XL Bullies - a local perspective

LINTON'S Emma Filby, head of Anglian Dog works, gives a personal perspective of the controversy surrounding the XL Bully breed: I AGREE these types of dogs have the potential to be dangerous but disagree

that they're a dangerous breed in general.

I train large powerful dog breeds that would be considered dangerous breeds by some, but when placed with responsible owners who train and do agility, they're lovely pets

Through time, different breeds get the focus, and breed-specific legislation would be history repeating itself. Under current UK law, breeds that are banned include the Doggo Argentino, Pit Bull Terrier, Fila Brasileiro and the Japanese Tosa, yet these attacks continue. If the breed is banned another will be popularised amongst irresponsible owners and breeders without addressing the underlying problem. The bad dog spotlight has at one time or another been focused on German Shepherds, Dobermans and Rottweilers none of which people currently consider to be bad breeds as they have fallen out of fashion with the irresponsible crowd. I think the focus should be on the breeders, not the breed. The dog industry is missing regulation, licensing, and professionalism. For example, when dogs are bred for looks or financial gain, not temperament, are raised unethically, or are placed in homes irresponsibly, it can lead to behavioural issues such as animals that are fear or pain aggressive. In my opinion, a better response than a ban would be regulation and licensing for breeders, so puppies are only placed in educated and responsible homes,



Emma has worked with thousands of dogs, and knows the importance of proper training

paired with serious consequences for negligent owners of all breeds. If you are an owner of a mastiff-type dog, my advice would be to train your dogs to a high standard, so they are under control in public and challenge the stereotype. For XL bully owners I would encourage you to focus on your obe-

dience and muzzle training before the ban comes in to minimise the impact on your dog. If you are reading this and you

know your dog is out of control, seek support from a qualified trainer.

I've had cases where dogs are referred to me because their reactivity is discovered to be due to an underlying health issue and cowboy trainers responded with harsh methods such as an electric or prong collar which only exacerbated the aggressive behavioural issues. By working with a professional accredited by an externally verified body, like mine with the IMDT, you can be assured that their training is up-to-date, force-free, ethical, and effective and any methods or equipment used will be with a modern, science-based approach because members of such organisations are assessed and have ongoing checks.


Fireworks have a license to thrill

IN September we welcomed Christine Brown from the Mercy Ships charity. She gave a fascinating talk on the work carried out on their two hospital ships - Global Mercy, a new purpose built ship and Africa Mercy, now berthed in Durban, a converted Danish ship on which Christine volunteers. With scanners and operating theatres, the ships berth for ten months at a time, where they treat thousands of people who have often travelled hundreds of miles to the coast in search of help. As well as medical staff they have other volunteers doing the huge job of catering, hospitality, admin, IT and even serving in the onboard Starbucks. Though some volunteers live onboard long term, many go back to their villages and pass on the training they have been given so they can treat people locally, such as for benign tumours and cleft palates. Chalk Stream dreams at the WI



BRUCE HUETT, our speaker, is involved in the project management for the accompanying film for the talk and was assisted on the technical side by John. The soundtrack was a delightful poem by Clare Crosman, plus interviews with volunteers from the River Mel Restoration Group, who have worked for 10 years to restore the river Mel which runs for 8 miles from Melbourn to Meldreth. Music was composed by

local musicians. The film showed volunteers replacing chalk and gravel to filter the water for nutrients and clearing overgrown plantlife to help the stream flow. The stream now has good biodiversity - water voles are thriving, as are such birds as kingfishers and egrets. Bruce mentioned Linton's own stream in Pocket Park where the water level is very low and thanked the FROG group for keeping the stream alive. There are about 210 chalk streams in the world, 160 in the UK. Bruce likes the idea of rivers like the Cam and Mel being working rivers, in particular restoring the mills and getting them working again. The conversation group does wildflower and birdwatching walks. At our next meeting on 3rd October our speaker will be Kevin Boardman, his talk entitled 'Women on the Oregon Trail'. Ladies, why not join us then, as a visitor if you like, for an enjoyable evening, a cuppa and a chat with someone new. You will be most welcome.

The Konik pony kingdom

Since 2003. Wicken Fen and other reserves near and far have been home to herds of Konik ponies, among other large herbivores. The foals born this summer, thus far named Victor, Ginger, Rigel, Oliver, Argo, Pilgrim, Sprout, Silvester, Pie and Beric, are indicative of the success of the herd. You may have heard of Koniks but wondered what they are and why they are here?

Koniks are a Polish breed of pony, descended from the long extinct Tarpan horse, now present in nature reserves across Europe and the subject of decades of research starting as early as 1936 in Poland. In World War 1 they were of vital assistance in troop movements, and the original experiment was to see if horses left in the wild would redevelop their natural traits, and survive with no intervention in wet-lands and heathland areas. Wicken Fen is one of only 4 fragments of undrained fen in East Anglia, playing an impor-

tant role in the locking up of carbon in its wet peaty soil. The aim at Wicken and elsewhere is to restore the once extensive fenland lost due to the draining and straight-ening of waterways in the 17th century. This loss has been described as one of Britain's biggest ecological disasters - though

it seemed such a good idea at the time.... Managing such a large area is hugely expensive in terms of people and machinery. Even wildlife reserves need management. It has to be grazed or mowed. Left to its own devices, the land would become a forest, leading to a loss of diversity of flora and fauna. Koniks and some breeds of cattle act as inexpensive management tools, namely live mowing machines They are the hooved fenland custodians. Their water filled hoof prints and piles of dung help attract new species of plants and

insects. They bite off shoots and rushes, trampling, stripping bark and breaking off woody species while passing by and scratching their backs. Their grazing prevents species like

heather and bracken taking over, and reduce the need for mowing from several times per year to just once. They keep the landscape open and ensure survival of grassland plants. With careful management of numbers, they restore peatbogs and in drier areas help create rich heath and moorland with abundant species. There are scores of academic papers on exactly what they eat and exactly what effects they have on the land.

So what are the characteristics of Koniks? They are small, stocky, with a black stripe along their backs. They are dun coloured with black manes and tails. They are vivacious yet gentle, resourceful in looking for food, resistant to in-fections and parasites and require no intervention while foaling. They make the best of low quality

forage, and adapt amazingly to their environment. They store fat reserves for lean times and their feet survive living in boggy areas. The stallions are fiercely territorial and take care of the safety of their mares. They look outward while the mares look inward, taking care of the foals and finding new grazing areas. Yearlings move away from the group, and new groups form with new stallions. Stallions mark their territory with dung, and spar with any competitor, often causing injuries. The ranger at Wicken Fen has watched over the herd for 20 years now and knows which ones are curious and friendly and which are wary. Visitors love seeing them and their presence increases our ecological awareness.

Take a look at these appealing creatures – either at Wicken or Kingfishers Bridge along the road.

Josh Smith races on

AUGUST saw Joshua racing again at one of his favourite tracks near Kimbolton (or Kim as it's affectionately known), sporting his new race helmet, supplied by Cambox who have appointed Joshua as their Karting Ambassador along with K Insignia we wanted to write about. The monthly race meeting at Kim is run by Hunts Kart Racing Club (HKRC), founded in 1959, the site of the club has a history back to World War II and stands on part of the original RAF airfield on what was the home of the 379th Bombardment Group, part of the Eighth Air Force which flew B-17 Flying Fortresses during World War II carrying the K Insignia. Assigned to RAF Kimbolton in early 1943, the B-17s flew daylight missions, in massed formations to maximize both defensive firepower and bombing concentration. The Eighth Air Force leaders developed a system to easily identify the bombers as they assembled in their formations without the benefit of radio communications and each of the three-air division of the Eighth Air Force had a different shape painted on the wing and vertical stabilizers of each aircraft. Inside of this shape, a letter from the alphabet designated the bombardment group numbered based on when they first entered

combat. As a result, aircraft of the 379th Bombardment Group carried the "Triangle K" insignia. The Group was assigned to the 1st Air Division represented by the triangle, and was the eleventh unit to enter combat indicated by the letter "K." The group flew more sorties than any other bomb group in the Eighth Air Force, and dropped a greater bomb tonnage than any other group. The combat record of the 379th was the most successful of all the Eighth Air Force heavy bomber groups, receiving two Distinguished Unit Citations and lead to the group being called the 'Grand Slam Wing'. Inspired by our heroes in history, and with strong links to the military, Joshua's Dad contacted the 379th to ask for permission to adopt the K Insignia on Joshuas helmet and this was granted.

Over the next few months Joshua is fund raising for Help For Heroes and is also going to be sporting his new race helmet with the K Insignia from the 379th Air Expeditionary Wing at the fund raising events. The Triangle K insignia worn on Josh's helmet is not only the Kim Club Emblem it is also a mark of respect to the 11th combat unit that flew from RAF Kimbolton during World War II. August also

saw Joshua winning his 3rd club round in a row, winning the East Anglian Trophy, the TKM Festival Trophy and he extended his lead in the HKRC "Kimbolton" Championship by over 100 points to his nearest rival. Another solid win, also showing excellent form taking maximum points winning all 4 heats, starting the final from pole, Joshua almost completed a "Racing Grand Slam" in memory of the "The Grand Slam Wing" history we have shared with you. September saw Johua compete with Europe's Best Drivers and came 11th overall in the Euro Grand Finals held at PF International Karting Circuit.






District and County Councillors' monthly report August 2023

New bin collection days

As of September 19th, we will be getting a new bin collection day - which, for most in our area, will be changing from Monday to Wednesday each week

The reason for this is that the District Council hasn't optimised its collection routes in some years, meaning that the routs aren't likely the most efficient. This change reflects the new route optimisation work that has taken place.

The second reason is that the Council is extending its 4-day working week trail to the waste collection service. The only change that we will see is the new collection day, the level of service will remain the same – a collection every week. The bins will still be collected on Monday up until September 19th, when the new rota will come in. It's important to know that everyone that will be affected by a change will be written to directly. If you don't receive a letter from the Council, nothing is changing for you. Greater Cambridge Partnership STZ update

The proposal by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) that we had put to us last year, which offered vast improvements to our public transport network being implemented now, with the caveat that it would eventually need to be self-funded. This was proposed to come in the form of road-charging in Cambridge City, coming into force in 2-3 years' time after the bus improvements. There was a, very lengthy, public consultation undertaken at the back end of last year and the results of which have formed an updated proposal, which was published at the end of August.

Planning & Meeting Update August/September 2023

HORSEHEATH Road:

Worryingly, there has been no further information received by the Parish Council regarding the Breach of Condition Enforcement Notice issued a year after the SCDC Planning Committee voted to "Accept but not Discharge" the surface water condition at the Horseheath Road development.

Linton Parish Council strongly objected to the surface water scheme and despite having extensive local knowledge of the area, it was still accepted. Due to the pending situation of the remedial works, the Parish Council are currently unable to be adopt the allotments.

Cambridge Road:

The Planning Committee have raised concerns regarding the progression of construction without the required soil testing for condition 4, and issues relating to potential impact on the water

Included in the letter was the importance of ensuring these conditions are approved before any further construction, considering the recent Breach of Condition Enforcement Notice issued to the Croudace site for failure to comply with the surface water drainage condition.

Neighbourhood Plan:

The Neighbourhood Plan working group met on Monday 4th September to discuss comments received from all parties in relation to the Linton, Little Linton & Hildersham Neighbourhood Plan. A further meeting was held with representatives from SCDC on Monday 11th September to discuss next steps. A Strategic Environmental Assessment and a Habitats Regulations Assessment screening report are both required, and will be carried out in due course.

The Neighbourhood Plan is a work in progress and it continues to adapt and change with the valuable input from parishioners. Thank you to all those that are helping with the process. Tree Works:

As we approach Autumn it is now time to consider carrying out work on trees. We would like to remind parishioners who live in the Conservation area that all tree works require permission. Permission is also required for trees with a Tree Preservation Order (TPO). If in doubt please check with the office who will be able to advise you.

For those of you with trees outside the Conservation Area we would appreciate notification of any works, the tree warden at the Parish Council is available to give guidance to maintain the health of hedgerows and trees. We are supportive of increasing the green canopy of Linton which currently stands at just 16% Bartlow Road Roundabout & Al307 Road Closure:

The good news is that Bartlow Road roundabout is progress-

ing well, as you may have seen from the aerial shots in last month's Linton News. The slightly more uncomfortable news is that by the time you read this there will have been the first of is that by the time you read this there will have been the lift of two weekend road closures. These are scheduled for weekend of 30th September/1st October and 7/8th October. At the recent Traffic Working Group meeting, valid points were raised regarding the diversion route for HGV's.

Whilst the Parish Council is unable to dictate that HGV's can not use the local routes, especially on roads which have no restrictions, LPC have given comments and feedback to GCP and Milestone. Those delivering the project have promised to do everything in their power to reduce the impact of the necessary closures and we hope that common sense will also prevail.
