

Slava Ukraini! Villagers send vital supplies

Ten thousand nappies, 5,000 baby wipes and 237 sleeping bags. These were just some of the vital supplies donated, packed and shipped to the Ukraine relief effort after a village wide appeal. Anya Sparks, who spearheaded the initiative, was overwhelmed by the support and gave a huge thanks to everybody who took part.

The village hall became the centre of operations and a large team of volunteers worked tirelessly to sort, count and pack donations which then headed off to join a larger shipment headed to Europe by truck. Other items sent for the relief effort included: 1,386 blankets; 7,515 items of first aid; 2,148 toothbrushes and toothpaste and 5,448 pain relief doses. The items traveled to Poland and are now being used as part of the relief effort as thousands of Ukrainians flee to safety. Another collection is planned for the near future and will be adjusted to meet demands as they arise. Anyone wishing to donate money in the meantime is urged to visit the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) online and follow donation links.

Green Lane residents vent frustration

A GROUP of villagers have come together to express frustration at problems that they say are being ignored. Pamela Phipps, representing an informal Green Lane residents group, spoke of the "highly dangerous" issue of turning left onto the High Street. Cars and vans regularly park directly outside the Co-op, but Pamela said it is large delivery vehicles that cause the most trouble. According to the group, several near misses have been witnessed in recent months. Before street lights were replaced on the High Street, a mirror used to be fitted to the lamp post opposite the lane, that allowed drivers to see into the high street more easily. Several Green Lane residents attended a Parish Council meeting but claim that the PC chose to "ignore the issue" of the mirror. Pamela added "do we have to wait for someone to be injured or worse before a new mirror is installed?" There were also concerns raised about the state of the footpath at the bottom of the lane which is poorly lit and maintained.

Anderson Trust grants much needed cash

THE Anderson Trust was established in 1998 as a result of the sale of Church Cottage in Linton, the former home of Professor Charles and Mrs Mary Anderson. At a meeting of the Trustees, held virtually on March 7th, £9495 interest, received from investments, was approved, according to the priorities stipulated in the Trust Deed, for distribution to the following applicants:

£5000 to the Beacon Youth Trust towards the salary and on-costs of a Youth Worker; £460 to St Mary's Church for the purchase of a portable, battery-powered sound system and £370 for a tablet to support children and families work; £1000 to Linton Infants School PTF for the purchase of Bee Bots and activity trackers; £600 to Linton Infants School for music equipment; £1000 to Linton Heights Junior School towards the art room project; £800 to Granta School for the purchase of beanbags for the library; £165 to Chestnut playgroup for resources for wildlife and £500 to Linton Vil-

lage Cricket Club towards the purchase of a cylinder mower.

The country house that vanished

WE are pleased to say that Linton and District Historical Society have recommenced our meetings starting with *Horseheath Hall 'a vanished country house'* with local historian Janet Morris. It was good to see 40 or so members and visitors return for an interesting and informative talk about this once important large country house right on our doorstep.

An earlier house had been built on this site by the very successful Allington Family in the 1300s. But, with new ideas coming from abroad, a new modern house would replace it in 1642, and so became the story of this large new hall and vast estate high up on the Cambridgeshire/ Suffolk borders which included a deer park, a menagerie housing monkeys, an orangery and walled garden.

Sadly, like numerous estates, the misuse of money by the owners and subsequent heirs, started its decline. In 1747 the estate slowly reduced in size to pay for growing debts. Advertisements showed just how much of the house contents were sold off. In 1775 Horseheath Hall was put up for sale, but no-one came forward. Finally in 1777 it was literally demolished brick by brick! It is understood some of the large houses in the vicinity were built using brick from the hall. All that remains of the house now is a raised grass area, and an overgrown ditch which formed part of the ha ha, along with two cedar trees which were part of the garden. WI gets a lesson in life at the Zoo

JOHN Ray from Linton Zoo, our speaker, has been working in zoos for 52 years. Linton Zoo was opened by the owners of a pet shop in Bishop's Stortford fifty years ago.

Most businesses had to close during lockdown and got £10,000; the zoos got nothing until the government gave in, but they had to make people redundant. The remaining staff had to work seven days a week until someone from catering came to help. Help with food came from various sources. Waitrose helped a lot. The Ark in Fulbourn, and a butchers in Melbourn gave pig and sheep heads and offal free of charge. Mice for the snakes came from Babraham, and shavings for bedding were donated. A local farm donated hay and root vegetables.

Not forgetting the zoo staff, a local company gave tins of chocolates. Lots of people made things for sale. The animals started looking around for people during lockdown as they got bored.

The zoo supports conservation plans worldwide, and John showed pictures of the snow leopards they are fundraising for. There are 45 pairs of snow leopards in Europe, and if they all bred every year there would be too many.

The vet comes in about four times a year at a cost of £650 per visit. Routine treatment includes cutting nails of big cats and trimming zebras hooves. You don't get money for animals now – they are taken on loan for breeding. Linton joined a programme to release Scottish wild cats back into the wild (the most endangered cat in the world). Members were allowed to handle a baby red-footed tortoise and were shown a slide of it hatching from the egg.

Our next meeting in the Village Hall will be on 5th April at 7.30 pm. The speaker will be Susan Widlake on *Hats & Fascinators*. New members always welcome.


COUNTRY MATTERS

The marvellous migration of birds

ONE of the classic images of bird migration is a skein of geese flying over the Norfolk marshes – sadly we rarely see migrating geese in Linton, but we can watch many other migrants, in all four seasons. The definition of migration is the annual large-scale movement of birds between summer breeding grounds and winter non-breeding grounds. This is not necessarily a choice on the part of each species, but an instinctive adaptation for survival, driven by food and reproduction. It has fascinated humans for thousands of years. We know much more than we used to, but it remains a matter of mystery and I am sure we will go on forever studying how different species achieve extraordinary migratory feats. There are loads of different types of migration, far too complicated for Country Matters, but a basic understanding helps explain the phenomenon of millions and millions of birds of all shapes and sizes moving across the globe. Like people over the centuries, birds migrate to survive, but then go back, and come again the next year. Birds move from low or decreasing resources to high or increasing resources, namely food and nesting opportunities. An arctic tern travels between 25,000 and 40,000 miles every year. Astounding. However not all birds migrate – partridges never move more than 1km from where they were born – come to think of it we have one of those in our house...

Some birds are marathon travellers, flying thousands of miles at a time on migratory routes known as flyways. Others rest en route to refuel, stopping for hours, days or weeks, waiting for the next weather opportunity. Flocks and family groups move around mountain ranges, affected by winds and the proximity of survival resources. After a storm, thousands of small birds may crash down exhausted on parks, fields, islands and shorelines. The UK is a service station for many species, and in some parts of the UK birdwatchers flock to hotspots and bottlenecks.



We have now seen the last of our local winter visitors, especially the Welney swans and the winter fieldfares and redwings that come in their flocks of thousands from Russia and the Baltic. When insect supplies decrease, they move on to our berries. Our most famous summer visitors are swallows, house martins and swifts, members of the Hirondine family. Start listening out now for cuckoos and warblers such as nightingales, blackcap and chiff chaff. How do these scraps of feathers weighing the same as a 10 pence piece fly thousands of miles? Yet of the three wagtails, the pied and the grey live here all year, but the yellow wagtail comes only in summer.

It is only relatively recently with tracking devices and drones that we have been able to find out with certainty many more details about migration. Aristotle thought birds transmogrified into different species depending on the season. A Swedish bishop in the 1500s convinced people that swallows hibernated like mammals deep in the mud and re-emerged in the spring. But now you can track an individual cuckoo through Africa throughout the winter, and watch him return to his favourite spot in Cambridgeshire.

What happens to each bird before it migrates? Changes in light levels signal the start. Birds moult and grow new and better feathers for the journey ahead. The light triggers hormonal changes, and they undergo something called hyperphagia, an increase in appetite that leads to a doubling of their body weight. Even their digestive tract changes, as they choose richer food with a higher fat content. They lose muscle on their legs and gain it elsewhere. In the case of Knots, the size of their heart muscles increases, and Godwits increase the concentration of red blood cells.

There is a great German word, *Zugunruhe*, meaning impatience to get on the train. As the time to migrate approaches, flocks gather, often on telegraph wires. Over several days different groups decide the time is right, and we're off!

Hundred Parishes Society walks

I WOULD like to remind readers of the walk routes on the Society's website, www.hundredparishes.org.uk. All routes can be downloaded and printed. They include route instructions and information about the places you will pass. Each of the hundred parishes is included in at least one route and there are walks for all abilities. The routes have been designed to take you through interesting places and lovely countryside.

Before setting off, you might like to check the relevant parish introductions on our website; there, you will find details of local tea rooms and pubs etc. It's best to check with the pub to see if it will be open on the day and time that you will need it.

Most of our routes include footpaths or bridleways where good footwear will make life more comfortable. A modest investment in a good pair of walking boots is recommended. Carry boot covers or plastic bags to put on before visiting a pub or church, or leave boots outside. Check the weather forecast and be prepared - with waterproof top, woolly hat or sunscreen.

Whether or not you are using one of the Society's routes, please be sure to follow the *Countryside Code*. I summarise a few points that are mainly common sense:

- Respect everyone
- Be considerate to those living in, working in and enjoying the countryside
- Leave gates and property as you find them
- Do not block access to gateways or driveways when parking
- Be nice, say hello
- Keep to marked paths.
- Protect the environment
- Take your litter home
- Do not light fires
- Always keep dogs under control and in sight
- Pick up your dog's poo
- Do not cause damage or disturb wildlife.

I hope you will join many others who already enjoy our routes.

District and County Councillors' Report

March 2022

Budgets

DURING February, both the County and District Councils set their budgets for the forthcoming municipal year.

The main headline, that most people will be interested in, is that the council decided to increase their share of Council Tax by a total of 4.99%, which is made up of 1.99% for general services and 3% for Adult Social Care. In real money this equates to 90p per week for band A homes, £1.04 per week for band B, £1.19 per week for band C and £1.34 per week for band D. There is support available for those families who are struggling financially, for example the household support fund mentioned below.

The District Council agreed to limit their Council Tax rise to £5 per year. This equates to 10p per week for houses that fall within band D, and scales up and down from there, dependant on banding.

Ukrainian Situation

With many people asking for ways they can help the situation in Ukraine, the District Council are suggesting that, if people wish to support, this is best directed towards the following organisations:

The British Red Cross – provides food, medicine, clothing and shelter;

The UNHCR refugee agency – funds emergency shelters, repairs to damaged homes, psychological assistance and clothing; UNICEF – helps ensure families have clean water and food; Save the Children – provides cash assistance, food and support to other refugees crossing into Romania and Lithuania.

Flood Risk Management Strategy

The County Council has recently approved their strategy towards flood risk management for the next 5 years. Thank you to all those that took the time to feed into this document whilst going through its inception. Community Chest Fund

Another existing fund that is opening a new round of bidding, with some good news. The amount groups are able to bid for has doubled from £1,000 to £2,000 per group. Full criteria and applications can be found at www.scams.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/grants/community-chest-grants/ The District Council recently extended the criteria of the grant to allow grants for the Queen's Jubilee celebrations.

Household Support Fund

There is a support fund available from the County Council, aimed at supporting families with a below average income through the more difficult winter months. There is a fair amount of money in the pot at the moment and the fund will remain open until March 2022. Eligibility criteria and application form can be found here - www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/coronavirus/household-support-fund

Business Covid Grants

The government have released a new batch of Covid-related support grants for businesses, primarily in the hospitality sector, assisting with restarting after a period of inconsistent trading. Applications are made through the District Council and full detail can be found here - www.scams.gov.uk/business-can-apply-now-for-latest-support-grants/

County Council Farm Holdings

The County Council owns lots of rural estate in Cambridgeshire. They are now looking for applicants for tenancy on these parcels of land. The main thrust of the lease will be to cultivate some sort of business, not necessarily agriculture related. It's a very interesting opportunity for those that are looking to start their own business. Parking Enforcement

The County and District Councils have officially begun the process of taking parking enforcement powers away from the Police and managing this themselves, as happens in Cambridge City. The next step is that the County Council have prepared an application to the Secretary of State to attempt to formalise this. We will keep you updated as this progresses.

Solar Farm

A solar farm is planned beside the waste depot in Waterbeach to help power bin lorries across Greater Cambridge.

The board of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority has agreed £2.7m funding towards the renewable energy plant while approving its budget last week.

Following successful trials with the first electric bin lorry, three more are now on order for delivery this year. Diesel fuel to power the existing fleet is the biggest single source of carbon emissions for South Cambs District Council.

The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste service, the partnership between South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge City Council that collects recycling and rubbish from around 127,000 households, applied for the funding towards the £4.2m project. The councils will fund the balance.

Farmgate

For those following the Farmgate story in local media, which concerns a former county councillor who abused their position within the council to bully and harass officers to get their way, has taken a significant step forward in that the full report into what occurred has now been published. Needless to say it has promoted many questions into some councillors' behaviour towards staff, and has made the Council implement steps to ensure this behaviour will not be tolerated by officers or fellow councillors.

A1307 Upgrades

The next set of upgrades to be implemented on the A1307 is the safer crossing point at the Hildersham junction. This involves putting in a crossing that all non-motorised users (pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders) can use. This has begun already and will be fully completed in the summer.

Grants Awarded for 2022-2023

THE PARISH Council believe that it is vital to support and invest within our local community to ensure that activities, clubs, services and educational programmes can continue to be offered to parishioners.

Each year, we welcome grant applications for the forthcoming financial year. This year, 13 applications were made with a total of £34,863 requested.

The Parish Council is pleased to advise that 11 applications were successful and the following grants have been agreed:

Linton Activities and Care for the Elders (ACE's) - £5,000.00

Linton Activities and Care for the Elders (ACE's) is a wonderful organisation that works in partnership with Age UK, helping to provide care and organise events for Linton's most knowledgeable residents. The funding provided by the Council contribute towards the Community Warden Scheme.

Relate Cambridge - £800.00

Relate Cambridge has been providing Linton residents with counselling support for many years and offer a wide range of services and guidance. The funds provided by the Council help ensure that affordable counselling sessions can be offered to the parishioners of Linton.

Cambridge Search and Rescue - £260.00

Cambridge Search and Rescue provide a valuable service across Cambridgeshire, including Linton and requires specialist equipment to support the team in their work to find and protect parishioner.

Chestnut Playgroup - £388.53

Chestnut Playgroup in Linton provides friendly local childcare for parishioners and is centred in the heart of the village. The funds provided will contribute to new and engaging toys to help children learn through play.

Linton Friends of the River Granta (FROGS) - £1,500.00

Linton Friends of the River Granta are an independent volunteer group who aim to protect and enhance the River Granta. They also participate in various other activities throughout the village, such as Linton's Litter Pick events. Planning & Meeting Updates January - February 2022

THE SURFACE and foul water conditions for the Croudate Development at Horseheath Road were heard by the SCDC Planning Committee on 9th March. They were shown photographic evidence of the extent of the flooding to nearby homes both internally and externally and were clearly shocked – despite the number of photos and videos that have been sent to the Planning Officers, it was obviously the first time that most of the Councillors had seen the damage caused by the flood.

Like the residents of Lonsdale and LPC, the Councillors were not convinced that they had enough information to approve the conditions and asked for a deferral of the decision. We are all still waiting for the results of the investigation into the flooding event that occurred on 20th July last year. The Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA) have been asked to make this a priority as it is important to both current residents and new residents alike that the developer can demonstrate that, as a result of the plans, "there would be no increase to flood risk elsewhere" and that the route the water would follow in the event that the basin is overwhelmed is known.

An Outline application for industrial/commercial premises has been received for the land next to the Old Railway Station (above Croftons Engineering) to the south of the A1307. While the site could be developed for industrial/commercial use, the current drawings and accompanying documents imply that it could be used for warehousing with a number of HGVs accessing the site daily. Perhaps the most amusing claim in the application is that a 13m high building with its ground level set approx. 3m higher than the Crofton buildings would not be visible from any public access or footpaths! We wonder where the person who wrote that comes from and whether they have ever driven into Linton (the site is visible from the A1307 as you pass the entrance to Little Linton) or walked the footpath next to the site or across the field from behind the zoo. Would this be the right type of development for Linton?

Search for "Greater Cambridge Planning" and select "View and Comment on Planning Applications" to add your voice. The application number is 22/00487/OUT.

The village boundary signs have still not been returned to their correct position and the 30mph sign is now becoming hidden by the trees as Spring is arriving meaning that there is virtually no indication of a change in the speed limit from the 50mph on the A1307. Please get in touch with us and your local District Councillors if this concerns you.

Finally, we hope those of you living in the Conservation Area had a chance to comment on the consultation for the Conservation Area appraisal.

If you live or have commercial premises in the Conservation Area, please remember to check what permission is needed before carrying out work on or around your property. This particularly applies to trees. Trees in conservation areas have protection even if they don't have an individual Tree Preservation Order (TPO). Carrying out unauthorised work on a protected tree is a criminal offence, so please remember to apply to SCDC Trees at least six weeks before you would like to carry out the work.

ABBREVIATED minutes of the Meeting of Linton Parish Council held on Thursday 17th February 2022 at the Cathodeon Centre. **Apologies for Absence.** Cllr Amy Smith and Cllr Chris Hine. No apologies received from Cllr Sharron Parker & Cllr Paul Poulter. **Chairman's Comment.**

The Chairman raised serious concerns regarding the status of the planning application for Land Adjacent to 35 Balslam Road. The application was heard at the South Cambridgeshire District Council Planning Committee meeting held on 19th January 2022. Despite recommendation for approval by the Planning Officer, the application was unanimously refused by the committee. LPC have been informed that the application has since been withdrawn by the applicant. County Councillor Henry Batchelor, Vice Chairman of the SDCD Planning Committee advised the Chairman to write to South Cambridgeshire District Council to directly raise the concerns of the Parish Council. The Chairman of LPC will question, in writing, with the CEO of SDCD. Liz Watts as the opportunity to withdraw an application should not be permitted after it has been refused.

Consideration of the application for Parish Councillor for co-optation from a parishioner. Open discussion and Decision required. Cllr Kate Kell proposed that Mr. Carl Cieluch be co-opted to the Linton Parish Council. Cllr Lee Gardner seconded. All Agreed.

Open Forum for Public Participation.

The new Youth Worker for the Beacon Youth Trust introduced herself to the Parish Council having started in November 2021, explaining about working with the Linton Parish Council and schools to increase opportunities for youth work in the village. A remote meeting was requested with LPC for informal discussions soon.

Matters Arising/Clerks Report.

Notification of the intention to request quotes for painting of the bridge and the electricity sub-station in the High Street. Cllr Lee Gardner advise that the sub-station is the property of UK Power Networks and therefore the Linton Parish Council should not do any works. Cllr Merrie Mannassi proposed to defer any decisions on the work required on the High Street bridge until 2023 due to budget restraints.

Information on the Granta Wellbeing Hub and request for agreement that the office actively promote the service via all available outlets. Cllr Merrie Mannassi suggested that the office promote the Granta Wellbeing Hub on the Parish Council website, social media and on the notice boards in the village. Cllr Guy Ennew volunteered to display posters in the Pavilion.

Notification of Parishioner communication with County Councillor regarding street marking issues in the village not being addressed. For information.

County Councillor Henry Batchelor advised that the number of individual reports of an issue would carry more weight than just the Parish Council raising them. He also advised that he send contact details to the Clerk of the new Highways Officer to enable direct discussion regarding outstanding issues.

Consideration of the District and County Councillors Report for February 2022.

District Councillor John Batchelor advised the Parish Council that parking enforcement had been agreed in principle, however due to the process involved this would not be imminent. It was noted that road markings need to be reviewed and addressed prior to the Council being able to commence civil enforcement.

District Councillor John Batchelor also gave an update on the latest Covid-19 statistics. Two weeks ago, positive cases had risen to over 1500 per 100,000 and in the last week this figure had dropped to 712 per 100,000. There were 60 people in Addenbrookes with Covid-19 at the time of the meeting.

County & District Councillor Henry Batchelor advised that a new Highways Officer had been appointed and suggested that LPC request a site meeting to discuss ongoing issues in Linton. He also advised of additional green bin collections planned on 19th and 26th February 2022 to catch up with missed collections due to staff shortages.

Committee & Working Group Representatives

Invitation to all Councillors to join Committees and/or Working Groups to represent the Parish Council. Supporting documents in Councillor packs. Open Discussion and Decision required. The Chairman requested that two or more councillors join the Planning Committee.

Cllr Guy Ennew volunteered to join the Planning Committee and requested to join the Recreation Ground working group. Cllr Helen Lawrence-Foulds requested to join the Open Spaces, Cemetery, Environment & Glebe Land working group.

Planning

Bartlow Road

Cllr Kate Kell advised on behalf of the Planning Committee, the Full Council not to proceed with the current Judicial Review as Abbey had lodged an appeal on the decision to refuse the variation of condition for foul water (21/00629/S73) making the JR mute. Cllr Kell requested confirmation of whether the appeal is to be a written report or an inquiry. If the appeal is approved, it would mean that it must come under the new local plan that was not in place at the time of the original OL application.

Cllr Kate Kell to review the documents and report from the Planning Inspectorate and report back to the next Planning and Full Council meeting.

Horseheath Road.

County Councillor Henry Batchelor advised that the Surface Water and Foul Water conditions are due to be heard at the SDCD Planning Committee meeting on 9th March 2022. The delay was due to the Lead Local Flood Authority still awaiting a response from the developer, Croudace.

Finance

Consideration from the Linton Granta Football Club for funding towards the upkeep of the football pitch on the Recreation Ground. Open discussion & Decision required.

Cllr Lee Gardner proposed one-off funding for £2,000.00 be awarded to the Linton Grant Football Club with the provision that the work be extended beyond the Football pitch to include the whole Recreation Ground and that fertilizer would not be used. The three-year schedule of works would be continued by the LGFC. Cllr John Bald seconded. All Agreed.

Contracts & Tenders

Notification of new invitations to tender advertised on the website for the High Street bench and the works at Horn Lane Bridge.

Traffic & Highways

Notification of the data report of the Mobile Speed Indicator Unit (MSID) for January 2022.

The Clerk advised the Council that the MSID would be moved to various locations in the village and stay in situ for a period of two weeks. Regular reports of the data captured would be shared with the Speedwatch Team.

Consideration of funding a regular advertisement in the Linton News to encourage volunteers to join the Speedwatch group. Open discussion and Decision Required.

The Chairman invited a member of the public to speak.

The participant spoke of the need to increase volunteers to help with Speedwatch in the village.

The Clerk suggested a designated section in the Parish Matters to advertise.

Events

Platinum Jubilee

Consideration of holding an event for the Platinum Jubilee on 2nd - 5th June 2022. Open discussion and Response required. Cllr John Bald proposed that the Parish Council co-ordinate with the Church celebrations and have a gathering on Camping Close. The Clerk would set up a working group via email to assist with arrangements and liaise with the Events Officer at CCC for permission to use Camping Close.

The clerk also advised the Council of an available Community Chest grant to a value of £700 for commemorating the Platinum Jubilee and suggested a bench for the planned orchard at the Cathodeon Centre.

Consideration for the request to hang handmade bunting for the Platinum Jubilee on the railings at the Cemetery and the Village

Hall. Open discussion and Decision required.

The Parish Council advised that the bunting should be displayed in Camping Close for the duration of the event (1st - 6th June 2022) The bunting must not be displayed at the Cemetery.

Recreation Ground

Bowling Green

Consideration for the results of the survey for the future use of the Bowling Green.

The Chairman invited a member of the public to speak. The participant advised that Linton has no adequate Basketball facilities that are safe to use. They advised that a basketball court requires a 3-metre boundary to ensure safe play. A standard basketball court measures 15x28 metres, rising to 21x34 metres to include safety surround.

Cllr Kate Kell requested the office respond to volunteers in the survey, to thank them and explain the timescales to get to the next stage. It was discussed that surface requirements to facilitate the most popular choices requires further investigation. Cllr Kate Kell suggested a working group be set up to include parishioners. The opportunity to utilise the area of handstanding next to the Skate Park was suggested. More discussion was required, and a remote working group meeting would be scheduled.

Consideration for a request for permission to install a new basketball court on the Recreation Ground required by a group of parishioners to enable completion of an Expression of Interest to the Amey Community Fund.

Permission could not be granted as the Parish Council needs to determine whether the area is to be used as multi-purpose or solely for basketball.

Update on the security cameras and lighting at the Recreation Ground.

Cllr John Bald requested that the office look into requirements and prices for security cameras and lighting at the Recreation Ground. Cllr Kate Kell & Cllr Merrie Mannassi requested that light pollution be considered to protect the wildlife in the vicinity.

Consideration for the request from Victor Harris to hold the Fun Fair on the Recreation Ground between 19th - 22nd May 2022. Cllr John Bald proposed that Victor Harris be given permission to hold the Fun Fair on the Recreation Ground between 19th - 22nd May 2022. Cllr Guy Ennew seconded. All Agreed.

Open Spaces, Environment & Biodiversity

Consideration of the request for a small electrical appliance recycling bank located in the village.

The Parish Council requested that the Clerk ask for information on space required and if appropriate approach the Fire Station, the Village Hall or consider Coles Lane Car Park.

Website & Social Media

Consideration for external support in development of the website. Open discussion and Response required.

The Clerk updated the Council on the expense of the original website and the lack of visitors to the site. It was suggested that the website would be updated by the Assistant Clerk as time allowed. Updates required for Planning and Neighbourhood Plan which the Assistant Clerk would request from the Planning Committee in due course.
