Singing at St. Mary's

FOR his first concert at the helm of New Cambridge Singers, James Potter has chosen a programme built around Chorales. These formed the bedrock of much of Bach's music and of Lutheran hymn singing and today are heard and much loved in a huge number of well-known works. Bach and his contemporaries (and sons!) knew and loved these powerful songs, using them as the foundation for much of their devotional music, from the grandeur of the *St. Matthew Passion* to smaller Cantatas. For Brahms, they were a way to connect his music to the baroque motets he so admired. Mendelssohn used one as the culmination of his Epiphany sequence describing the star above Bethlehem. Right up to the present day, English composers Philip Moore and John Rutter, and Norwegian Knut Nystedt, use chorales respectively as a vehicle for prayer, a celebration of light, and a timeless meditation on the eternal. This concert will present a rich tapestry of colour which the listener will find deeply rewarding. While there is a performance in Cambridge a week earlier, the concert in St. Mary's Church at Linton will take place on Saturday 23rd March at 7.30pm. system to help vulnerable people. In the past, the less fortunate relied on parish relief or the generosity of the better-off. Some wealthy benefactors left money for the provision of almshouses. You can see an article on almshouses on the Hundred Parishes website at www.hundredparishes.org uk. Other philanthropists helped the poor by giving money in various ways. Some churches record this benevolence on large benefactor boards. In St. Peters, Ugley, we are told that Robert Bucke, a draper, in his will of 1620 gave 'three suits of clothes to three poor men and three suits to three poor women with hats to be given every third year for ever. In Little Hadham, the church of St. Cecilia has a board recording that Miss Ann Scott, in her 1865 will, left dividends to the rector and church wardens to distribute bread on Shrove Sunday each year, at their discretion, to the poor of the Parish.
Hatfield Broad Oak's Church of St. Mary the Virgin has a brass plaque describing the generosity of John Gobert. He left £600 in his will of 1623 for the purchase of land, the

proceeds from which were to be distributed in a variety of ways including £4 per annum to the town of Hatfield Broad Oak. His heir, Sir John Barrington, subsequently bought the manor of Keeres in Aythorpe Roothing to comply with the will Please look out for more proclamations of generosity.

Biopuff?

NEVER heard of Biopuff? It's a product resulting from paludiculture. None the wiser? Step forward the Cambs Great Fen Peatlands Progress Project, aiming to link the two fragments of original fen, Woodwalton Fen and Holme Fen at Speechy's Farm. This is the 120-acre site on which the Wildlife Trust, scientists, business people and land managers are coming together to put into practice a sustainable alternative to drainage-based agriculture. The aim is to combine reduction of greenhouse gases through rewetting, but continuing using the land for biomass production. So now we are practicing paludiculture, to sow, grow and harvest in wetlands, providing an income stream for growers. The money for the project has been provided by the Paludiculture Exploration fund, and is administered by DEFRA and Natural England.

There are about 80 different types of crop which can be grown in bog, but this particular project, like others in different parts of the UK, is concentrating on bulrushes. These are now being planted in huge quantities and harvested by an emerging material science company called SaltyCo, one of many companies trying to make the fashion industry less damaging to the environment. One of their products is Biopuff, an alternative to goosedown and polyester. It takes 20 bulrush seedheads to make one jacket, and is a real competitor to polyester filled jackets, which shed toxic micro fibres and are derived from

Linton Gardening Club Diary

THE February meeting of Linton Gardening Club was cancelled as the speaker became unavailable on the day.

Climate and the weather dictate gardening practice. The last few months have been particularly soggy with almost double the average rainfall recorded in our garden since October. With the soil so wet, one of the first reliable indicators of Spring, the soil so wet, one of the first reliable indicators of Spring, the buzzing of the lawnmower releasing the scent of freshly cut grass could be delayed. Catkins, daffodils and, by month end, tulips and hyacinths should be on show, providing essential early sweet nectar for foraging bees. If mild enough, I'll sow tomato seeds in clean trays of fresh seed compost on a warm windowsill and cover with plastic. Dahlias can be brought out of winter storage and potted up but must be kept frost free. The early strong shoots can be used for cuttings if you want to bulk up your plants for free.



District and County Councillors' Report -February 2024

Civil Parking Enforcement

AS previously reported the local authorities in South Cambridgeshire have spent the last few years preparing and applying to the Secretary of State to take parking enforcement powers away from the Police and manage locally. The new traffic wardens are now active, out on the street, and issuing parking fines. There were certainly some unhappy people at Whittlesford Station first week of Feb.

The County Council have a list of problem areas in each of our villages, supplied by Henry with support from Parish Councils, but if anyone feels that there are specific areas where parking is really an issue, do let him know directly.

On a related note – the Councils are now also going through the formal process to take bus lane enforcement away from the Police and manage this in-house as well.

Home Energy Support

THE District Council is in a partnership with 6 other local authorities in Cambridgeshire, called Action on Energy. This partnership is aimed to help people create more energy efficient homes, therefore making them cheaper to run. FOR those of you wanting to keep abreast of this – there is currently a proposal from the Minister for Levelling Up and Housing, Michael Gove, to build circa 150,000 houses (it was originally 250,000) in Cambridge to support the growing tech and life science sector in the region. This has hit some stumbling blocks. Namely the lack of water in Cambridgeshire with no concrete plans to improve this before 2030, as well as the fact that South Cambridgeshire has a lot of land called 'Green Belt' which is a protected area that can't be developed on, usually at the edge of cities. In spite of these issues, the plans remain on the table and

the local authorities - South Cambs District Council, Cambridge City Council & Cambridgeshire County Council - are fighting to stay at the table to maintain some influence on the proposals, if and when they come to fruition. Lots more to come on this.

Budgets

FEBRUARY is always the time when local authorities set their budgets for the forthcoming municipal year. The County Council needs to find around £20m worth of savings whilst maintaining the services they provide, not an easy task. The District Council is in a much healthier financial position and won't need to make savings this coming year.



Speedwatch Summary June - December 2023

THE Linton Speedwatch Team has 10 volunteers and conducts sessions on all key roads within the village. Each one hour session is completed either early weekday morning, mid afternoon or on a Saturday. Here is a summary

morning, mid afternoon or on a saturday. Here is a summary for the period from mid June - mid December 2023.

A total of 111 sessions were delivered which included three marathons. A Speedwatch marathon is defined as multiple sessions being completed during the same day across different locations. The speed of 14,247 vehicles were checked with 1,323 recorded as speeding (9.3%). A number of vehicles were recorded with excessive speed on more than one occesion within the 6 month period.

number of ventices were recorded with excessive speed on more than one occasion within the 6 month period.

Balsham Road recorded 22% of vehicles speeding, followed by Hadstock Road at 16%, High Street (which to remind you has a limit of 20mph) at 9%, Back Road 6% and Horseheath Road 4%. Session times and days varied across all locations, with a clear pattern emerging for each location which will bely the term in planning future accessions.

Many positive comments were received by Speedwatch volunteers from local residents and some suggestions for the team to consider. The team are only able to operate during daylight hours and in dry weather. All feedback is listened to and will help to fine tune sessions during 2024 which have now started.

Even one hour per month can make a difference helping to increase speed awareness in our village.

Also keeping appropriate records and obviously paying the Parish Council office staff to make sure all this continues.

Every year the Councillors and Officers go over every

Every year the Councillors and Officers go over every proposed cost and discuss what we must spend and what we would like to spend. We look at where we can save money and where we have to spend money to keep Linton as a desirable place to live. To support this aim we give grants to groups and societies that promote sport (eg netball, football and cricket) or welfare (eg Beacon Youth Trust, Age UK Community Warden and Relate) or safety (eg Speedwatch, MSIDs). Each request for a grant is scrutinised to see how it supports Linton parishioners.

We are acutely aware that we are spending your money (and ours, as we get Council Tax bills as well).

As with most things in life, apart from rain, this year's precept is going up. However, we have endeavoured to keep this year's budget as tight as possible. At the end of keep uns year s ouuget as tignt as possible. At the end of the day, if your property has a Council Tax Banding C, this will mean you will pay an extra 22p/week – less for bands A & B, and slightly more for bands D to H.

Age UK Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, Community Warden Service

LAST month I wrote a piece in Parish Matters and I got some of my facts wrong, so I would like to write some corrections. Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough is a local independent charity, meaning it is responsible for raising all funds to deliver services to local older people, however, they are a brand partner with Age UK National

The point of the article was to bring attention to the fact that this Community Warden Service exists and that the Parish Council gives money (£6,236 last year) along with other funders, to help make sure it continues to exist as we believe it is a valuable resource. The money goes direct to Age UK Cambridgeshire & Peterborough who are responsible for the management and delivery of the service.

The Community Warden assists older people to continue to live independently at home by providing daily contact (Monday to Friday) The service is flexible to individual need, usually consisting of a daily phone call and 2 visits a week on average. This community warden service is specific to residents in Linton. At the moment our community warden is supporting 11 households and has capacity to support more. The support can be on a short- or long-term basis.

At present the scheme is able to offer a 4-week FREE trial (usually 2 weeks) and thereafter, a weekly fee is payable: £10 per week for single person and £12 per week for a couple.
