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Extra cash for potholes

SOUTH Cambs MP Lucy Frazer has announced an extra £4.1 million in the fight against potholes in Cambridgeshire. The County is facing a pothole crisis after freezing conditions and heavy rain in recent months. The sight of traffic cones in potholes has become a part of daily life in Linton and the surrounding villages, where the weather has been causing even newly repaired holes to open back up.

Mrs Frazer told the Linton News that she is pleased to have secured the new funds as part of a £200 million pound boost to the national Potholes Fund in the Spring Budget. Potholes can cause damage to cars, but more importantly, are a serious safety hazard to cyclists, mobility scooters and more vulnerable pedestrians.

"Although it is the responsibility of Cambridgeshire County Council to repair the highways in my constituency, I have always been happy to report problems on behalf of my constituents and follow-up with the authority if any issues remain outstanding," Mrs. Frazer said. you can commit to being available. To apply you must be over 18 and possess a good level of physical fitness, you must also live within five minutes of the station. In Cambridgeshire, on-call firefighters make up more than half of the total workforce, and are a vital part of keeping the local community safe. MILESTONES have been part of our heritage for centuries. They were an important element of the Roman road network, positioned to indicate the distance travelled or to be travelled. In 1767, milestones were made compulsory on all turnpikes, the toll roads managed by turnpike trusts, although many local milestones were in place before then. There are around 40 surviving milestones within The Hundred Parishes, mostly along three highways that run between London and Cambridge. These highways are now called B1383 (formerly A11), B1368 and A10. The milestones are marked on Ordnance Survey maps as "MS".

One of the earliest and most visible milestones can be seen in Barkway, a historic coaching village. It was installed in 1728, one of the 16 milestones funded at the time by a trust established in 1586 by a former master of Trinity Hall, Cambridge. Additional milestones were added by the Wadesmill Turnpike Trust in 1742, some along the old Roman Road, Ermine Street, now A10, and others along the alternative route, now mostly called B1368. Over time, the inscriptions became weather-worn and many stones were upgraded in 1894 by the addition of a cast iron plate.

Most milestones in Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire are listed but only one in Essex is included on the National Heritage List - the large three sided iron milepost in the centre of Stansted Mountfitchet on the B1383. This is probaby the newest in the Hundred Parishes, having been installed in the early 1900s. The earlier milestones along the old A11 would have been installed by the Hockerill Turnpike Trust which was responsible from 1744 to 1870 for 28 miles of highway between Harlow and Stump Cross.

With large photos of helicopters and crews, he gave lots of information on how the service started, the medical equipment carried to treat patients at the scene, the numbers of people they

help and a wide variety of cases to which they are called. A pilot's helmet was passed around as an example of the vital equipment needed to stay in contact with the service and to find a suitable place to land as close as possible to where the patient is.

This all emphasised the vital work carried out by the teams whose yellow helicopters we often see on their way to Papworth, Addenbrookes or hospitals in London, journeys which would take much longer by road, increasing patient risk.

Nick reminded us that as a charity the service, with enormously high costs each time a helicopter is called out, runs purely on donations and bequests. It was a very enjoyable and informative visit and Nick will be returning to demonstrate resuscitation techniques, including using a defibrillator.

Our next meeting will be at 2pm on Tuesday 9th May at the Chalklands Community Centre.

How horses help the mind

Goddard, assisted by her friend Marlon, **INSPIRING WOMEN** her gave

first presentation about her equine assisted learning therapy centre run from her parents' farm in Little Walden. Georgie grew up around horses, worked at riding schools and livery stables, gained her British Horse Society Stage 1 and 2 qualifica-tions, got a degree in Criminology and Sociology, volunteered with the YMCA assisting homeless and at-risk youths, worked at a rescue horses sanctuary and volunteered as a groom at Audley End.

After volunteering with Equine Assisted Learning, she started her own centre in 2022. She works with mainly school-age children (7 - 14)with autism, mental health issues or learning disabilities, referred by the council. Each child is given 10 hours to see if it's going to work – afterwards they will figure out what sort of thing they are going to like. The sessions can include feeding chickens and egg collection, dog walks, nature watching, poo picking, horse care, cooking, trips out, craftwork, DIY projects, computer or written learning. The outcome could be a return to full time

Georgie works by the principle of the 3 R's (Repeat, Report, Reflect) and active listening. She ensures the welfare of the animals (if a horse doesn't want to be caught in the field, she doesn't work with that horse). Case studies include a 14 year old with social anxiety and autism who is now back in school after one day a week at the centre. Another achieved British Horse Society level 1 and 2 qualifications after having got no GCSE's.

Georgie showed us photos of her two horses and two ponies. Her two spaniels, which she had brought with her, were made a great fuss of by our members.

The speaker at our next meeting on 2nd May will be John Short from the Arthur Rank Hospice. Meeting in the Village Hall, Coles Lane at 7.30pm. New members are always welcome and can be assured of a convivial evening. If you want to get to know people, why not give us a try? You can come as a visitor for a small charge as a taster. The delightful hooligans of the bird world

IN CASE you thought every bird species was under threat, rooks crow. Rooks are highly sociable, crows are solitary. A useful are clearly bucking the trend. You only have to stand at the Dog and Duck, look up into the magnificent plane tree, and listen between March and May and you will be met

with a rasping, leathery, parched, raucous, strangled, brawling, plaintive, discordant, and incomprehensible cacophony. Not exactly the sweet sounding dawn chorus, and no wonder the collective noun is called a Parliament of Rooks. I'm not as dedicated as the naturalist Roger Deakin, who camped overnight under a rookery and came up with the above description of the racket. However at around 10pm the treetop chatter quietens down, and peace reigns.

Rooks are just astonishingly adaptive and clever. They can live for 20 years and form lifelong pair bonds. They seek safety and success in numbers, building their nests close to roads and villages

where food is more plentiful. They eat absolutely anything and everything. They are a lot bigger than jackdaws which have grey heads and unlike crows, have grey bills and baggy trouser feathers around their legs.

The Latin name for a rook is *Corvus Frugilegus*, and they are far more widespread than the very slightly larger carrion way to remember the difference is the well known saying "A rook on its own is a crow". Rooks flock and feed and roost with jackdaws, foraging in fields all day and returning to the rookery in the evening. When Mr Deakin was lying underneath the rookery, the rooks were clearly communicating. Private muted notes for family only around the nest, squeaking contentment, but louder exchanges concerning availability of food, establishing the status of individuals, censuring of anti-social behaviour and advertising clear ownership of nests. Rooks rebuild their nests on top of last year's nests, and young rooks try to nest in their parents' rookery. They use pliable twigs interwoven against storms, sometimes stealing twigs from one another, causing even

more of a racket. Occasionally a top heavy nest will crash to the ground, and you can see they're lined with hair, wool, leaves, grass and even clay. Young rooks mew

for food with their tails fanned, and then practise flying and doing breathtaking dives in strong winds.

In folklore, being large and black, rooks have often been associated with trickery and bad omens, but when you see them strutting, bowing and cawing as they court, it's hard to keep a straight face.

Marsh Mail: skiing, dance & a literary festival

AT the end of the spring term a large company of students performed in our annual dance show. This year's theme was songs from the movies. The audience was treated to a great variety of star performances with film scores from James Bond, Top Gun, Mamma Mia and a number of other iconic musical numbers.

Ninety-nine students in Years 8-10 were accompanied by twelve members of staff on a week-long skiing trip to Salzburg, Austria at the start of the Easter holidays. Unfortunately, channel crossing queues and other unforeseen delays shortened their time on the slopes but everyone showed a great deal of positivity and resilience. AT the April meeting of the Linton Gardening Club, Dr. Ian Bedford gave a practical and thought provoking talk on "Companion Planting for a Well-Balanced Garden". The idea that strongly scented and/or brightly coloured plants can deter pests on vegetables is used by many gardeners and in any case makes for an attractive way of gardening. A second mode of action is using companion plants as a sacrifice, luring the pests into attacking their less valued companions!

The next club meeting is in the Village Hall at 7.30pm on Tuesday May 9 when John Hewson will talk on "Ideas for Labour-Saving Gardening"

On Saturday May 13th, from 10am to midday, the club is holding a fundraising coffee morning in the lovely garden of 3 Mill Lane. Entry is £4 to include tea and cake. Accompanied children under 16 are admitted free. There will be some plants and produce on sale. Donations of cakes, plants or produce are welcome.

In the garden, nip off the spent flower heads and, importantly,

the seed capsules of daffodils so that all the plant's energy goes back into the bulb. The tulips are putting on a good show; bright reds, oranges and purples contrast well with equally bright under planted pansies. The white leucojums (snowflakes) are also doing well. After the hard frosts, some of our hardy fuchsias are now re-sprouting from the

base. In the borders, flowering, variegated and coloured evergreen shrubs are at their best and have had frost damaged and reverting shoot tips pruned out. Most of the deciduous shrubs are coming into leaf, including an orange tinted Spiraea which seems to have thrived despite the frosts and rain.



Combined Authority appoints new CEO

The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority has appointed Rob Bridge as the new permanent Chief Executive to take over from the interim CEO Gordon Mitchell, under whose leadership the Combined Authority has been under a very significant programme of change and transformation. The Authority has had a difficult birth but recent appointments have been of a high calibre and with help and guidance from Central Government, it appears to be making progress in terms of its

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governance and clarity of purpose. This cannot be too soon! Rob Bridge has a solid background in local government, and we wish him well.

£2 Bus Fare Extended

The Government subsidy capping bus fares at £2 per journey, due to end this month, has been extended to the end of June.

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

The popular ZCC grant from South Cambs is open again for bids until June 2^{nd} . There is a pot of £125,000 available for community groups and parish councils to bid for up to £15,000 for a project that will help with the reduction of carbon emissions in the district. Potholes

The issue of potholes is raised with us every winter, when the problem is exacerbated due to the colder weather. However, this year the issue seems to be a lot worse than it has in previous years. Potholes are appearing at a faster rate than previously and holes that have been filled are reopening at a larger size than before.

Cambridgeshire Highways, who have responsibility for maintaining public roads and footpaths, are attempting to address the problem as soon as they are able. However, they are up against the usual constraints - staff and money. Their contractor only has a set number of crews that they can deploy to fill them and the Highways dept. only has a limited budget for filling them. The County Council pumps more and more money into the Highways budget each year but it is never enough to do the job thoroughly.

The Highways dept. are looking at improved technology to try to speed up and improve the quality of the process but this will be some years off implementation. The message from Highways is to keep reporting them via the website - https://www. cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/travel-roads-and-parking/ roads-and-pathways/roadworks-and-faults - the more reports of certain holes the more the council sees the issue.

Food waste trial

For those that have voluntarily taken part in the food waste collection trial for the last 3 years, thank you. You will have seen that the trial concluded at the end of March with 3 years of data under its belt. The reason for the trial is that the government will be insisting that food waste is collected separately by the end of 2027 and the District Council (who collect our rubbish) wanted to see if people would take to using a separate food caddy correctly. The good news is that over 90% of participants in the trial did, so this will be the likely new method of food collection in the future.



Planning Committee Report 2023

ANOTHER year in planning has come to an end, and it has been an eventful one – it's safe to say that planning in Linton is never boring!

We have held 19 Committee meetings, reviewed and commented on 109 planning applications and a further 24 applications for works on trees. These have been for a full range of development with the potential to change the appearance of our village, its listed buildings or the conservation area and/or affect the facilities we enjoy.

We've reviewed all manner of applications from garden offices and sensitive extensions, to outline plans for a new commercial development on Station Road, and most recently the controversial outline application that many residents will have noticed - for a property and associated garage and gardens on the amenity land on Dolphin Close. On this note, the Parish Council would like to thank the residents of Dolphin Close who worked with us to raise awareness of the application and everyone who took the time to comment. Sixty-six individuals sent in comments about the proposed plans, all requesting the refusal of the application. Reading the report from the planning officer, these comments carried huge weight in the decision-making process with the result being that SCDC refused the application at the end of March. The decision notice states that the development was unacceptable in principle as it would significantly harm the character of the area and detract from the quality of the landscaping and public space in the site

So, the amenity land will remain as amenity land for now - and, we hope, in the long term; but as the new owner spent £43,000 for the land, plus all the fees (possibly in the region of £60,000 in total), we hope that everyone who sent comments will be just as willing to make future representations if another application comes back. Unfortunately, the comments sent in already would not be carried forward to a new application, so please keep an eye on our agendas and other communications just in case

The Croudace development on Horseheath Road is now almost complete. I use the word "almost" because the road levels at the entrance to Michaelotts and the surface water scheme still don't look to match the approved plans. The Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA) are investigating the discrepancies, and we hope that the flood protection plans will be fully implemented soon to prevent homes both on the site and on neighbouring roads from suffering the distress and upheaval of flooding.

The Abbey development on Bartlow Road is now well underway. The loss of the hedges at the front of the site has been reported to enforcement, but we are yet to receive a response. The Ecology team at SCDC decided that they were not prepared to fight for the mature Horse Chestnut trees by Fincham's Close, so they should eventually be replaced by some young trees between the houses and the river. We are still waiting for our village signs to be put back where they belong. None of the authorities involved have ever admitted to allowing Abbey to move them! By the time you read this, the appeal for the foul water connection will have been heard. We would like to thank residents for coming to support us in trying to limit the negative effects of the development on our sewage system.

The "White Van Centre" or 20 Cambridge Road will now be developed as 14 affordable one- and two-bedroom apartments. The developer still needs to discharge most of the conditions, but hopefully the final build will address some of the need for this type of smaller housing in the village.

In addition to working with residents or commenting on the larger or more controversial developments, over the last year

WE ARE planning an exhibition of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan in the Linton Village Hall on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th May.

It is important that we receive as much input and feedback from residents as possible as the plan will influence future decision-making when considering all planning applications. Please take this opportunity to shape and enhance your local area, ensuring we haven't forgotten or overlooked something that is important to you under the following headings:

- Location and Housing
- Character and Heritage

· Environment, Biodiversity and Local Agriculture, and **Flood Protection**

• Public Spaces, Allotments, Footpaths and Recreation Grounds

• Road Safety and Pedestrians

The Greater Cambridge Local Plan is under review following feedback from the first call for sites. There is no current intention for re-consultation on the overall strategy until the draft plan has been drawn up. Given the amount of additional development (both commercial and residential) that has had to be included, it is not yet clear whether their original strategy to ensure that no further large-scale developments take place in the South Cambridgeshire Villages will remain in the longer term.

We therefore aim to submit our Plan for examination as soon as possible, acknowledging that it is likely we will have to start work on the next version once the new Local Plan is adopted. LPC Planning Commitee

Linton put forward for the Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

 Worked with the Senior Conservation officer in the appraisal of our Conservation Area. We were pleased to succeed in adding Little Linton and the land that separates Linton from Little Linton in our Conservation Area

• Produced over 500 pages of evidence for the Foul Water Appeal on Bartlow Road.

• Presented the case for the village at SCDC Planning Committee meetings and,

• Made site visits to a number of homes in the village to discuss their development plans. These site visits are invaluable, and we still encourage anyone considering development in the village to come and talk to us to help us understand the works proposed and for us to discuss things we know will be looked at by the planning officers.

Finally, I would like to thank the members of the Planning Committee: Merrie Mannassi, Helen Lawrence-Foulds and Guy Ennew and our substitutes: Karen Sanderson, Caitlin Seaward, and John Bald. Thank you for your time, knowledge and skills in reviewing the applications and for changing personal plans and being available for meetings at short notice when these have been critical for making decisions in a timely manner.

As always, your experience of our village helps ensure that our comments reflect the local knowledge and perspective that would otherwise be unknown to planners responsible for making the decisions.

Many thanks also to all our office staff, and, when it comes to planning, particularly to Maria who stays on top of everything planning related. Finally thanks also to our planning consultant, Corrie Newell, for her invaluable support again this year. Thank you!

Chairman's Comment.

Cllr John Bald proposed that permission be granted to LGFC, free of charge due to the charitable nature of the event. Cllr Brian Cox seconded. All Agreed.

Consideration for the offer from Linton Aztecs Junior Football club to donate the two practice football goalposts, currently situated on the Recreation Ground, to the Parish to eliminate concerns regarding the liability implications to the club.

Cllr John Bald proposed that the practice goalpost be removed and disposed of by the Linton Aztecs Football Club. Cllr Brain Cox seconded. All Agreed. Clerk

Consideration of costs involved in replacing two goalposts on the Recreation Ground if the decision is made to decline the donation from the Linton Aztecs Junior Football Club. Supporting documents available in councillor packs. Cllr Helen Lawrence Foulds proposed that two replacement football posts be purchased and installed by the Linton Parish Council up to a budget of £3,000.00. Cllr Simon Hill seconded. All Agreed.

Trees, Environment & Biodiversity

Consideration for parishioner's concerns regarding the planting of trees and installation of a bench on Parsonage Way green. Cllr Kate Kell advised that decisions had been made with due consideration and that all anti-social behaviour incidents should be reported to the Cambridgeshire Police and copied into the Parish Council office.
