New look for the Free Church

AFTER three years of planning, on August 1st Linton Free Church in Horn Lane begins a major interior refurbishment. The work will last until the end of the year, reopening fully in January 2023. Church services will continue, for the duration of the project, at 10.30 am each Sunday in the Church hall and on Zoom.

The total costs of the project will be around £370,000. The Church members have contributed almost £60,000 themselves and raised a further £125,000 from various grant-making Trusts. The United Reformed Church, who own the buildings, have offered to match this with a grant of up

The project will create a more flexible space downstairs and a far more usable and comfortable

- Pulpit and platform to be replaced by movable staging; The solid wooden gallery balustrade panelling to be replaced with glass, creating better connection between those upstairs and what is happening downstairs; Gallery pews being retained but fitted with seat and back cushions for improved com-
- New audio-visual and sound system to sustain and improve streaming of services and quality of visual presentation and sound in the Church, aided by two large flat screen
- Several energy saving measures, including increased loft insulation, secondary double glazing with E rated glass and new, dimmable, LED lighting throughout.

 As a Listed Building, built in 1818, some features will be retained including the organ, the up-

stairs pews and a section of the gallery panelling that will screen the new sound desk, and which contains the historic Church clock. The exterior will also be repainted.

When the project was recently explained to the children at Church, one young boy commented, "It's like making the Church leave the Middle Ages and become modern!"

The visualisation shown gives a flavour of how the Church will look when completed. The

colour scheme and some of the final details now agreed are slightly different than those shown. The Church has continued to grow in numbers during the pandemic, and we feel the changes will both allow people to come and worship and use the Church building more flexibly, whilst retaining important features that remind us of the past. It will also potentially enable other uses for the wider community.

An Englishman's home is his castle?

THINK again. I was lucky. My alarm alerted a neighbour, who disturbed a gang who were touring the area in a stolen BMW, looking for targets. The car, police said, had been used in a burglary in Bramwell. After threatening my neighbour, they made off, taking nothing and leaving me counting my blessings beginning, of course, with the neighbour. Here's what I learned First, most of us are at work most of the time, and a drive with-

out a car in it suggests an empty house.

They will knock on the door. If they get an answer, they will ask for directions. If they don't, they will go round the back and break in, ignoring any alarm, though it will probably hurry them up. They will make for the bedrooms, which are still where most of us keep jewellery. If they have time, they will ransack the house.

Lesson one is not to keep valuables under the mattress. If our drive has a gate, we should shut it, and preferably lock it, even with only a padlock. Next, make it difficult for them to get to the back of the house. Padlocks on gates, and as well as bolts, help, as do spiky plastic strips and anti-climb paint. Security cameras are not expensive, but it's best not to hope for too much from them, as burglars are usually masked and gloved. Forensic

evidence is rare.
I've attended neighbours' alarms in the past. Burglars will normally just leave if we greet them in a friendly way - this happened to a friend in Saffron Walden recently - though we mustn't take risks. I am upgrading my alarm to one that alerts me by phone if it's activated. I was visited by a retired police officer from www.thebobbyscheme.org, who provided further advice – e.g. that a flimsy trellis on top of a fence makes it harder to climb. The main lesson is that we need to look out for each other! for each other!

they help to maintain the soil structure, preventing this run-off and loss of topsoil from parks and fields. Elms will help with this, as they grow slow and large. Elms are not just a part of our landscape, they are an investment in our children's and grandchildren's future.

The humble Stinger

A CHANCE conversation the other day led me to choose the nettle as a topic. Apparently, my new friend thrashes her husband with nettles to provide relief from arthritis, a treatment called urtification. The sting is supposed to stimulate inflammation, and therefore some how relieve pain. It will occur to you I feel sure that perhaps it just supplied

distraction pain. When I suggested this to Ben, he decided he didn't have arthritis after all.

Nettles are our only common stinging plants and are widespread worldwide, their abundant seeds and yellow roots spreading fast in all habitats, usually reaching 4 foot high in summer and dying back in winter, recovering quickly even after fire. Archeologists have proved they were here long before the Romans. Our version is Urtica Dioca, from the family Urticaceae, with urtica being Latin for sting. They can be recognised by the hairs on the stem, their drooping catkins and the oval toothed leaves. When you have been badly stung, you

somehow feel and see their evil intent next time around. The stinging hairs are called trichomes. and they act like hypodermic needles, injecting histamine and other chemicals into your skin. However, like wasps, there is a good side, in fact several.

For centuries, nettles have been used in the treatment of muscles, joints, gout, eczema, anaemia, arthritis and urinary problems. Nettles in your garden attract all the right kinds of insects, especially as food sources for red admiral butterflies and small tortoiseshell caterpillars. Ladybirds feast on the

aphids that shelter among them, and seed-eating birds enjoy their autumn spoils. The aphids that might be destroying your veg garden are lured to the nettles. Nettles are

an excellent compost activator (avoid the roots), and keen gardeners make liquid fertilisers from shoving them into sealed containers full of water and leaving them for a month. In World War 2, they were

famously gathered by children to produce a dark green dye for camouflage, and the foraging community uses young leaves as an alterna-

tive to spinach for soups and stir fries. Lime Bay Winery made 3000 litres of wine using 40kg of nettles, and De Montfort University made dresses and cushion covers from nettle fibres. Cornish Yarg cheese is wrapped in nettles.

Nettles have been used in folklore: to grasp the nettle is to deal with an issue fully, not just brushing past and kicking it down the road. In some countries, pushing your granny into the nettles means worsening a situation that should be dealt with. Let's end with this old ditty:

Tender-handed stroke a nettle, And it stings you for your pains; Grasp it like a man of mettle, And it soft as silk remains.

The Local Plan is a hugely important document as it dictates where houses can be built in the district over the next 30 years. The proposals were to concentrate all of the development into existing and forthcoming towns - such as Cambourne, Northstowe, Waterbeach New Town etc.

The consultation was an interesting exercise as it was the first opportunity for the land allocations to be officially challenged. The comments will be digested by the District Council and then a final proposal published - time frame TBC. A1307 Upgrades

The next set of upgrades that are being currently implemented on the A1307 is the safer crossing point at the Hildersham junction. This involves putting in a crossing that all nonmotorised users (pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders) can use. This has begun already and will be fully completed in the summer.

Some good news on the route of the Linton Greenway - a 'non-motorised user' route that begins in Cambridge and runs through to Linton. There was a lot of concern over the routing of the greenway through Abington, the issue being whether directing non-motorised users through the village centre is the correct way. There are also proposals to close, or partially close, some of the roads in and out of the village to motorised

vehicles. Following lobbying from residents and your local councillors, the GCP are going to relook at the route down Pampisford Road, avoiding the village centre in its entirety. The cost benefit analysis is due to be completed in the Au-

This has brought people of all ages together, we have a monthly meet with Tots in Tow. The pupils from Granta Special School have visited and we have hosted many charity events. Planning Statement July 2022

LINTON Parish Council (LPC) supports small-scale infill development within the village envelope of Linton Genuinely affordable and social housing is needed in Linton in tandem with smaller homes for downsizers. Some of our younger residents wish to remain in the village where they were born and some of our more mature residents wish to remain in the village, which has been their home for decades, but in a smaller more manageable home thus freeing up

larger homes within the village.

Over the years LPC have supported numerous applications for infill development: Whyts Acre, redevelopment of the old police houses, extensions to Copperfields and the former van centre on Cambridge Road. These developments were appropriate for Linton, in the right place, and within the village envelope. There are ongoing renovations, extensions and well-placed infill housing by many properties within Linton which LPC support. These are sympathetic to the street scenes, retain established trees, make serious provision for water management and are considerate to their neighbours.

The Croudace Development land south of Wheatsheaf Barn, Horseheath Road.

LPC have consistently opposed the development by Ely Diocese and Croudace of the land south of Wheatsheaf Barn, Horseheath Road and are critical of the woefully inadequate role of South Cambs District Council in ensuring the planning, build and inspection process was undertaken lawfully and correctly to protect both new residents, future residents, and, existing

residents of Linton.
Sites outside the village envelope, such as the Croudace and Abbey developments, were granted consent in 2017 when the previous Local Plan was out of date. The loophole of not having a local plan in place was used by Ely Diocese to gain outline consent which was approved at Appeal. Two applications were made for 50+ homes which were refused by SCDC because of the general overall effect on the landscape and the approach to village. In 2017 this application was reduced to 42 homes and The Planning Inspectorate surprisingly gave the approval to Ely Diocese for up to 42 houses with a set of pre commencement conditions. Nothing should have been built on the site before these conditions were met, particularly surface water and foul water pre commencement conditions. In planning terms these conditions should have been discharged (approved) before any development started on site to confirm that the schemes include "appropriate flood mitigation measures". By allowing Croudace to start development before these conditions were discharged, SCDC ignored their own Planning Policy statement that development should 'not cause flooding on the site or increase risk of flooding elsewhere.

At every stage LPC tried to convey to Case Officers and District Planning Committees the elements they were not scrutinising sufficiently and the pre commencement conditions they were ignoring. LPC expressed the known problems of the site from a knowledge base on the council of four decades and contributions shared by parishioners who have been part of the village for generations. These concerns were diminished and ignored as nimbyism despite the composition of LPC having a strong academic base, deep technical knowledge and decades of local knowledge. So, deep agricultural drainage ditches were filled in, established mature hedgerows removed, the land used as a water meadow was built on and no understanding of water flow from farmland above the site was planned for

THE LINTON Parish Council recently met with the Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough to discuss the increase of vandalism and anti-social behaviour in the village. In preparation for our discussions the office was able to give reference to over twenty crimes featured on Facebook, few of which had been reported to the office. The PCC had also done their homework and were able to advise that there were very few reported incidents on their system for Linton, and partly due to these low statistics, police presence had not been increased.

It is beneficial to post about crime on social media, it alerts everyone online and often allows the victims to vent their emotions, but it is essential to report crimes when they happen. We can hardly blame the police for thinking that Linton is peaceful if they don't have any records or reports to show otherwise.

The Parish Council Office is not responsible for traffic offences, such as speeding and illegal parking, these issues must be reported, with evidence, directly to the Cambridgeshire Constabulary via 101.

On the subject of speeding in Linton, the village has an ex-tremely active Speedwatch Team who hold regular weekly sessions in various locations. The data is collated and sent through to the Cambridgeshire Constabulary. They are actively seeking more volunteers. Remote training is provided, free of charge. If you are concerned about speeding in Linton and are able to give

a couple of hours a month please get in touch with the office.

In addition to the excellent work that the Speedwatch volunteers do, the Parish Council have a Mobile Speed Indicator Devise (MSID) the MSID is placed in numerous locations on a rotational basis. This provides data which can help support applications for reductions in speed limits and traffic calming measures. The Linton Parish Council have recently requested more locations are added and are waiting for the go ahead from Cambridge County Council (CCC)

a scheme, would not listen. The Surface Water Drainage Strategy was recommended for approval seven weeks to the day before the village was flooded. Damage and flooding occurred throughout the village but the damage from this site, evident by its colour, occurred from Lonsdale through Bakers Lane to Finchams Close, while also affecting Bartlow Road, Emson's Close and Mill Lane. The route the water took is well documented eventually exiting through the foul sewer manhole on Horn Lane and directly into our protected chalk stream – the river Granta. We appreciate all the work civic minded residents made to record this.

Everything LPC has done to demonstrate the flaws in the plans and implementation of those plans has been done to protect current residents of the village and future residents of the site. The Pre-Commencement conditions have now been agreed by SCDC, but the development of the site remains unlawful. LPC consider there are still problems with the site and are very concerned that these problems now rest upon the shoulders of our new residents. Residents of The Pastures are now liable for the resolution of

problems caused by sewerage and surface water issues on the site. If these problems affect the rest of the village they are liable for those too! This is not usual procedure. Please be aware that section 1 of the Defective Premises Act has now been extended to six years after the completion of the dwelling. The current MP has all the relevant information should you have any problems with the site in the future and the planning documents are on the SCDC planning website. We hope you never have need of them.

Surely there is a better way to build a housing development?
