of areas of Wandlebury where logs are piled up – the more wood left rotting, the more insects and invertebrates. The more insects and invertebrates, the more mammals and birds.

Here's how dead wood is formed:

Trees are composed of living tissues with a protective layer of bark. Underneath the bark is a layer of xylem vessels – these transfer water and nutrients from the roots all the way to the canopy.

As the tree ages and grows it lays down new vessels under the bark. The older ones inside die. This inner dead wood, known as heartwood, is protected from decay by the outer

During the ageing process, things happen to expose the heartwood. Limbs fall off, and woodpeckers bore holes. Along come specialist fungi to begin the decaying process. The fungi hollow out the trees to

create habitat for deadwood invertebrates Creepy crawlies take over.

Much as Best Kept Village prizes are anathema to naturalists, overly neat and tidy parks and woods are anathema to wildlife. In the Suffolk Wildlife Trust mag last month, the writer said approximately one fifth of all British fauna depend on dead or dying wood at some point, and one third of all UK bird species nest in deadwood cavities and hollows. In those cavities the temperature and humidity are more stable than in "live" places, so they are safer. If you're down by the Granta, you'll see deadwood creating debris, dams, riffles, and flooded areas. It catches our rubbish, helps us to remove it, and encourages a diversity of species. Embrace your messy self. Fight against your tendency to tidy up. Don't fill that green bin just because they're coming for it on Monday

The famous naturalist Rev Gilbert White had the best-known ancient yew in England in his churchyard in 1789, measuring 23 feet in diameter. Two hundred years later its girth had grown by only 3 feet. This meant the tree was likely to be 1400 years old. In 1990 it was flattened in a storm, and despite a crane lifting it back into place and a few new shoots appearing, the famous yew died; a monument to Gilbert White, who loved beetles as much as he loved trees.



District and County Councillors' report March 2023

A1307 Update

The upgrades to the A1307 are moving forward at some pace now. The Greater Cambridge Partnership (the body implementing these schemes) are now in the final phases of making the changes to 'our' section of the road, between Haverhill and the A11. The next phases that are being constructed are:

1. Completing the improved footpath between Pilgrims (previously Dalehead Foods) and Hildersham. This work includes the removal of the eastbound layby as that is needed to accommodate the widened path. This work has started now and will take a few months to complete.

2. The installation of a new roundabout at the Bartlow Road, Linton junction of the A1307. This is a relatively major piece of infrastructure and will take at least 9 months to complete. There will be minimal disruption whilst the work is happening as the plan is to construct a temporary carriageway around the construction site so that the A1307 will very rarely need to fully close. There will be some other road closures as part of the works, so there may be some slight disruption to residential

20mph schemes

The County Council have now implemented a new 20mph speed reduction scheme. This is where parishes can apply for specific roads to be considered for a reduction in speed down to 20mph, which may not have always been in line with policy, previously. Acorn Bioenergy Proposal - Suffolk

The company is called Acorn Bioenergy and their website is here - https://www.acornbioenergy.com/ - there is a lot of interest in this site, particularly from the Suffolk side of the border, as there are concerns about the environmental impact of the surrounding area, specifically smell, noise, traffic etc. A planning application is expected to be submitted this year, which will be decided by Suffolk County Council. It's an interesting scheme that will have an effect on our area, especially those in the vicinity of the site, so do keep your ear to the ground and feel free to comment on the planning application, when it is submitted and in the public domain.



Zero Carbon Grant Improvements to the Pocket Park

THE TEN acre site, locally known as the Pocket Park is managed by Linton Parish Council and has recently been a focus for improvements and preservation.

Following receipt of the Zero Carbon Communities grant, awarded by South Cambridgeshire District Council, plus additional local funding, the Parish Council have planted a new copse, comprising thirty native species including Silver Birch, Wild Cherry and Rowan trees. In addition to this, the habitat has also been enhanced by the planting of two Black Poplars, which are becoming rare in the UK. It is hoped that these, along with others planted recently in the village will provide a migration route for Hawk Moths.



New benches installed at the Pocket Park

Two new benches have been installed, one at the entrance gate and one overlooking the River Granta, which meanders peacefully through the whole park. As one of only 200 chalk streams in the world, it is vital to maintain the health of the river. It can suffer from extremely low flows in the summer and flash floods in winter, something climate change is adding to. In the Planning update this month, you can see how the easily the River Granta can burst its banks and submerge the immediate area. The Pocket Park is a flood plain and is naturally fit for purpose.

The Linton Parish Council has commissioned a new interpretation board which will soon be situated at the entrance to the Pocket Park. This will provide information and feature photographs and drawings of plants and wildlife you can expect to

In addition to improvements at the Pocket Park, a new community orchard has been planted on the green at Parsonage Way. This includes, pear, plum, apple and hazelnut trees. Although these will take a while to mature and bear fruit, it is hoped that this will benefit future generations in the village.

Coffee with a Cop update from the initial meeting

THIS informal discussion, suggested by our Parish Clerk, Jenny Seaward, showed that people are happy to come out, even on a freezing cold night, when there are important and pressing matters to discuss. We know that police activity is still extremely constrained following cuts made in the early years of the present government, and this makes it all the more important to get the best out of what we have

Two PCSOs, Chris Wiseman and John Coppard attended. The Beacon Youth Trust and Linton Village College were represented, and Cllr Karen Sanderson and I were there for the Parish Council.



Coffee with a Cop on Wednesday 8th

We began with parking. The problems of the High Street are well known, and can prevent a wheelchair user from exercising their right to use the pavement. We hope fairly soon (by local authority standards) to have powers to issue tickets, and will not hesitate to use them. There are further problems in parts of the village where parking is permitted, but spaces are limited. Competition for these spaces, we were told, had led to abusive behaviour and bullying, which had attracted police warnings, but which had not been stopped.

Abusive behaviour had also been seen from young people – not from LVC - using unregistered motorbikes on the recreation ground and the streets near it, and yelling violently at anyone who complained. Similar abuse was reported by residents who had observed drug dealers in cars, using Linton as drop off points, and by members of the Speedwatch team. Information about drug dealing was passed to the PCSOs in confidence.

PCSO Wiseman said that these were public order offences and should be reported. Residents said that they were having problems making reports via the 111 line, so could anyone making, or trying to make, a report please also notify the Parish Office. We can then collate the information and inform the Police Com-Cllr John Bald

In 2001 it peaked at about 1.34m – over half a metre deeper than in this picture. The environment agency measuring station (the box at the left of the picture) was not installed in 1968 when this field flooded even more than in 2001. Newspaper articles from the time ran headlines saying that the water was 7 foot deep in St Mary's Church!

The surface water scheme between the fields on Horseheath Road and the Croudace site has not been installed according to the plans that were agreed by SCDC almost a year ago. This has been reported by residents and the Parish Council, but enforcement action has not occurred at the time of writing. On 10th March, water from the fields overflowed onto the site and narrowly missed flooding properties – thanks to the quick thinking of residents on Lonsdale who provided sandbags, internal flooding was prevented.

A1307 works including the Bartlow Road Roundabout The GCP and their contractors presented the 4 phases of the scheme to residents on Monday 27th February and Monday 20th

In Phase 1: the A1307 will be temporarily re-routed closer to Linton to allow the vast majority of the work to be undertaken without closing the A1307. This will require the closure of Bartlow Road into Linton, but a diversion via Horseheath Road will only be needed for local traffic trying to reach Bartlow Road, Emsons Close and Finchams Close. In Phase 2: the majority of the work will be carried out to build the roundabout. The south side of the junction will be closed (towards Bartlow).

In Phase 3: connections to the roundabout from the A1307 will be made. This will require 2 weekend closures of the A1307. The diversion route will send traffic (including HGVs) from Four Went Ways via the A11, A14 (through Bury) and the A143 to Haverhill and vice versa. This is a long diversion, hence minimising the time that it will be in place. In Phase 4: the Bartlow Road in Linton will be connected to the roundabout and the Dean Road cross road junction will be altered. Again, this will require closure of Bartlow Road and a local diversion via Horseheath Road.

Parish Council Minutes

Parish Council Matters is written, edited and published by the Parish Council with the support of the Linton News Team.

ABBREVIATED draft minutes of the Linton Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 16th February 2023 at the Cathodeon Centre. Acceptance of Apologies for Absence.

Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs Poulter, Cieluch,

County and District Cllr Henry Batchelor sent apologies for his absence. Cllr Merrie Mannassi informed the Council of the resignation of Cllr Sharron Parker.

Chairman's Comment.

The Chairman thanked Cllr Sharron Parker for her contributions and time as a Parish Councillor and wished her all the best in the future. It was noted that Ms. Parker had expressed an interest in attending Working Groups in the future.

Open Forum for Public Participation.

The member of public spoke of concerns of surface water flooding near their property in Rivey Way and expressed concern that this may be a result of the clearing of the ditch on the Rivey Bridlepath which appeared to end near their property. Concerns were also raised as to the safety of users of the Bridleway near to the steps leading to Rivey Close due to the water fall from further up the

path making it slippery with the mud. Cllr Kate Kell requested that the office contact the CCC Rights of Way Officer, Peter Gaskin, to confirm if, and when, the works relating to the drainage issues on the Bridlepath will be carried out. The member of public was thanked for bringing the issue to the attention of the Parish Council.

Matters Arising/Clerks Report.
Update on the tree works at St. Mary's churchyard.

Cllr Kell updated the Council that the Planning Committee had requested that the Asst. Clerk contact the Greater Cambridge Planning (GCP) Trees Team to request that the decision on the application submitted by LPC is expedited, if there are no objections received, due to the health and safety risk of the trees.

Consideration of the District and County Councillors Report

for January 2023.

The District Councillor advised that the setting of the budget for the District Council will begin week commencing the 20th February. At the moment it looks as if County Council will increase their tax levy by 4.99%

There are no local elections this year as they happen every four years, however the County Council elections will run next year. The Council inquired into the success of the trial project for the £2 bus fare and if this is likely to continue. Cllr Batchelor advised that this is yet to be confirmed.

Cllr Kell inquired into the success of the trial for the 4-day working week. Cllr Batchelor advised that the staff surveys had been completed and the initial feedback is very positive. The initial results pertaining to performance figures suggests that the trial has been successful, although it is really too early to tell as there have had to many adjustments throughout the 6 week trial to accommodate the structure. There has been a notable increase in applications for employment since the commencement of the scheme.

Cllr Lawrence-Foulds inquired to whether joint partnership was possible between the District Councils within the same region on projects such as housing to make provisions that would benefit the whole county overall. Cllr Batchelor advised that sadly, each District Council is its own independent authority, which makes the possibility of an overall project very low.

External Meeting Reports

Update on the Local Councils & Community Engagement meeting held on Wednesday 25th January 2023. Written report available. Consideration for the request from the Clerk to hold quarterly "Coffee with a Councillor" meetings at the Cathodeon Centre with a minimum of two councillors present.

It was noted that the first meeting is due to be held on Wednesday 8th March 2023 6.30pm with PCSO plus representatives invited from Beacon Youth Trust (BYT) and Linton Village College (LVC). Cllrs Sanderson and Bald to attend with the Clerk. It was also suggested that this event could be rotated going forward to allow for Coffee with a Copper and Coffee with a Councillor to be on alternate months. The Clerk was thanked for arranging the first session and it was delegated to the office to continue to arrange.

Planning. Bartlow Road

Update on the Bartlow Road development site. Ref S/1963/15/ OL and S/2501/19/RM.

It was noted that the removal of the protected hedge is currently being chased with the enforcement and compliance team at South Cambridgeshire District Councils planning department. Update on the Planning Appeal and consideration for the recom-

mendation from the Planning Committee regarding the request from the Planning Inspectorate that the parish pay for the hire of the Village Hall on Thursday 13th April 2023

It was proposed by Cllr Kell that Linton Parish Council cover the cost of a day rate hire of Linton Village Hall to the value of £100.00 to allow for the planning hearing to be held in the village and easily attended by residents. Cllr Bald seconded. Agreed. Horseheath Road.

Update on the land south of Wheatsheaf Barn, Horseheath Road development site. Ref S/4418/19/RM.

Cllr Kell updated the Council that the eastern boundary does not match the Surface Water Scheme and they have not currently delivered it correctly due to an error in the installation. The bund has been placed in the field and not on site, so it does not serve its purpose. This is to be notified to the compliance team and has been raised with the Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA) and the planning officer at South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC). The developer has also failed to deliver an acceptable scheme pertaining to the site entrance.

Update from the Planning Committee regarding a request for an extension of the 30mph speed limit on Horseheath Road to

include Michaelotts. For Information.

The Planning Committee at LPC are fully supportive of the request for an extension of the 30mph limit. Croudace Homes have advised that the approved access to the Pastures development did not require the 30mph speed limit to be extended and therefore they had not requested this from Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC). Cllr Kell proposed that LPC also apply to CCC to extend the 30mph zone. This would enable LPC to add the condition that the white gated village sign which currently incorporates the 30mph sign is not moved as this identifies the village boundary. Cllr Sanderson seconded. Agreed.

Planning Applications

Update from the Planning Committee on the application for outline planning permission for one residential dwelling on land recently sold at auction in Dolphin Close (23/00351/OUT).

The Planning Committee noted their concerns pertaining to this application. This is not only out of keeping within the area and out of character, but results in the loss of amenity land that residents, including, but not specific to, those in Dolphin Close have used for over 40 years. It would have a detrimental impact on the area and reduce available open green space amenity land available within the village to all parishioners.

The Planning Committee advised that all parishioners should be made aware of the application so that they can register their opinions online on the SCDC planning portal, whether they be in support or against the application.

Finance Quotes

Consideration for the recommendation from the Finance, Risk & Compliance Committee (FRCC) in relation to quotes received for fencing at the Old Bowls Green. Supporting documents in Councillor packs. Verbal update from the FRCC. Open discussion and Decision required.

It was proposed by the FRCC that C&W Fencing be contracted to install the 868 twin wire fencing and that Fitness Sport provide the equipment. Cllr Hill proposed, Cllr Cox seconded, Agreed.

Traffic & Highways Notification of the data captured from the Mobile Speed Indicator Device (MSID) between

30.12.2022-13.01.2023. and 13.01.2023-27.01.2023. Written reports available. For information. Noted.

Notification of the data captured by the Speedwatch Team in January 2023. The Council gave their thanks to the Speedwatch Team for all their hard work. Cllr Kell provided thanks to Neil for all his hard work on the team recently, he has been getting up early and covering the first sessions to ensure the village can be made as safe as possible and that is greatly appreciated.

Consideration for the proposal to install a disabled parking bay in Tower View, Linton. Open discussion and Decision required. Cllr Lawrence- Folds proposed that there is no objection from the Parish Council, Cllr Sanderson seconded. Agreed.

Recreation Ground

Update on the proposed design of the entrance gate to the Recreation Ground on Meadow Lane following a meeting held on Friday 10th February. Open discussion and Decision required. Cllr Kell attended the site meeting and spoke on this item to Council. It is a simple design, fixed between each side with a wider access gap. There is a removable pillar that will allow for access and omit the requirement for a gate. Cllr Kell proposed this be agreed and supported by LPC, Cllr Lawrence-Folds sec-

Trees, Environment & Biodiversity

Update on the Six Free Trees granted to the Parish from SCDC. Verbal update from Cllr Kate Kell and the Clerk. For Information. These have now been planted at various locations throughout the village including Flaxfields and near the fire station by Parsonage Way.

Zero-Carbon Grant

Update on the Zero Carbon Grant project. Verbal update from Cllr Kate Kell and the Clerk. For Information.

The notice board for Leadwell Meadows is currently being designed and 30 new trees have been planted between those at Parsonage Way Green and Leadwell Meadows.

Cllr Hill proposed that the area the new trees are planted in at Leadwell Meadows be named in memory of the Late Enid Bald, who dedicated much of her life to improving and protecting the village of Linton. It was proposed this area be named "Enid's Grove". This was seconded by Cllr Bald, Agreed.

Consideration for the progress to date and proposals on the future use of the Pavilion following the meeting held on Thursday 9th February 2023. Open discussion and Decision required.

The Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) raised that due to time limitations it was recommended by both the RFO and Pavilion Working Group that a short agreement be drafted and implemented to cover the period of 1 year to allow the Parish Council to work with Linton Granta Football Club and The Linton Village Cricket Club to come to a new long-term solution for the pavilion building. Cllr Lawrence- Folds proposed that the RFO draft a new agreement to cover the period May 2023 to March 2024 so that a new long term agreement can be put into place at the beginning of the new financial year. Cllr Hill seconded. Agreed.
