





LAURENCE Wood recounted his NHS 47year career history as a senior nurse and senior lecturer. He started training at Chelmsford hospital, the only man in his group, with 24 ladies. When he qualified, he worked as a staff nurse for two years in Casualty, Medical and Surgical. He did a course in intensive care at Brighton and passed. He did another course at Addenbrooke's for neurosurgery and was a charge nurse for three years, after which he had to make a decision - management or teaching. He chose teaching at Ipswich full-time as a qualified clinical tutor, gaining a diploma in education at South Bank University. He became a lecturer at Addenbrooke's focusing on neuromedical and neurosurgery. When Laurence retired in 2008, he was determined to go back to hands-on nursing. He worked at the Hope Nursing Home at Brooklands Avenue in Cambridge for five years, dealing mainly with end of life care. When the home closed, he was made redundant for the first time in his life. Dry stone walls



There are apparently 800 different names for DSWs, from the earliest ones found in Ireland dating back to 3800BC. To confuse us flatlanders, in Scotland they are called dykes. They are still the agricultural boundary of choice for the uplands, being such sturdy, beautiful, low maintenance, and wonderfully permanent works of art, in areas where hedges do not thrive.

Originally, walls were made from stones and boulders cleared from fields in preparation for agriculture. The most common stone used is limestone, as it splits easily and is much lighter than granite. The method of construction varies depending on the stone available, its intended use and local tradition. It is an extremely slow process, with every stone examined, chosen and positioned with care. The simplest type is a single wall, a sort of random rubble, the best of a bad job. Much more common is the double wall. This involves two rows of stones along the proposed boundary, the bottom ones being at least 4 inches underground. The two rows of flattish stones diminish in size as the wall rises, with large tie stones, also called through stones, spanning both sides and enabling the two rows to be connected and leaning towards each other for greatly increased strength. The voids between stones are carefully filled with smaller stones. Many walls are then *capped* with upright thinner stones, with the purpose of preventing the wall from deteriorating from the top down. The capping stones can be vertical, horizontal, or even crenellated with alternate large and small stones. Sometimes the capping stones overhang on one side, apparently making it wolf-proof in former times.

Many walls have holes for badgers to pass, holes large enough for sheep and not cattle, holes for rabbits, and even for beehives. They may include very long through stones to create stiles, and even squeeze stiles to allow humans to pass through. The book included a description of a couple who had undertaken to repair the wall along the Dorset coast path. Progess was glacial – a truly impressive work of dedication. In this case the land was flat – imagine how hard it is to do a decent job when there is a significant slope!

We may not have dry stone walls here in Linton, but we have flint walls. Even more difficult to build and especially to maintain. If you have a young person in the family looking for a career, a fully qualified Master Builder in flint or dry stone walls will be busy forever.



Granta Medical Practices Update

HERE at Granta, we continue to offer a mixture of face to face, telephone and online appointments. I would like to take this opportunity to explain how our appointments system works and what is available to Granta patients.

Firstly, please be reassured that no-one apart from clinicians makes clinical decisions about your care when you first contact us. Our reception teams have clear criteria, set by GPs, covering what can be put straight onto a clinician's urgent list. However, if they or you are unsure, they will take your details and discuss your concerns with the clinical team and then get back to you.

When ringing for an appointment you will be asked if there is a particular clinician you would like to see, either for continuity of your presenting problem or continuity of overall care. It may be that you don't mind who you see you just need to speak to someone about your current medical problem. Please do help our reception team by providing as much information as possible. All information is treated as confidential and will only be used for triage purposes. They are simply trying to make sure you are seen by the right person, in the right place, at the right time.

If you feel your problem is not urgent, you will be asked if a routine appointment may be more suitable, or perhaps a long term medical conditions appointment, a palliative care appointment, or whether we can help you in any other way.

If your appointment starts with a telephone call then, together with the clinician, it can be decided whether a face to face appointment will be the appropriate next step.

Routine appointments are available a few weeks in advance, all pre-bookable via our reception teams and online. New routine appointments are released daily at 8am and at 2pm to allow for regular availability.

If you ring and there is nothing available, our reception team can send you a link that is valid for seven days (that you can check daily) to pre-book a face to face or telephone appointment, so that you do not need to ring back.

Alternatively, if you would prefer, you could use Accurx Patient Triage via our website to have an online consultation with a clinician. We do ask, however, that you only send routine queries as it can take up to 72 hours to respond.

There will always be sickness, annual leave and the perception that clinicians are not seeing patients. However, on average, Granta's doctors and nurses see around 4,000 patients face to face per week, and consult with another 3,500 via the telephone and online. We continue to try and accommodate all of our patients in a way that suits and please be assured that we are continuously reviewing and revising patient access.

District and County Councillor's Report – January 2024

Solar Farm Application - update

We have previously reported on a potential planning application coming forward in our area for a solar farm. The size of the area being considered is fairly significant, some 900 hectares. If this were to gain planning permission, it would currently make it one of the largest solar farms in Europe. The geographic area being looked at is from the north of Linton/Abington up to Balsham and west, roughly following the route of the Roman Road, across the A11 to the edge of Fulbourn. The promoters of this idea, Kingsway Solar, were due to be going public with their plans on December 14th, but we understand this has been delayed until this month, January.

Stagecoach Updated Timetable

Stagecoach announced some proposed changes to the 13 service back in December, coming into force on March 3rd. On further inspection it only relates to some of the places that the bus will stop at in Haverhill, so won't really affect us in Cambridgeshire. Uttlesford Local Plan

Some may recall that a few years ago, Uttlesford District Council (our neighbours in north Essex), were proposing a new town of circa 5,000 houses to be built at Great Chesterford. They were told by a government planning inspector that this wasn't sustainable and to think again. They have recently published their next proposal which doesn't include any large-scale developments near to the Cambridgeshire border. So those who were concerned, especially the parishes south of the A1307, can hopefully rest easy!

Budgets

February is always the time when local authorities set their budgets for the forthcoming municipal year. The County Council needs to find around £2m worth of savings whilst maintaining the services they provide. Not an easy task. The District Council is in a much healthier financial position and won't need to make savings this coming year.

Brief A1307 Update

The cones have been removed from the Dean Road junction section of the road, with the new remodelled crossing now finished and operational. The final stages are the completion of the roundabout and associated footpaths. Bartlow Road, Linton is currently scheduled to reopen mid-February, but as with all construction projects, this is subject to weather, etc.

Anaerobic Digestion Plant Proposals

In our area we have not one, but two planning applications submitted to the relevant local authorities for bio energy digestion plants. These are plants that break down agricultural materials and turn them into energy. For reference, there is one on the A505 between Royston and Baldock

The first application is located just over the Suffolk border, outside of Haverhill and off the A1307. The site runs up the Cambridgeshire border and ends at the edge of West Wickham/ Weston Colville. You may have seen signs for the anti-lobbying group 'Muck Off Acorn' – this refers to this application. As the application is in Suffolk it will be Suffolk County Council making the decision on, but whilst the time for public comments has closed, you can still look at the plans and write to the case office dealing with the application - and rew.rutter@suffolk.gov.uk

Rural Prosperity Fund

There is a new fund, soon to be released by the District Council, called the Rural Prosperity Fund. This is money from the government to aid economic and social activity in rural areas, such as ours. More detail to follow as the Council makes a decision on how to distribute this money, but there is a fairly significant amount available. Watch this space.

LHI Bids

This years round of Local Highway Improvement (LHI) bids are now open for parish councils to submit a proposal for funding for a small highway improvement project in our area. Our parishes have been successful in the past and funding has enabled some small, albeit much needed, improvements to the highway network that wouldn't usually form a part of the Highway budget. ACEs, The Mobile Warden and Age Concern UK

AS MANY of you know we have a wonderful little organisation called the ACEs (Activities & Care for the Elderly) in Linton. They organise social events, including lunches, days out etc. It is a registered Charity.

The Parish Council has for many years given a sizable grant to the ACEs, which is then forwarded to Age Concern UK and this contributes to the funding of the Mobile Warden.

Some of you may know our current Mobile Warden, Chrissy Sayer. There are currently 11 people or households that make use of her services.

However, recently, Age Concern have cut down her hours, so now she is only able to make a daily phone call and two fifteen minute home visits, which is supposed to be for running errands e.g. picking up prescriptions. At the moment, anyone using the Mobile Warden service pays £11/ week towards the cost.

Therefore we have a problem - if more people don't make use of her service, the hours she is available could be cut even further. This, therefore, calls into question the money the Parish Council is handing over. It should be given to make sure the support is there for Linton residents and if the Mobile Warden is not supporting our residents, the money (your money) is going to support residents elsewhere.

The Parish Council and the ACE's Committee are trying to organise a meeting with Age Concern to discuss this.

The Parish Council would like to request:

More people make use of the Mobile Warden service.

- Anyone using the Mobile Warden service, now or in the 2. past, to let the Parish Council have some feedback as to its merits & usefulness.
- More people to get involved with the ACEs to ensure it 3. can continue, at least, the social activities.

A1307 Bartlow Road Roundabout

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) has let us know that they made very good progress through 2023 on the construction of the roundabout. This means that there should be no need for any further complete closures of the A1307.

The remaining work includes finishing the connection of Bartlow Road (Linton) to the roundabout, re-surfacing Bartlow Road (which may be happening or even completed as you read this), landscaping works, any defect corrections and the removal of the construction compound.

The roundabout should then be fully open. It will be interesting to see how (or if) traffic through the village changes once this happens, especially the high volumes of vehicles currently experienced on Horseheath Road.

Horseheath Lodge

Anyone driving towards Haverhill on the A1307 will probably have noticed a number of the large trees have been removed on land owned by Horseheath Lodge. Many of these were in a dangerous condition.

There are plans in place to plant 6,000 new trees as part of a larger programme of environmentally friendly development on the site.

The aim for the Estate is to grow tree crops (e.g. willows), provide educational opportunities (particularly for the young) of the connection between food and the land, to provide small units for rural/artisan crafts and to provide a small meeting place or café.

Planning applications to meet these aims are anticipated in due course with the first expected to be for the provision of an alternative vehicle access from the Dean Road.

Footpath Safety Survey

In December we walked the village with a representative of Cambridgeshire County Council, reviewing footpaths that had been reported to both us and CCC through their official system.

At the time of writing, we are still awaiting the formal report including the agreed actions. Some issues that had been reported to us in detail were immediately obvious: the footpath at the bottom of Chalklands is an example of this where it was clear that pushchairs or wheelchairs would not be able to use the path as intended due to the broken surface, bumps and camber.

For other footpaths it was rather more difficult to identify the particular issue as the complaint to us was very generic.



The Parishioner gave an overview of their reasons for applying to join the Parish Council and ways in which they felt a positive contribution could be made. Cllr Lee Gardner proposed that Anthony Smith be co-opted to the Linton Parish Council. Cllr Karen Sanderson seconded. All Agreed.

To approve the minutes of the Full Council Meeting held on 16th November 2023. Cllr Kate Kell proposed the minutes be approved. Cllr Helen Lawrence-Foulds seconded. 8 in favour with two abstentions. Agreed. Matters Arising/Clerks Report.

Cllr Chris Hine raised that the hedge at the top of Lonsdale had been attended to just prior to the meeting.
